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Long List of Cases Heard

POLICE COURT

EJECTMENT ORDER
 The application for an ejectment order by R. T. Macdonald against Peter Doull and Mrs Doull was again before the Beaufort Police Court on Monday, which was presided over by Mr Duggan, P.M. Mr Hall (Curwen-Walker, Hall & Samuel Young), asked for an adjournment of the parties. This was granted by the P.M.

LICENSING PROSECUTIONS
 Inspector Jackson proceeded against Sidney Coles, licensee of the Beaufort Hotel, for unlawful disposal of liquor on March 30, and for having a person on his premises unlawfully on that date. Defendant pleaded not guilty to the disposal of liquor charge and guilty to the other.

William Smith was charged with being unlawfully on the premises of the Beaufort Hotel on 30th March. Defendant pleaded guilty.

The cases were defended by Mr Hall (Curwen-Walker, Hall & Samuel Young). F/Const. J. Duke, Beaufort, gave evidence as to the offences. At 12.25 a.m. on the date in question he saw Smith go to the back door of the hotel, knock and call out to the licensee, who opened the door and admitted him. Witness walked to the back door and stood outside. He heard Smith ask the licensee for a bottle of wine or gin. The cupboard door was open and he heard the sound of bottles. Smith asked Cole what he was to pay him, and the licensee said 7/6 and 5/6. After further conversation, the licensee opened the back door and witness walked in. On being questioned, Smith said he got no bottle, and the licensee said he was not making a statement. Witness found a bottle of gin (produced) in Smith's right hand trousers pocket.

To Mr Hall — Smith was wearing an overcoat, and the bottle could have been there without his seeing it. Smith denied getting this bottle of gin from Coles.

Sidney Coles stated in evidence that he refused to give Smith a bottle, and Smith was annoyed with him. Smith asked him how much he owed him, and he said 7/6 and 5/6. He opened the cupboard door to find out how much Smith owed him. The amount was in the cupboard on a piece of paper. He did not know Smith had a bottle at all; Duke searching him and finding it. Smith usually drank shandy, and said he wanted a drink for a friend he had met.

To the P.M. — He kept that brand of gin.

To Mr Hall — He kept other brands as well.

To Inspector Jackson — Smith did not ask him for gin, but for beer. He told the police he did not admit selling gin.

William Smith stated on oath that he got the bottle of gin (produced) on Easter Saturday, and put it under the tank. On the Monday he went down the street and had a few drinks, and his wife said, "Don't take that bottle with you." He took it. That night he met a chap he had not seen since 1929 whose car was standing in front of the Hospital. His friend asked him if he could get a bottle and he said he would try. He went to the Beaufort Hotel. He asked for two bottles of beer, but could not get a drink. He was annoyed, and asked Cole how much he owed him, and Cole opened the cupboard and said 7/6 and 5/6—13/ in all. He said he would fix Coles up during the week. He was just about to go when Duke came in. He told Duke he came to see Coles about going fishing. Duke said he (Smith) had a bottle in his pocket and took it out.

To Mr Hall — Duke did not ask him where he got the bottle.

To Inspector Jackson—When talking to his friend he realised he had a bottle in his pocket. F/Const. Duke was making a mistake. He did not offer his friend a drink of gin, because he seldom drank it himself, and he did not know whether his friend drank gin or not. He did not ask for gin or wine at the hotel, and did not hear bottles rattling there. He did not go to pay money but to get two bottles of beer.

H.E. SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETING

At the Beaufort H.E. School on Monday night, the monthly meeting of the School Committee took place and was presided over by Mr C. V. Wylie (chairman). Four members and the head teacher (Mr C. V. Saunderson) were present.

The chairman said he had seen the shire engineer in regard to proposed work at the school oval.

Correspondence was read from the State Schools' Committees' Association of Victoria, re affiliation. — To lie on table till next meeting.

From Jockey Club, re Park improvement movement. — Received.

From R. C. Guthrie, M.L.A., forwarding letter from Minister of Public Works, stating that contract for £260 had been let for improvements at Beaufort school.

From Education Department, asking that reasons be stated why Mena Park school should be shifted to Beaufort. — Reasons to be given, and the Department asked the reason of delay in shifting the Mt. Rowan school to Beaufort.

From Fern Tree Gully Mothers' Club asking for opinion of sanitary conveniences recently installed. — To be informed that they are not yet in use.

The correspondent (Mr Davey) reported that he had written a letter to the Department, asking if a subsidy was available for milk supply for the children's winter cocoa, and seeking permission to build in a copper.

Applications to cut 15 and 20 tons of wood in school plantation were granted under the usual supervision.

Tenders for the supply of 20 tons of 2 ft. dry firewood for the school were received and left in the hands of the correspondent and chairman to deal with after making enquiries about early delivery.

Mr C. V. Saunderson (head teacher) said the pupils of Lewis House had a dance in the Parish Hall on 12th May, and carried it out splendidly. If all dances were carried out in the same way, there would be no criticism. In April the school held an effort for the Save the Children Fund and obtained the creditable amount of £21 3/3. Miss Guidice ceased duty the week before the vacation and Miss A. M. Carney had commenced duty.

