(ii) By completing a Declaration of Usage Form (D.U.1 Form) and forwarding it to the appropriate State Liquid Fuel Control Boord before the 1st December, 1949. D.U.1 Forms are available at all ration ticket issuing Post Offices and Liquid Fuel Control Board offices. NOTE: Pajiure to complete the Declaration of Usage Form may result in the consumer's license being cancelled or subject the licenses so a heavy penalty.

The ration ticket issuing office will cancel out the appropriate monthly squares on the back of the ligence and place an issuing office tamp on the top left hand corner of the vehicle registration certificate. NEW CONSUMER'S LICENCE

A new consumer's licence will be required by any person who -
(a) Has lost or destroyed the old consumer's licence;

(b) Is using a motor vehicle or plant for which he did not previously hold a consumer's licence;

(c) Helds an old consumer's licence but who has, since the fith June, 1949, changed his vehicle, his occupation, or the purpose rely which the vehicle is used.

Application forms (C,O,B.) to obtain a new licence are available at all ration ticket issuing Post Offices and Liquid Puel Control Board offices. offices.

Having obtained a new consumer's licence the holder may obtain petrol ration tickets by presenting the licence, together with the realistration certificate of any road vehicle to which the licence teters, at the ration ticket issuing centre nominated on the licence on and after the 7th November, 1949.

RETAILERS

A motor spirit retailer must be in possession of a Motor Spirit Retailer's Licence issued by a Liquid fuel Control Board.

A MOTOR SPIRIT RETAILER WILL NOT RECEIVE ANY DELIA MOTOR SPIRIT WITHOUT THE SURRENDER OF RATION TICKETS ON OR AFTER THE 15th NOVEMBER, 1949.

The Regulations require each Motor Spirit Retailer to retain between the 8th November, 1949, and 14th November, 1949, insulative, sufficient motor spirit so that he will have in stack at commencement of business on the 15th November, 1949, a quantity of motor spirit spirit each death of the spirit spirit

NOTE: failure to comply with those requirements may subject the retailer to a heavy possity and result in the retailer being unable to carry on his business of retailing motor spirit. DECLARATION OF STOCKS HELD Any person who at midnight on 14th November, 1949, is the owner or has in his possession, custody or control metor spirit in excess of 20 imperial gailons (excluding any motor spirit in the tonk of any vehicle or engine) shall on or before the 1st December, 1949, furnish to the Liquid Fuel Control Board in the State where he resides or carries on business e return on Form S.D.1, copies of which are obtainable at any ration ticket issuing Post Office and Liquid Fuel Control Board office.

(This Order shall not apply to any Bulk Supplier or Retailer of Motor Spirit in respect of motor spirit owned by him and held in his possession, custody or control in the course of his business as a bulk supplier or retailer.)

A person required to furnish a return of stocks held shall not without the consent in writing of a Liquid Fuel Control Board remove, sell, dispose of or use or permit the removal, sale, disposal or use of any motor spirit which is owned by him or is in his possession, exactly or control on the prescribed date in excess of 20 imperial gallons, other than motor spirit in the tank of any vehicle or engine.

General 1. When applying for retion tickets, the consumer's ticence should be presented to the Post Office or Issuing Office indicated on the licence.

2. A person disposing of a vehicle with a private consumer's licence (Class 2) must deliver to the new owner any unused current ration tickets issued in respect of the vehicle. A second issue for the period will find to made. In the case of all other licences a person disposing of a vehicle must return his licence with all unused ration tickets issued in respect of that vehicle to the Liquid Fuel Control Board.


