BEAUFORT GAINS THE HONOURS

CRICKET

EVANSFORD ASSOCIATION. BEAUFORT PREMIERS.

When play commenced on the last day in the final match, Beaufort v. Mt. Lonarch, Beaufort were 174 runs ahead with three wickets to fall.

The remaining Beaufort batsmen added a useful 16 runs to the score, leaving Mt. Lonarch 191 runs to make in their second innings.

The game lived up to its reputation for surprises, as Mt. Lonarch batsmen failed to get into their stride and the whole side was dismissed for the poor score of 50.

The batsmen never appeared comfortable, and only E. Egan (12) and C. Neil (11) reached double figures.

The Beaufort bowling looked more aggressive than usual, and all the bowlers did well, with Bates 4/5, McCracken, 2/14, Hunt, 2/4, and McGregor, 1/16, taking the wickets. The fielding was good, and one catch by Fletcher in the slips was very cleverly executed.

At the conclusion of the match, Mr L. Neil, on behalf of Mt. Lonarch team and the Evansford Cricket Association, congratulated the Beaufort players on their win, and paid tribute to the players for the sporting manner in which the game was played. He also thanked the umpires, Messrs. Yawkins and I. S. Mills, for the excellent manner in which they carried out their duties with complete satisfaction.

The Beaufort captain (Mr M. Cole) and the president (Mr H. V. Martin) acknowledged the congratulatory remarks of Mr Neil, and referred to the good sporting friendship of all the Beaufort players, and especially that of Mt. Lonarch.

EVANSFORD ASSOCIATION v. ARARAT ASSOCIATION.

Two teams from Evansford Cricket Association visited Ararat on Easter Saturday, and played two matches selected from the Ararat Association, and two remarkably close finishes resulted. Evansford No. 1 team, playing on the Alexandria Oval, won by one run, which was scored off the third last ball of the last over of the day.

Ararat batted first, and just as the openers were settling down, Whiting, by a brilliant bit of stumping off Cole, secured the wicket of Robson for 9. Two more wickets fell cheaply, but A. Candy was now batting in his best style and scoring at a fast rate with the score at 66 and the last over before lunch being bowled, C. Neil got through his defence, and bowled him for an entertaining innings of 42. On resumption, wickets fell quickly, and seven were down for 82. N. Wilson, the captain, well supported by his fielders, took the score to 138 before Wilson was out for 30, compiled in excellent style.

The Evansford Association bowlers all took wickets, but F. Hinchliffe with 3/27, and C. Neil, 2/14 were most successful.

The visitors started poorly losing 3 wickets for 23. Then Templeton and Cole made a stand and took the score to 61, when Cole was run out by a splendid throw from the field which hit the wicket. Wicket continued to fall at regular intervals, and when Templeton was out for a well-made 40, the visitors were in a precarious position. G. McDowell, however, was batting well, and attacking the bowling, quickly took the score to 126, when Martin, the tenth man, joined him, and 13 runs were required for victory, with ten minutes to play. This pair took the risks and ran a number of short singles, and when the last over commenced two runs were required to win. Martin, who faced the bowler, was unable to play him, but the bowler was unlucky enough to miss the wicket. However, the batsman got the sixth ball away from the inside field, and a smart single was run. The re-

turn hit the wicket, deflecting the ball and allowing the batsmen to sneak another run to win the match.

POISONING RABBITS

FORMULA FOR METHOD WITH APPLES AND STRYCHNINE.

The following circular has been issued by the Lands Department in regard to poisoning rabbits:—

Cut up the apples into halves about 1/2-inch to 3/4-inch square, dust with 1 oz. of strychnine (powdered) to 10 or 12 lb. of apples with a large sized pepper tin. Any sugar in the proportion of 1 lb. to 15 lb. of apples found on the bait has been found a great additional attraction. This applies when the fruit is a little on the sour side. If the apples are sweet less sugar is necessary. Lay in a furrow from 6 in. to 3 ft. apart according to the infested state of the place. The advisability of "free feeding" several times before-hand where above poison is to be used, cannot be too strongly recommended; in fact, it is practically essential to success. The baits in free feeding should be exactly the same as those which are poisoned, and should be put down in the same way. If the bait is free from poison are well taken, success is absolutely certain. The rabbit comes to the furrow eager and unsuspecting and falls an easy victim.

The poison baits should be laid from about 18 in. to about 6 in. apart, according to the infested state of the land. A pound of apple should make about 2500 to 3000 baits; therefore an ounce of strychnine should do from 2500 to 5000 baits. The necessary length of the furrow required can thus be easily determined in connection with what a place

may require. In places where there are only a small number of rabbits, it is not a bad plan to peel the apples that are used in the actual poisoning (not necessarily with the "free baits"). This is making "assurance doubly sure," as every side of the bait will absorb poison.

In cases where the furrows cannot be readily made, good work can be done by laying the poison on scratches similar to those made when trapping. When poison is taken the furrows should be replenished until the rabbits cease to take it. It is hard to err on the side of liberality, but very easy to do the opposite. It is far better to have some poison left in the furrows than to have a few rabbits left for future breeding.

