#### STOWAWAY GRASS MAKES GOOD.

Accidentally introduced from South Africa, perennial veldt grass may be used extensively for pastures in sheep grazing areas in the south-west of Wes-Australia. Progress of C.S.I.R. experiments to assess the value of this grass are reported in newly-issued Bulletin

Spreading from seeds from fodder supplies imported for the Perth Zoo towards the end century, the grass of the last has spread throughout the Perth metropolitan area and into many country districts in Western Australia. Its high palatability in the green state makes it susceptible to selective overgrazing.

Some strains of this grass are suitable for grazing, others are are not. Its extensive use will depend on the development of more suitable grazing strains and the production of seed of higher fertility than at present available commercially

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
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
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
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
