

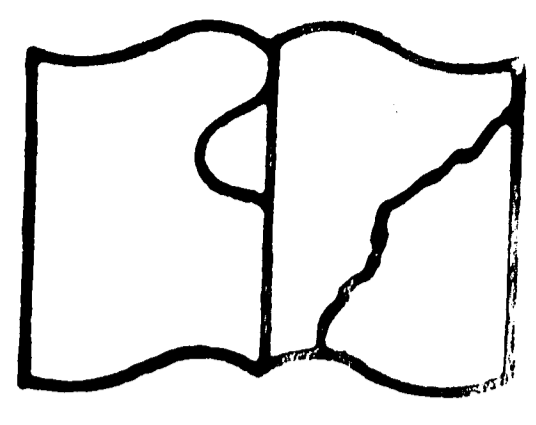

This year has proved a very successful one, considering the number of girls we have in our Set.

### FIRE SCHOOL AT BEAUFORT

**DISAPPOINTING ATTENDANCE**  
Arranged through the co-operation of the Regional Officer of the Country Fire Authority and the District Forest Officer, Mr C. V. Wyllie, a school of instruction for officers and men of district Rural Fire Brigades and Forestry Officers and a demonstration of fire fighting equipment was held at Beaufort Park on October 27th.

There was a disappointing attendance; only a few local brigades being represented.

Cr. L. G. Weatherley, of Streatham, acted as chairman and introduced the speakers. Regional Officer Oldham, of Jeparit, lectured on Fire Prevention and Suppression.

Mr C. V. Wyllie explained the set-up for fighting and prevention of fire in the Beaufort forest region. He said that the Forestry Commission had concrete tanks, each holding 8000 gals. at half-mile intervals right through the forest. All these tanks could be connected by the pumps at the disposal of the forestry men. Roads were being built which would enable the motor transport to pass right through the forests, and every employee was instructed in the necessity of exercising every care in the use of inflammable materials.

Chief-Mechanic W. Titheridge, of the C.F.A., gave some hints on the care and maintenance of fire-fighting equipment, laying particular emphasis on the need for running all engines and pumps at frequent intervals during the safe periods.

A very interesting demonstration of power pumps was then given. The C.F.A. exhibited and demonstrated the Mark 25 Gacos portable pump, and the same type of pump mounted on an Austin truck. This truck is to be stationed at Ballarat, and will be used to replace any truck in the region out of commission and as a reserve in case of fire.

The Forestry Commission exhibited the Beresford trailer pump, which has a 3 1/2 inch suction and a 2 1/2 inch delivery hose, and is capable of pumping water at great pressure up to 2 miles. This type could be located at a dam or spring and would pump to any temporary storage.

A Pacific Marine portable type could be carried by two men and was very useful in getting into almost inaccessible places. This was a high revolution engine, developing 9 h.p. at 3600 revolutions, and developed great water pressure with a small nozzle and branch hoses.

A portable hand operated plunger pump was demonstrated also, and would be a useful pump to carry on a truck in the event of a breakdown in the power pump.

Another useful article shown was a hoe manufactured from mower blades, and fitted with a handle, which could be used either as a hoe or a rake.

Cr. A. Vanstan, of Ararat, on behalf of the officers and men present, thanked Mr Wyllie and the Forestry Commission employees and Mr Schreeman, Regional Officer of the C.F.A., and lecturers, for their instruction and interesting demonstration.

This horse was a winner at the recent Melbourne Royal Show and secured the maximum points for pace and manners in the "Garry Owen."

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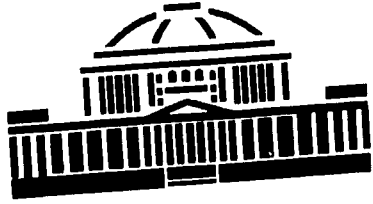

