JOHN AMADIO, renowned Australian flautist, will be heard in A.B.C. pro-grammes in the near future.

OHN AMADIO, the Australian virtuoso flautist, is making his first return appearances in Australia, after an absence of eleven years, as soloist with the A.B.C.'s symphony orchestras in Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne during the current season.
