SCHOOL COMMITTEE MONTHLY MEETING.

The May meeting of the Beaufort School Committee, attended by six members and presided over by Mr C. V. Wyllie (chairman), took place at the H.E. School on Monday night. Mr C. V. Saunder (head teacher) was also present.

A discussion took place in regard to control of the children's playground (the old show grounds) and the possibility of setting aside portion as a site for a pre-fabricated house for teachers, and it was resolved to write to the Shire Council in regard to the matter.

The balance-sheet for the past year, showing a Cr. balance of £21, was adopted, on motion of Messrs. Q. Gregory and Arthur Crick.

Correspondence was read from the Beaufort Mothers' Club in regard to supplying cocoa for school children, which would cost £3 a week, and the income from the envelope system was not bringing in 70 per cent. of the cost. — The Head Teacher said the Teachers' Union in Melbourne would have nothing to do with a subsidy unless the milk was bottled and pasteurized. On the motion of Dr. G. Little and Mr A. Crick, it was decided to apply to the Department for a subsidy for milk and cocoa. The head teacher said he advocated the distribution of the cocoa at midday to obviate waste and provide for those who had lunch at school.

The matter of a donation by the committee towards the cocoa was deferred.

From Education Department, stating that the Public Works Department had been authorised to proceed with the installation of the septic tank system at the Beaufort School. — Received.

From Education Department, stating that Public Works Department had been asked to furnish estimates for the erection of a shelter shed at the school, and for painting, etc., at the teacher's residence. — Received.

An account for £10/10/ (cost of memorial plaque) was passed for payment to Mr Proctor.

The head teacher (Mr Saunder) reported in regard to shelter shed and septic tanks. Mr Gillingham's work in the ground had been delayed by rain. The lower playground would be repaired under the works and building grant, at a cost of £4. In regard to the power point he had arranged for Mr Hall to put it in. An urn had been purchased and the teacher's room renovated, but it was still waiting for the power point. Miss Poland had commenced permanent duty, and Miss Simms was away on sick leave. The health inspector required information in regard to immunization of children against diphtheria. He had suggested to the Mothers' Club that they meet on the Friday before the School Committee meeting. He also read correspondence in regard to English classes for displaced persons, and asking if any of the staff would act as teachers. The attendance figures for the school were:—Secondary, 74; primary, 157; total, 231. — Expenditure of £4 on lower playground approved.

The head teacher promised to bring up any works required for next meeting.

It was understood that 16 displaced persons were willing to attend classes in English.

On the motion of Mr Gregory and Mrs M. Watkin, it was decided to apply to the Education Department for erection of a pre-fabricated house on portion of the old showgrounds-site as a residence for teachers.

Mr Stowell referred to Mr Muntz's report on the levels of the school oval.

In reply to the head teacher, Mr Stowell said there was no mention in the report of the cost of sheds.

Mr Muntz is to be again approached in regard to the matter. The type of building required was discussed; one similar to that at the Swimming baths being favoured.

BEAUFORT EXTENDS NAVARRE

NOTES ON THE GAME.

Spectators gathered in force at the Beaufort oval on Saturday in anticipation of a good game between the locals and Navarre, and they were not disappointed. Although Navarre won by 19 points, the result was in doubt till the last quarter was well advanced. Umpire Spencer had charge of the whistle, and the goal umpires were F. Topp and N. Raeburn, the boundary umpires G. Grant and G. Parry, and the timekeepers W. Glenister and Bibby.

Tallies were fairly even in the first term, when Navarre scored 4.2 to 3.3. Playing his first game for the season for Beaufort, F. Allen bagged a couple of goals at the expense of less experienced players. Morris and K. Broadbent were often prominent. R. Driscoll and K. Parry did a lot of work for Navarre, and Laurie Hannett was a tower of strength to them. W. Rattray struck his old form to account for eight goals before the match finished.

Navarre added 4.3 in the second quarter to Beaufort's two goals straight. Rattray secured the visitors' four sixers; one being the result of a smart pick-up in the pack, and another of a difficult angle shot. He was well backed up by Laurie Hannett. Beaufort's goals were the outcome of smart snapshots by K. Broadbent and J. Angus.

In the third term Beaufort put on 6.3 to 5.1. Alan marked and got his third goal for the home side. F. Glenister scored another at an almost impossible angle, and Clark (2), Angus and Broadbent also scored the maximum; the latter two being particularly good snapshots. D. McCracken and H. Smith were both notable for useful work, with the staunch support of Miller, Clark and Morris. J. Bates was very active on the back line. Rattray, F. Driscoll, F. Dunn, and J. Bibby led the Navarre attack and each goal (Rattray twice).

At the last change Navarre had a lead of 12 points, and added 2.3 to Beaufort's 1.2. Beaufort made attack after attack without breaking the visitors' defence. The term was well contested, but there was a good deal of crowded play. Morris registered Beaufort's only major point with a free, and Rattray and C. Bibby goaled for Navarre. Throughout the game R. Bibby was brilliant for the visitors. Final scores:—Navarre, 15.9; Beaufort, 12.8.

