VALEDICTORY

PRESENTATIONS TO REV. FATHER JOHN DAY.

To show their appreciation of the great work in the Parish of the Rev. Father John Day, who has been transferred from Ararat to Horsham, Beaufort and Buangor Catholics gathered in force on Thursday night, 27th Jan., at St. John's Tennis Club pavilion, Beaufort, and made presentations to the reverend gentleman. During the evening a recitation was given by Mr John Wood and a violin solo by Miss Brennan.

A letter of apology and good wishes was received from Miss Cushing, Mr Peter Cushing, and Mr and Mrs Chas. Cushing, who were away from the district. Mr E. Hunt also sent an apology.

Mr C. M. Flynn, who acted as chairman, said the reason they were here was to say thank you to Father Day for all he had done for Beaufort. A number of Buangor and Middle Creek people had come for the same purpose. During all the years he (Mr Flynn) had been in Beaufort, he had never seen the congregation so enthusiastic as when they asked him to try and persuade Father Day to come here tonight and give them an evening. They would never forget the work Father Day had done since he had been here. As far as their spiritual and material welfare were concerned, he did not think they had ever been better looked after. They wished him everything that was good. He asked Father Day to accept a little token of their esteem, which would be of general utility, last a long time, and serve to remind him of his Beaufort friends.

Miss Mary Wood, in a neat speech, made a presentation of a clock to Father Day from St. John's Tennis Club.

Mr W. Surridge, on behalf of the Buangor congregation, expressed the sincere gratitude felt for all Father Day had done for them during the years he had been here, and the way he had carried out his duties. He challenged anyone to point to any of Father Day's obligations that were unfulfilled. They owed him a debt of gratitude. He referred to the part taken by Father Day in regard to the Communion Breakfasts.

Mr J. Jess, junr., in supporting Mr Surridge, said they had become very attached to Father Day, and he looked on him as one of his closest friends. He hoped that some day he would be Dean Day. He made a presentation to Father Day from the parishioners of Buangor.

Mr W. Lynch (Beaufort) said they would miss Father Day greatly. They knew the responsibilities he had had in the Ararat Parish since the death of the Dean. They wished Father Day every success and happiness in the future.

Rev. Father Day, in response, said this was quite an experience in his life. He had only been at two other places, and left both the day after he got the letter about his transfer. Although he was departing from Beaufort, he would leave something behind—a bit of his heart. He had been in the Parish 11 years, and in everything he wanted, he got 100 per cent. co-operation of the people behind him. They had encouraged him in every way. He had tried to identify himself with themselves and make himself one of themselves. It took a long time to get to know him. He had tried to unite them, never to divide them. He had tried to be a good townsman at Beaufort and Ararat. He realised that although they had to go by different routes they were always heading in the one direction. He always got on well with the townspeople at Beaufort, whether they came up the hill on Sunday or went elsewhere. He had created almost a sensation when he appeared at the welcome to Mr Bunn. If he did not co-operate with other denominations, he thought he was not doing his duty as a Catholic. Last Sunday Beaufort and Buangor united as one Church to do honour to Christ, the King. They came not to do honour to himself, but to their leader, Christ. As long as they realised that Christ was

Arrival of Dean Timmons

The Ararat "Advertiser" of Feb. 1 publishes a full report of the reception tendered in St. Mary's Hall on Friday night, 28th Jan., to Dean Timmons on his arrival from Mildura to take charge of the Ararat Parish, and a farewell to the Rev. Fathers J. Day and Russell, who have been transferred elsewhere.

The hall was filled to overflowing, and among those present were Rev. Father Brophy, of Stawell, clergy of other churches of the town and civic representatives.

Mr C. Flynn, of Waterloo, said he was very pleased to join in the welcome on behalf of the Catholic community of Beaufort district and to congratulate Dean Timmons on his well-deserved promotion. Beaufort had very pleasant recollections of his sojourn there many years ago, something like 30 years, and he assured the Dean that churchmen and churchwomen there would do everything in their power to assist him and the priest he sent to minister to them. He understood it would be Father Callaghan, of whom they also had kindly memories.

