#### THE DAIRY FARM WATER SUPPLY.

Impure water used for cleaning dairy farm equipment is a common cause of inferior cream. On many dairy farms the water supply for cleansing purposes is obtained from irrigation channels, unfenced dams to which stock have access, or underground and surface tanks filled from the roofs of farm buildings. The guttering of these sheds is

often closed up with dirt, manure. dead birds or other infectious substances. Dairying officers of the Victorian Department of Agrculture strongly recommend boiling or chlorinating such water before use. Impure drinking water for dairy

cows is another frequent cause of faulty cream. The cows, wading in polluted swamps, bogs, or stagnant waterholes, become contaminated with slime-producing organisms which enter the milk while it is being drawn from the

LIME IN DROUGHT FEEDING OF SHEEP. The importance of lime supple-

ments when cereal grain mixtures are used for the drought feeding of sheep is stressed in C.S.I.R.O. Bulletin No. 24. The publication describes detailed research on the effect of cereal diets, which have relatively high phosphorous and low calcium content, on sheep under Australian conditions.

Young sheep or weaners fed on hese relatively calcium-deficient rations fail to develop normally. Their growth is stunted, their teeth do not form properly, and they may suffer heavy mortality. Adult sheep may also be affected adversely, particularly lactating

Untoward results are likely to occur when grain or grain byproducts form a large part of the ration for long periods. The detailed studies show that

the addition of calcium-rich foodstuffs such as leguminous hay or chaff, or a mineral supplement such as finely ground limestone, allows normal development to take place and restores normal mineral metabolism.

The effect of exercise is important. Sheep suffering from relatvely low calcium intake may show no outward symptoms when resting, but even moderate exercise can cause collapse.
