**CHARGE**

Hamilton Ross, J. P. MacDougall. M.A., and the present minister, Rev. A. T. Cottrell. Assistant ministers in the charge at various times were Rev. F.

A. Hagenauer, M.A., Mr Robt.
Thompson, Rev. J. P. Hamilton, and Rev. T. Menzies-Miller.