Mr E. A. Fay, of Middle Creek, as the representative of Buangor parishioners, said he was delighted to be associated with the night's gathering. Dean Timmons was no stranger to Buangor and all agreed that the Bishop had made a very good choice when he appointed him to this parish. Mr Fay added that he believed that the parish priests and all the clergy had a very great responsibility at the present. Everyone knew what was going on in other parts of the world, and even in Australia Communism was spreading. He supposed the greatest enemy Communism had was the Catholic Church. They were living in troublous times. In Australia they were blessed with the guidance of the Church and there never was a time when strong men were more urgently required. On behalf of Middle Creek and Buangor parishioners he extended a hearty welcome to Dean Timmons.

Other speakers were Dr. E. J. Claridge, Mr P. Joyce, Mr M. Joyce, Rev. Father Brophy, Rev. L. M. Howell (Church of England), Rev. H. H. Kettle (Methodist Church), the Mayor (Cr. D. Montgomery).

In the course of his response, Dean Timmons referred in a reminiscent strain to his former associations with Ararat Parish. He realised that he had a very difficult task before him to follow in the footsteps of his predecessors, the late Dean O'Hare and the late Monsignor Goldanich. He did not think there was a country church in Victoria to compare with the Catholic Church in Ararat. He hoped to have happy associations with the clergy of other churches in the town, and it would be his policy always to be on friendly terms with the clergy and people of other denominations.

Presentations were made to Rev. Fathers Day and Russell by Mr J. E. Briggs in a eulogistic speech, whose remarks were supported by Cr. Montgomery, Cr. F. H. de Crespigny, and Mr C. Flynn. The latter said that at Beaufort they had always got on very well with Father Day and he was pleased to endorse all that had been said of his energy, enthusiasm and organising ability.

Mr P. Joyce added that the Willaura, Rossbridge and Moyston people were equally sorry to lose Father Russell and were grateful for his leadership and for his kindness in time of trouble.

Rev. Fathers Day and Russell suitably responded.

BUSH FIRES

Last week a fire started in the bush near the old Shirley road, after a train passed.

On Saturday Mr T. Lewis, of Beaufort, noticed another fire start after a train passed in the ram paddock of Mr W. G. Egges property on the Eurambien-Streatham road. He put it out with a bag when it had covered about four acres, and hurried to Beaufort in his truck. The Rural Brigade's motor pump then went out and extinguished the smouldering grass and fencing.

The Beaufort Rural Brigade was called to two fires on Monday (Foundation Day). One was at Amphitheatre, and the other on Mr N. Smith's property at Trawalla. The latter swept about 12 acres and destroyed a travelling house near the old mine, and some fencing.

During the last two weeks of January the Beaufort Rural Fire Brigade has been called out to one large and six small outbreaks of fire, all of which have been on land adjoining the railway line. The suspicion that these fires have been lit by cinders or sparks from railway engines has been strengthened by two eye witnesses seeing the blaze start immediately in the wake of a train. In the case of one on Eurambien East on Saturday, 29th Jan., the fire was seen to start by Mr T. R. C. Lewis, whose work in fighting it for half-an-hour single handed cannot be too highly praised, as there is little doubt that a very serious fire was prevented by his tenacity. The attention of the Railways Department has been officially directed to these occurrences by the Fire Authority, through officers of the local brigade, and it is hoped that remedies will be applied to prevent any repetition of this worry to landholders.

By Dr. G. L. WOOD, Professor of Commerce, University of Melbourne

The problem of every man and every country today is rising prices, which is the same thing as falling purchasing power. Along with that, the current fears that the wave of inflation is about to break and depression and unemployment will follow. Employers, employees, trade union leaders, Government Treasurers, social workers fear the thought, but from the way that some people talk, it might be supposed that a slump would be a perfect cure for the evils of wartime means. They point to "war, boom and bust" as the sequence of the past, and convince themselves it must be the outline of the immediate future too. "The business cycle is running true to form," "this delictious prosperity must end some time," "a collapse is inevitable"—thus go the forecasts, and the forecasters remain unaware that economic and monetary planning against depression has made "strides since the 'dirty thirties'."
