POSTING OF CHRISTMAS GIFTS AND GREETINGS.

EED FOR EARLY POSTING STRESSED. The period of the year is ap-

proaching when the Post Office will be called upon to handle the additional millions of postal articles comprising Christmas gifts and greetings. Last year nearly 33,000,000 such articles were duly disposed of in the 12-day period preceding Christmas, and it i probable that this figure will be exceeded during the coming season the Deputy Director, Posts and Telegraphs, Mr S. Marks, states, and has offered the following suggestions:—

1. Post gifts and greetings early and progressively, and not later than 18th Decr., 1949. 2. Be sure to address each article clearly and fully

3. Pack all gifts in such a manner as to prevent them being damaged, and if the tie-on address labels are used, write the address on the wrapping too. State the sender's name and address, preceded by the word

4. The postage rate for Christmas cards, posted in unsealed envelopes is 11d each, provided not more than five words of greetings are written on the card.

GENERAL SERVICE BADGES. General service badges will be issued to all men and women who served in the Defence Forces during the War for 28 days or more but were not entitled to the returned from active service badge. The badge for ex-service women can be worn as a brooch Applications for badges are to be forwarded to Issuing Authorities, Victoria Barracks, giving service number and full name and address.