Senior-constable Goddard and Const. Lawrence, of Melbourne, visited the school and gave a talk on Safety First; also showing films in the hall. The children from Main Lead school were to come to Beaufort on the bus. The attendance was 129 in the primary school and 72 in the secondary school. For repairs to school and residence an amount of £23 was available. A contract had been let for replacing bluestone slabs at the school. The pine trees had been taken out in the school ground. He suggested that some pines outside the present fence which were formerly in the school ground, be removed. They should get in touch with the Shire Council about it. They had to get private board for two teachers. He asked the committee to have the basket ball court attended to; a contract having been let some time back to Mr Gillingham.

The chairman said Mr Gillingham had been given the work last July by the committee.

The headmaster said he would interview Mr Gillingham.

The chairman said he was very gratifying to hear the headmaster comment so nicely on the way the school children conducted their dance.

The School Endowment Plantation Trustees met prior to the School Committee meeting.

Insecticides tested include oils of several native plants and the widely publicised DDT.

Field trials in New Guinea supplemented the laboratory tests. Wild female malaria-transmitting mosquitoes were subjected to the most promising sprays in tents and airy huts. A straight pyrethrin and pyrethrin plus DDT spray were normally selected for Army use, both sprays killing all mosquitoes in sprayed habitations.

WAGES AWARDS

SPORTS GROUND MAINTEN-
ANCE WAGES BOARD
DETERMINATION.

This is the first determination of this Wages Board and applies to any person or persons employed in or in connection with the construction, ornamentation, formation, maintenance or keeping in order of grounds or enclosures used in conducting outdoor entertainments, outdoor shows, outdoor sports or outdoor amusements of any kind. The determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria, as from the beginning of the first pay period, to commence on or after 10th June, 1948.

Wages per week of 40 hours.

Foreman who directs the work of leading hands and others, £7 5/; Leading hand, employee in charge of 3 or more employees, £6/17/6; maintenance employees, £6/12/6.

Greenkeeper, £8/5/; Assistant Greenkeeper, £7/7/6; Groundsman, £6/11/; all others, £6/10/.

Curator, i.e., person responsible for the care, alignment, maintenance and satisfactory condition of a playing area or areas, £8/5/; Assistant Curator, £7/7/6; Groundsman, £6/11/; all others, £6/10/.

MEETING OF TOWN BAND COMMITTEE

Under the chairmanship of Mr J. R. Davey (vice-president), the committee of the Beaufort Town Band met at the Shire Hall on Thursday night, 17th June, and 12 members were present.

Correspondence was read from the secretary of the Avoca Town Band, stating that no instruments were for sale. — Received.
A letter was received from G. Barrett, Melbourne, consenting to act as representative of the Beaufort Band on the Victorian Bands' League. — To be appointed, and necessary procedure to be carried out.

The secretary (Mr Latch) reported that a mouthpiece lost by a bandsman at Avoca had been recovered.

The affiliation fee of the Victorian Bands' League (£2/6/) was passed for payment.
The following credit balances were reported:—Instrument Fund, £28; General Fund, £38 5/4.

The annual meeting was fixed for Thursday night, 15th July, on motion of Messrs. Roy Crick and Jack Holdsworth.

It was reported that the eucyre snowball had gone up to £11/8/.

A letter of thanks was received from Bandsman W. J. Irving for a presentation made to him.

Mr R. Saddler (bandmaster) reported that there were small attendances at practices, which was unsatisfactory and discouraging, and they should consider at the annual meeting the best means of carrying the band on.

It might be well if they had a change. Small attendance at practices was characteristic of all country bands.

The chairman said the only reason they had a band in Beaufort was because Mr Saddler was bandmaster.

The secretary said they had gone ahead £83 financially for the year. The band was self-supporting, with the exception of receiving £7 annually from

The president, (Mr J. Duke) arrived at this stage.
It was decided to hold a social evening for bandmen, committeemen, and members of the Ladies' Auxiliary before the annual meeting on Tuesday night, 6th July.

Arrangements were left in the secretary's hands.
The secretary stated that he would not be seeking re-election at the annual meeting, as he was getting a little tired of the work.

The secretary was instructed to apply to a music warehouse for a catalogue.

UNIVERSITY CONSERVATORIUM CONCERT PARTY.

For many years the University Conservatorium has regarded the musical development of the Victorian provincial towns as an obligation. In 1917 steps were taken to inaugurate a scheme, and the principal towns visited. In 1918 under the direction of Mr J. Sutton Crow, 32 concerts were given. Although the concerts failed to attract audiences sufficiently large to pay expenses, the University continued its efforts until 1930, in which year over 100 concerts were given.

In 1931, owing to the financial strain, it was decided to abandon the tours as then conducted and to experiment along other lines. The new plan continued till 1941, when it was temporarily abandoned. As many as 50 towns were visited and 175 concerts given during the year.

On the resumption of the scheme in 1946, it was gratifying to find increased interest evidenced. The formation of music clubs in many centres greatly stimulated development of a musical appreciation.

With the formation of the Council of Adult Education, and the possibility of a considerable expansion of cultural activity in all fields in country districts, the University Conservatorium decided to hand over this carefully fostered work to the Council, believing that it would be possible to continue the touring work.

In taking over the work from the University, the Council of Adult Education is hopeful that with the continued interest and support of the local enthusiasts that development along more expansive lines will be possible. The directional work in connection with these activities will still be carried out by Mr Crow, who now holds office with the Council.

This year it has been possible to include Beaufort in the itinerary, and the Beaufort Music Group have arranged for Mr Crow and a trio of artists—pianist, violinist, and vocalist, to give a recital in the C.W.A. Hall, on Monday, July 5th.