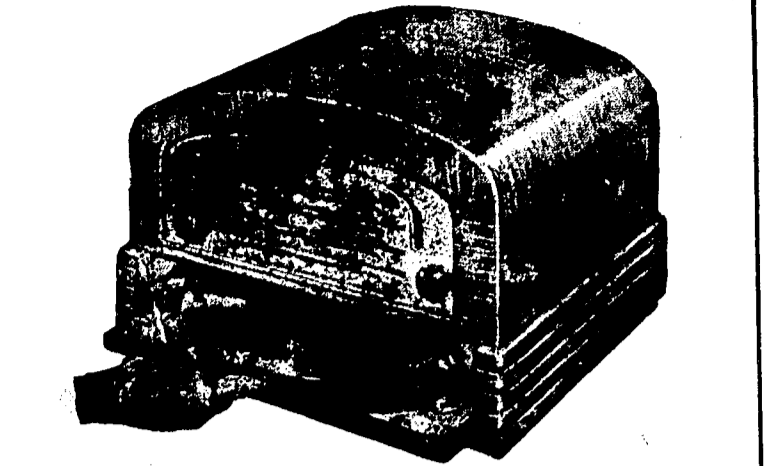

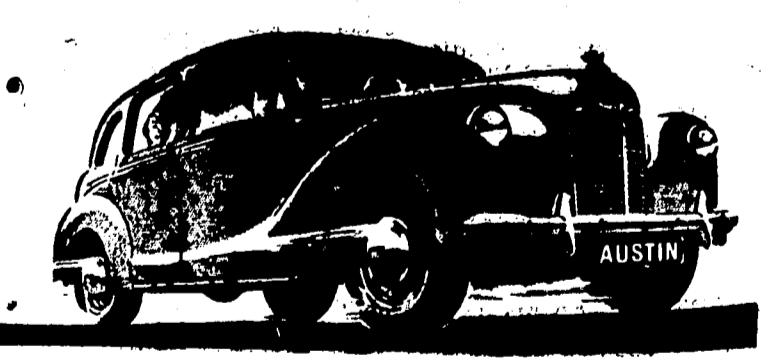

Power, President, routine correspondence was dealt with, and accounts amounting to £2/15/8 passed for payment. The campaign for the Federal elections on Decr. 10 was discussed. ADDRESS BY MR STACPOOLE. Mr H. Stacpoole, endorsed Labor candidate for Corangamite, delivered an address, in the course of which he said that the people would be asked to judge the Labour Government, not on rash promises of better things to come, but on its administration and sound administration over the past seven years of war and peace. Mr Stacpoole went on to mention that prosperity had come to the farmers generally as a result of Labour's sympathetic attitude in handling the problems which confronted them. The man on the land, and pointed out that the prosperity of the farmer depended to the greatest extent on the purchasing power of the wage earners, who were the greatest consumers of farm products. If the wage earners were put down, it would be only natural that the farmers would be forced down too. The speaker said that as far as the country was concerned, Communism was on the way out. It could not thrive in a healthy, happy community where people had all that they needed and the right to live as they wanted; but give them the shadow of insecurity and the threat of unemployment and want in a land of plenty, and then watch the resentment that bred the germs of Communism. A vote of thanks was carried by acclamation, on motion of Messrs Charles and Herbert. It was decided to purchase several hundreds of copies of Labour pamphlets for distribution during the campaign, on motion of Messrs. Doull and Ralph. (E. Power, Neill St., Beaufort).

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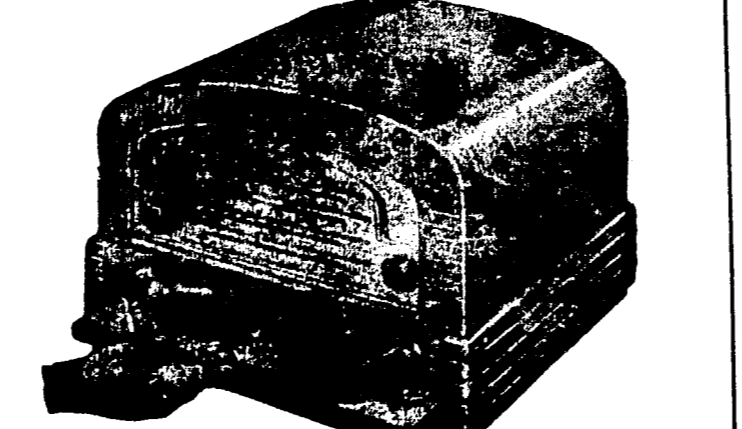

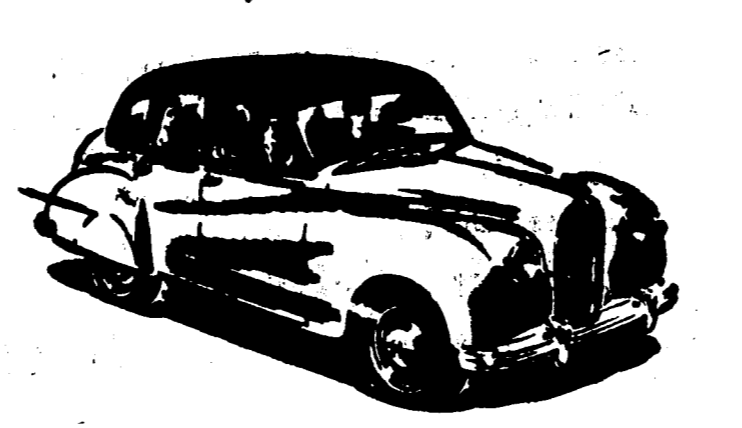

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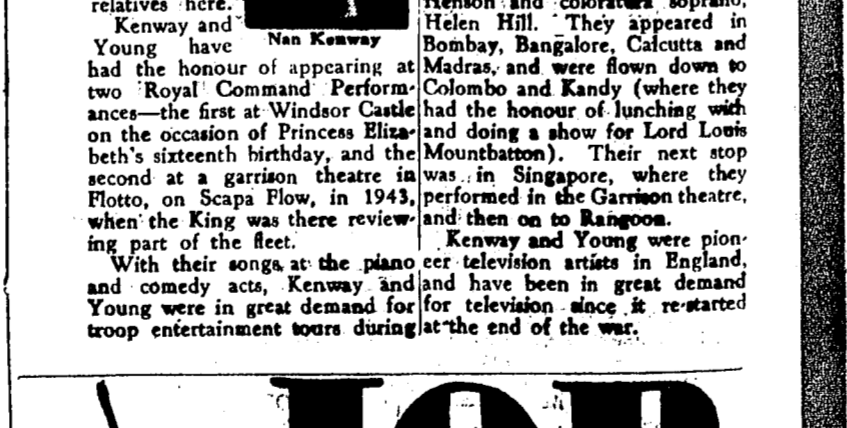
