Cobden Axeman Wins All Big Events

LEGION SPORTS

ANOTHER GREAT SUCCESS SCORED.

The Beaufort Sub-branch of the Australian Legion of Ex-Service-men and Women scored another outstanding success at their second annual Axemen's Carnival and sports meeting at the local Park on Monday (Australia Day). The weather was decidedly warm and there was an attendance of more than 1000 district residents and visitors from various parts of Victoria and South Australia. Gate receipts totalled £120/10/1, compared with £120 last year.

With a prize list of £300 and trophies, the meeting attracted competitors from all parts of Victoria, and some from South Australia. The systematic way in which the meeting was run reflected the highest credit on the organisers, and won the approval of visiting axemen. A truck removed the chips after each event, and the cycle track was watered several times during the meeting. Events were got off well up to schedule time, and the big programme of 47 events concluded at about 8 p.m.

Great appreciation was expressed of the generous hospitality extended by members of the Legion Committee to visiting axemen, which they said was something that would be remembered for years to come. One of the highlights of the meeting was the splendid exhibition given by H. J. Crawford, a Noojee axeman 63 years of age, who won the second semi-final of the £100 Underhand Chop in great style. The Victorian champion, J. O'Toole, who finished second off a handicap of 2 sec. on in the first semi-final of the £50 Standing Block Chop, cut his 37 in. log in 23 sec.

The most successful competitor for the day was A. Matheson, of Cobden, who won the £100 Underhand Chop, the £50 Standing Block Chop, and the Victorian 40-in. Underhand Championship—a truly remarkable triple performance.

A noteworthy feature of the sport of woodchopping is the proportion of axemen who cut well even in their sixties, and H. Crawford and A. A. Brown, two veteran competitors on Monday, come under that category.

There were three minor falls in the cycle races, and in the second heat of the Beaufort P.C.C. 2-mile event, A. Hornbuckle, of Beaufort, received a probable fracture of the collarbone, which was also split.

Bookmakers were present, and a fair amount of betting was done.

During the afternoon a grass fire broke out on the western part of the ground, just outside the arena, but was extinguished by bystanders before the truck equipped with a water tank arrived to make it safe.

The publican's booth was in charge of Mr Flynn, of Streatham, the soft drinks, ice cream, and fruit booth was conducted by Mr K. Whitaker, and at the luncheon booth members of the Legion Women's Auxiliary provided dinner and afternoon tea for officials and public.

The Beaufort Town Band, under Mr R. Saddleir, enlivened the proceedings with a programme of music.

Mr David Wyllie was in charge of the sound system, and kept the public well posted with results of events. Mr A. A. Brown, of Oakleigh, also gave a very helpful and informative commentary in regard to the performances and calibre of individual axemen, just prior to the semi-finals and finals of the big woodchopping events.

Senior-Const. A. McIntosh and F/Const. J. Duke were on duty at the sports, and had no trouble in preserving order.

At the close of the day's events the wood and chips left over were auctioned, and Mr E. Gillingham bought them for £4/10/.

The members of committee had a hectic couple of days preparing for the meeting, and much of the success achieved is due to their enthusiastic efforts. It is doubtful whether any local organisation has ever had a better band of workers.

The officials were under the capable leadership of Mr Basil Nell (president), with Mr E. C. Day as secretary, and Mr Eric Westin as assistant-secretary. They carried out their duties with method and courtesy. Mr Astbury, of Avoca, discharged a big job as starter of the woodchops very efficiently, with Mr J. Challis, of Ballarat, as check starter and timekeeper. The woodchopping judges, Messrs. W. Anderson, F. Joseph, and C. V. Wyllie, had a busy day. Among the visitors was Mr J. Dalton, handicapper and secretary of the South Australian Axemen's Association. C. Sawyer won the £30 Novice Chop by a blow. J. Westin had an easy win in the Beaufort P.C.C. Mile Cycling Handicap. The winner of the £100 Underhand Chop, A. Matheson, had three blows to spare at the finish. K. Torney had a victory by a length in the Beaufort P.C.C. 2-mile Cycling Handicap. The £50 Standing Block Chop resulted in a win for A. Matheson by a blow. L. Dick got home first by half-a-wheel in the Open Professional Half-mile Cycle race. A Dickman won the 75 yds. Sprint by inches. The winner of the £20 Sheffield Handicap, N. Day, was half-a-yard to the good at the finish. L. Dick carried off the honours in the Open Professional £15 Mile Cycle Race, with a length to spare. N. Lamb, with a length up his sleeve, was the winner of the A.N.A. 3-mile Scratch Cycle Race. There was a field of six in the 40-inch Underhand Championship of Victoria, and the title went to A. Matheson, who won by a blow. The Tree-felling Exhibition was easily won by J. O'Toole. The Ladies' Woodchop resulted in an easy win for Mrs M. Searle, of Ballarat.

PRESENTATION OF TROPHIES.
Mr B. Nell (president) heartily thanked the competitors and public for their patronage. Mr A. E. Crick, in presenting A. Matheson, winner of the three big woodchopping events, with a blue ribbon donated by Mr W. Day, a gold medal donated by himself, and three axes donated by the Plumb and Hytest companies, said it gave him great pleasure to hand over these trophies and congratulate him. With the three axes he would be able to chop all the wood about the place. He commended him for his wonderful performance, and sincerely hoped he would live a long time to win many more championships. (Applause). In returning thanks, Mr Matheson said this was the first championship he had ever won, and he hoped to win more.

Mr Nell presented Mr N. A. Mead's trophy to N. Day, the Sheffield winner, with a few congratulatory remarks, and the recipient suitably responded.

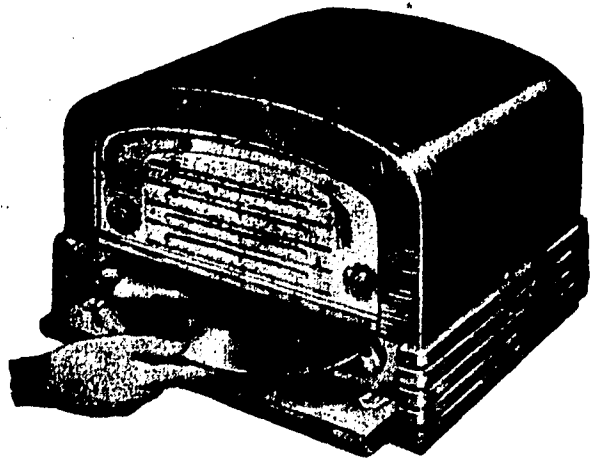
