## NAVARRE FADE IN THIRD QUARTER

### LEXTON FOOTBALL LEAGUE

#### FIRST SEMI-FINAL

#### BEAUFORT DEFEAT NAVARRE

Played under delightful weather conditions at the Landsborough oval on Saturday afternoon, the first semi-final of the Lexton League's competition resulted in a win for Beaufort by the wide margin of 64 points: their opponents (Navarre) tiring in the third term. There was a large attendance of spectators, and three buses and many private cars made the trip from Beaufort. Gate receipts were about £75. As two Navarre men were late, there was some delay in starting.

The central umpire was W. Jackson, the goal umpires Messrs. Westrop and White, and the timekeepers Messrs. A. Dunn and A. Ringin.

#### BEAUFORT'S GOOD START.

There was very little wind blowing when the game commenced, and Beaufort started well with 11 scoring shots to five in the first term. Rattray opened Navarre's account early with a behind, K. Morvell and R. Grant forwarded the ball, and picking it up, Davey had the honour of registering Beaufort's first goal. A free to Morvell gave Beaufort their second goal. Navarre's first sixer was the outcome of a free to B. Philips. Some nice passing by Dean, Grant, and Morvell resulted in Dean goaling for Beaufort. ## HEALTH REPORTS

Several health reports came before the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Monday, Sept. 13. Notices of 12 births in the Shire were received—eight at Beaufort, three at Skipton, and one at North Fitzroy.

From L. E. La Roche, health inspector, approving of application of Mr J. F. Martin, Beaufort, to install septic tank. Approved, on motion of Crs. Buchanan and Watkins.

Dr. J. Blair Donaldson, Skipton, reported for August:—Influenza has been prevalent, with complications in chests and ears. Rheumatic conditions prevalent. Received.

Dr. Gordon Little, Beaufort, reported for July:—No case of notifiable infectious disease was reported during the month. Influenza was prevalent and severe in character; frequent complications of acute serinitis and inflammation of the ears being noted.

## REGULATION OF TRAFFIC.

At the meeting of Ripon Shire Council on Sept. 13, the following letter was discussed:—

From F/Const. J. Duke, Beaufort, suggesting in regard to traffic in Neill St., that slow sign on road near corner Neill and Lawrence Sts. be renewed; that one on State Savings Bank side be brought up on to rise so that it can be seen some distance back; that edge of footpaths be painted for angle parking between Lawrence and Havelock Sts.; that Stop sign be replaced on eastern corner Neill and Lawrence Sts. If these suggestions were carried out, it would greatly assist in the traffic problem in the town.

Cr. Schlicht — Mr Duke mentioned the matter to him.

The engineer — The C.R.B. did not seem inclined to put any more signs on the road. Standardised stop signs should be erected.

Cr. Schlicht — The corner was very dangerous, and people drove straight through. He moved that Mr Duke be asked to carry out the regulation in regard to stopping there, and that standard signs be put on the N. and S. road.

Cr. Buchanan mentioned that he was knocked there the other day.

Cr. Russell seconded the motion, which was carried.

Cr. Kirkpatrick — There should be a 25 m.p.h. speed limit through the town.

Cr. Guthrie — It was discussed in the House and the speed limits were raised. The police did not want any speed limits through townships — the police wanted to stick to the old law of driving in a manner dangerous to the public. They should thank F/const. Duke for his suggestions. He moved to that effect. Seconded by Cr. Russell, and carried.

With the consent of Cr. Schlicht, the suggestion for painting lines in the parking area was included in the motion.

Cr. Schlicht — They should also ask Mr Duke to spend more time on the corner.

## COUNCIL ITEMS

At the Ripon Shire Council meeting on September 13, the following matters were dealt with:

### GENERAL BUSINESS.

Cr. Russell pointed out to the engineer that heavy rain had done a lot of damage in the E.R. and he would like the patching and cleaning of water tables continued throughout the riding. At the other side of Canico Creek and other places, a lot of material had been washed away. Carnham-Trawalla lane needed patrolling, and a culvert west of A. Morcombe's needed doing up.

Cr. Guthrie — The grader had not been in his vicinity for two or three years, and the lane into his bridge required attention. On Bullock Hill road grading was needed and there were several washaways on the new road. The approach to his bridge was also washed away. Cr. Buchanan asked the engineer to look at bad spots round Brewster area. Grading was needed on the back road to Middle Creek railway station before the wheat carting started. The Red Hill, Raglan, needed attention.

Cr. Kirkpatrick — On Whitefield's road there were bad pot-holes and it was in a slippery condition.

