Report of engineer re Jackson's reservoir was received. Estimate of i receipts and expenditure for Shire of Ripon Water Suply district for 1949-50 was adopted. This includes increase in the rate from 1/8 in £ to 2/ in £; increase in minimum charge from £1/11/8 to £1/17/, and rate on vacant allotment from 13/4 to 16/. Pipe line consumers to pay a minimum of £2/14/ for 54,000 gal. per annum. The estimated overdraft at 30/9/50 would be £305, and it was decided to request the State Rivers Commission to allow this, as it

was anticipated this would be liquidated during the year 1950-51.



1. Portion of the Beaufort-Elmhurst Road is being surfaced. Received 2. It is intended to clean up the Beaufort Rubbish Tip as much as

The engineer said it was awk ward that there was no up-todate plan of alterations to the Beaufort water supply. He did not see any way to alleviate the position other than by replacing mains needed, and metering the town. They could not get pipes for four or five years. — Deferred ll next meeting.

5. It is recommended that the Fown and Country Planning Board be requested to visit Beauort and discuss the advisability of a plan for an enlarged township area.

visit would be very valuable. He would notify the three E.R. members. Cr. Russell - He would also like the visiting engineer to advise them on Dawson's dam as an auxiliary scheme. The Council should do all they could to supply people with water who wanted to come on and pay for it. Did the engineer think it would be of use to take the surface off the Snake Valley reservoir and clean the perforations on the arm, which would give more pressure? The engineer - It could be done with the loan of Cr. Russell's boat. Cr Russell moved that sufficient piping be ordered for the two new applicants, Seconded by Cr. Roddis, and carried. Cr. Roddis The position was that although there was 13 ft. of water in the reservoir, the pressure could be stopped with the hand, and the pipes had not been cleaned for 19 years, and they were told they would not stand another cleaning. The two who had applied for water had no possible chance of getting it in hot weather. He was afraid in two years the mains would be blocked up altogether. The engineer - They would not order the mains, as they had not the money. Cr. Roddis - He was worried about the deposit in the reservoir, which was actually blocking up the hoses.
