

Inflation, and the suffering and disruption that it brings, are the products of over-spending. The chief forms of spending are expenditures on exports, by Governments, private investment, and consumption. To avoid inflation in Australia in the near future, some or all of these forms of expenditure must be reduced.

It might be possible to reduce exports by a system of Government licensing, but such a solution would not only be hard on Australian exporters, it would add to the greater burdens of the United Kingdom and Western Europe. Another possibility would be to maintain the physical volume of exports, while paying a lower price in Australian pounds through a Government export monopoly, which would hold its profits in reserve to keep prices up in case of depression. 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

Where does the bottle of medi cine, free or otherwise, come into this? Well, it comes in where i belongs, at the end of these es sentials, under the heading of treatment, and you will notice that it has a qualification attached to it; that is, that it should b the best possible available treat-

At least 95 per cent of the edical profession are convinced that the formulary or list of prescriptions from which Free Med licine is to be prescribed, is so far from providing the best in the way of medicine, that they have steadfastly refused to use it despite increasing tirades of abuse from individuals who, while they may or may not be good politicians, are certainly too unpalanced to be good doctors. PALES AND SERVICE AGENTS detail, some of the more obvious objections to the formulary are

> IT IS INADEQUATE: Many doctors say grossly so.
> IT IS INELASTIC: Variations in age, sex and weight demand same drug. This is well-nigh imessible within the rigid confines of the formulary. IT IS OUT OF DATE, and will always be out of date. For example: Medical research has evolved different types of sulpha drugs, and penicillins, which in rtain selected cases are of out standing value. These are not t the formulary. It may be argued that they will be; but the Government departments are not exlactly Phar Laps, and your illness

may be faster than the Govern-

ment tread. IT IS UNECONOMIC: Only very limited amounts of free medicine may be prescribed is necessary for the patient t report for examination, and fresh prescriptions (in duplicate) to btain a further supply even BALLARAT he lives many miles away from his doctor. Incidentally it may be pointed out here that comrcially minded doctors might be expected to welcome all these five per cent of them, however, do not seem to; but that perhaps is because doctors are notoriously uch poor business men.

No doubt it has been asked, and will be asked, why doctors will not use the formulary to supply the medicines that it is capable supplying, and why they do not prescribe in the usual way only drugs which are not included in its scope. That is a reasonable question; but it is simply answered. The medical profes sion feel that they are the best judges of the medical needs of their patients. Why should they. as custodians of the health the community, be satisfied with a second best? All they ask for is the right to prescribe freely and without bias what they think is best for the individual patient and his particular illness. If free, so much the better. Why should not the best be supplied free, instead of the second best? BLACK SPOT OF THE UDDER. Black spot is an infectious condition, occurring on the teats of cows, frequently around the orifice. From here it may spread over the udder and sometimes extend over the under surface of the abdomen. It usually infects the cow before calving, and when milk secretion commences, a dark-coloured scab appears which often blocks the teat opening. The teats are painful to handle, and as the scab may have to be removed before each milking, the raw surface is likely to become infected with other organisms and the infected area extend up to the teat canal, possibly causing mastitis. Unless care is exercised the disease may spread from cow to cow, rendering many useless for milking. In any case, milk from such cows is unfit for hu-

Commenting the trouble, Mr H. Tucker B.V.Sc.. Veterinary Officer of the Victorian Department of Agculture, states that where the there may be serious generalised reactions, and portions of infected skin may swell and slough. To prevent this condition developing says Mr Tucker, the teats should immersed daily in a solution sodium hypochlorite (two tablespoonfuls to four gallons of water) for a fortnight before calving. When ulcers appear, fo ment with a hot solution of permaganate of potash, gently remove some of the scabs, thor oughly dry the parts and aply to the affected surface acriflaving or monacrin ointment, either of which may be obtained from