This method has come to stay. Splendid results are being obtained throughout the State wherever the above directions are properly carried out. The great points in favour of apple poisoning are:—

1. It is good all the year round no matter how plentiful grass may be.
2. It is cheap and simple.
3. The rabbits are found dead near the furrows.
4. The value of the skins will, in nearly all cases, more than recoup the cost of the work.
5. If the poisoned baits are put down last thing at night, and looked at early the following morning, there is little danger to stock and bird life, and under any circumstances, if the baits are laid right in the furrows stock are not likely to get them.
6. Young rabbits will take baits as freely as old ones.

H.E. SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETING

The March meeting of the Beaufort H.E. School Committee took place on Monday night, 19th inst., at the School and was attended by five members and the head teacher, Mr C. V. Saunderson. Mr C. V. Wyllie (chairman) presided.

The head teacher reported in regard to glass required. The chairman and head teacher said the Shire Engineer had not yet been asked to inspect the school oval.

Letters were read from the Mothers' Club in regard to the system of straight-out giving, and from the Education Department concerning same. — Received.

Mothers' Club president notified by chairman and correspondent of approval, and their action endorsed.

"Elizabeth" when she went on holiday. In her spare time she acted with S.U.D.S. (Sydney University Dramatic Society), the cradle of many top-line radio actors of today—Lynell Barbour, John Bushelle, Sheila Sewell are a few.

"Naturally this is wonderful training for production plays for adults," comments Mollie. "The technique of production is similar for children's and adults' plays, except that for children's plays the script must be subordinated to clarity."

Sometimes producing plays presents unforeseen problems. Mollie recalls one occasion on which the station went off the air for two minutes just as her play was due to begin. The play had to finish according to the original schedule, so she had to cut the script (running backward and forward from control room to actors) while the play was on the air.

On another occasion a play called for the sound of locks clunking. The A.B.C. did not have such a record. The effects operator suggested trying out records of monkeys played at 33-1/3 revolutions per minute and rats at 78 revolutions per minute.

Mollie eventually used monkeys played at 33-1/3, which gave the desired effect of duck-clunking.



HOSPITAL GARDEN

FETE

Although showery weather necessitated the Beaufort B.N. Hospital garden fete being held in the C.W.A. Hall on Saturday afternoon, 10th April, there was a good attendance and a satisfactory profit was made. The Town Band, under the baton of Mr R. Suddler, played a programme of lively airs, and stalls were conducted by the ladies. Mr W. Jackson carried out the secretarial duties. A little girl presented a bouquet to Mrs R. C. Guthrie.

Mr A. R. Beggs (hospital president) welcomed Mr R. C. Guthrie, M.L.A., and Mrs Guthrie. They viewed the rain, he said, with mixed feelings—they were looking for rain and they were sorry because of it in one way. This hospital had been serving the town and district for many years. They had a much greater project—that of a new hospital. Mr Guthrie had assured them he would give all the assistance he could. He had already helped to get them splendid aid. Not long ago he had been instrumental in their getting a grant from the Government, which came at a time when the building was very welcome. The building during the war years had got into disrepair and wanted painting, and new fittings and equipment were required. It was the intention of the committee to go ahead and keep their asset in good repair. He thanked the band for coming along, and all who had helped and brought things to the fete this afternoon.

Mr R. C. Guthrie, M.L.A., on behalf of his wife and himself, thanked them for the invitation to come along. He knew the Government knew very well of the work these hospitals were doing. He assured them of the sympathy of the Premier and Mr Dunstan (Minister of Health). He was sorry they had not been able to allot more money to the hospital than they had this year, but he hoped that would be rectified in the future. A grant had been made to other hospitals, but the Beaufort people were the only ones grateful for it. In one case it was said that it was not nearly enough and in the other case they did not get an acknowledgment at all. He thanked them very much for their appreciation of the grant here, and he hoped they would be able to give considerably more next year. He mentioned that two Army sisters would be visiting Beaufort to make an appeal for the nurses' memorial hostel and training centre in Melbourne. They had a project to raise £250,000, and had collected only £100,000. Mr Manifold had asked him if the Beaufort people would like the two sisters to come here, and he had asked the Shire President and Mr Beggs, who assured him they would like them to do so. They would come on Wednesday, 28th April at 2 p.m., as they were speaking at Hamilton that night. He hoped they would come along and hear these two girls, who were real war heroines, and told an interesting story simply and to the point. He was sorry they had a wet afternoon, but wished them the best of luck, and hoped they would get not only the money they anticipated but a good deal more. He had much pleasure in declaring the garden party open. (Applause.)

POST J.O. WOOL MARKETING PROBLEM.

The fourth meeting of the Committee appointed by the Australian Woolgrowers' Council to investigate the problem of Post J.O. Wool Marketing was held in Melbourne from the 1st to the 4th April. The Committee has now prepared an interim report, which will be presented to the Australian Woolgrowers' Council and its affiliated associations for consideration. Mr H. R. Cowdery, chairman of the Woolgrowers' Council and of the Committee, stated that the complexities of the problem called for most careful investigation, and it was the intention of the Committee to hold further meetings in order to hear the views of authorities representing various sections of banking, wool broking and commerce. It was only in this way, stated Mr Cowdery, that the Committee could properly investigate and consider the various methods of wool marketing before embodying its recommendations in a final report.