The engineer — The road was satisfactory to the house; there might be one or two holes.

Cr. Schlicht said he would like the engineer to do something to the road past Vowles' house to the Trawalla store, on which material had been washed away.

The engineer — It would all be a bad section, but he would take the levels and report if they wished.

In reply to Cr. Schlicht, the engineer said the gravel at Scott's Hill was a difficult material — it had too much coarse stuff in it. He would look into the position.

Cr. Mackinnon — Mr Williams complained of the rubbish tip at Carranballac being full of rabbits.

Cr. Hinton — He had not looked at it recently. They would need to make the netting secure. It was definitely full of rabbits. It would help if people tipped more carefully.

Cr. Wakin — Mr McWaters complained that people were taking material from the side of the road near his place and leaving holes.

The engineer — He knew who was doing it.

It was decided that the secretary write to the two men concerned and ask them to replace the material, on motion of Crs. Schlicht and Kirkpatrick.

Cr. Kirkpatrick — In reference to Skipton Water Supply, a local meeting endorsed the action of the Council. They should ask Hampden Shire to do the work, and thank them for their interest in the matter.

Cr. Hinton — He had a reminder from Cr. Warren, of Hampden Shire, about it. They wanted to know what this shire was doing.

Cr. Kirkpatrick moved that the Council approve the report, and ask the Hampden Shire to carry out the formation of a Water Trust. Seconded by Cr. Guthrie, and carried.

Cr. Russell — They recommended the scheme at a meeting two months ago.

Cr. Hinton — The road to Wongan gate had some bad holes in it.

The engineer — They had asked for an Isolated Settlers' grant for the road.

Cr. Hinton — Mr J. Liston, junr., wanted a culvert put in on an unused road leased by him. The culvert was required outside the gate on the Mt. Emu Rd.

Cr. Schlicht — The Shire would put in at the ratepayer's expense.

President Roddis — Mr McIntyre wanted something done to Trawalla lane. Mr Young wanted something done on his road. Had the engineer done anything in regard to Mr Nice's water supply?

The engineer — The other parties were not interested in the joint scheme.

Cr. Guthrie moved that Mr Nice be permitted to install a mill, subject to there being sufficient water available. Seconded by Cr. Russell, and carried.

### R.V.I.B. AUXILIARY.

At the monthly meeting of the Beaufort R.V.I.B. Auxiliary, held on Thursday afternoon, 16th inst, Miss B. Lewis (president) was in the chair, and 10 members were present. It was decided to hold the annual egg appeal in October. The next meeting is to be held at Mrs Saph's. The secretary (Miss Rodgers) reported that she had had word from the Blind Institute in regard to mats being made by the blind, which would be ready in eight weeks.

### TOPPED MARKET.

At the Ballarat Stock Market on 14th Sept., 99 woolly merino wethers and ewes were sold for Mr W. M. Fay, Erindale, Carranballac. The wethers brought 98/7, topping the market, to 49/7, av. 60/4; ewes 33/10.

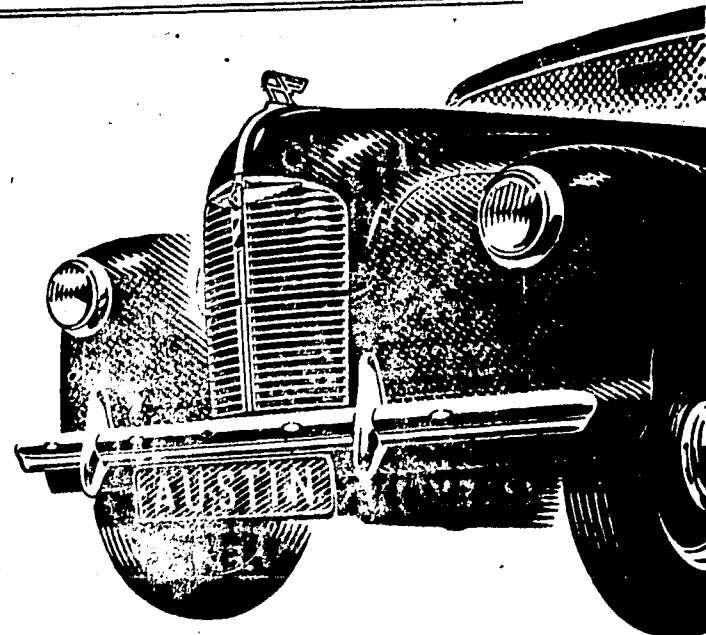