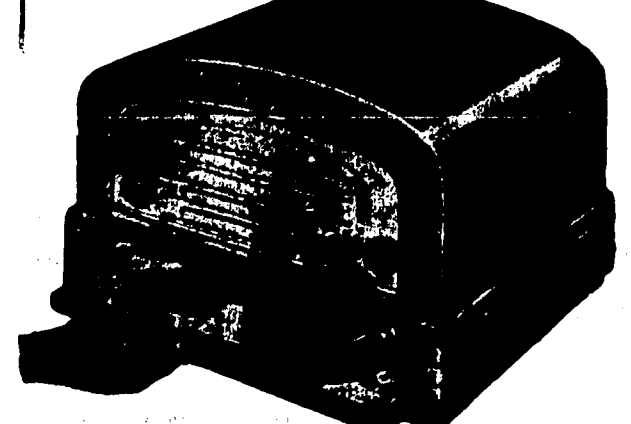

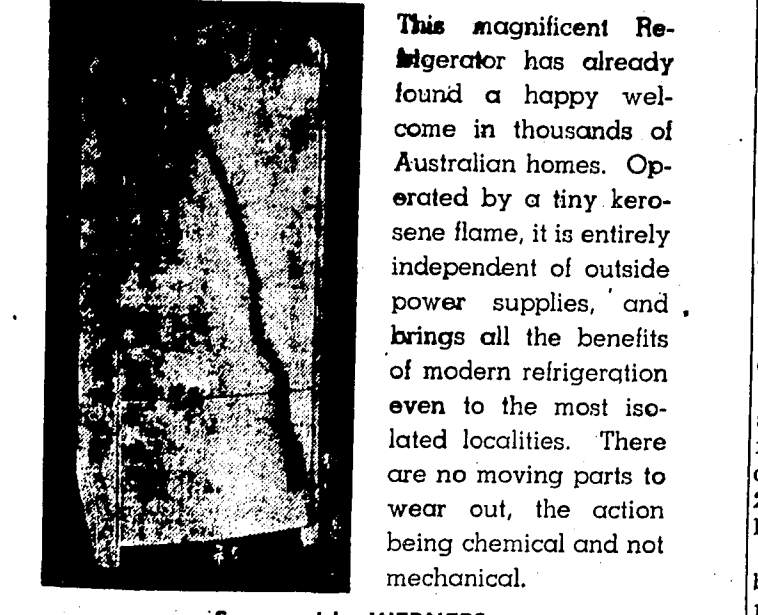

A Time for Truth

There would be less industrial
unrest if a new effort were made
to give the true facts of econ-
omic and industrial matters to
the public, states the "Review" of
the Institute of Public Affairs.
This calls for a much more care-
ful and conscientious approach
by those who form public opinion
— business men and trade union
leaders, politicians, journalists,
radio broadcasters, economists
and statisticians. These leaders
of thought carry a terrific respon-
sibility on which they would do
well to reflect long and deeply.
Industrial harmony and economic
progress would be immeasurably
advanced if they were henceforth
to display a greater scrupulous-
ness in the application and inter-
pretation of the facts used to
support their arguments.

Fact finding is frequently such
an exasperating and prolonged
process that in arguing a cause
there is an ever present tempta-
tion to use short cuts. Here lies
the trouble with much present
day advocacy.

If the public mind must con-
tinue with propaganda, then let
it be infused with a high and con-
scientious regard for the truth,
without exceeding the legitimate
limits of exaggeration. In the
present uncertain state of the
world, "the most unsocial act
which anyone can commit is to
speak or write anything without
good reason for believing it to be
truth. . . . To put forth irres-
ponsible words, because patriotic
or party feeling or public senti-
ment seems to demand them, is
though it has become a habit, is
none the less for that a stone
flung at human happiness."

The words are John Galsworthy's
and they are to-day infinitely
more pertinent and significant
than when he wrote them 30
years ago.

"THE AUSTRALIAN POLITICAL SCENE."

In a contributed article to the
"Review" of the Institute of Pub-
lic Affairs, Professor K. C.
Wheare, Gladstone Professor of
Government and Public Adminis-
tration at Oxford, and Victorian
Rhodes scholar, 1929, writes:—

In Australia federalism has been
modified and supplemented by a
process of intergovernmental co-
operation, especially through such
institutions as the Premiers' Con-
ference and the Loan Council, and
these modifications constitute a
great advance in the working of
federal government. In Canada
and the United States they have
not yet been able to achieve this
degree of co-operation, and in
my opinion Australia is in ad-
vance of these two countries in its
adaptation of federalism to the
needs of modern society. It seems
to me that a development of
these co-operative institutions and
the preservation at the same time
of the federal principle are the
best lines on which Australian
government could advance. . . .
It is preferable to unification be-
cause it preserves the advantages
of independence in the States
while at the same time it gives
plenty of opportunity for unified
and united action in those mat-
ters and at those times when
unity is essential.

STARS OF THE AIR

EXPRESSIVE ITALIAN CONDUCTOR

A.B.C.'s Italian guest conductor,
Galliera, a number of whose
concerts are being broadcast,
looks like a Roman Emperor
standing on the rostrum, moving
his hands in the particularly ex-
pressive gestures he uses, and
though he were gathering the
notes out of the air and directing
them into the orchestra.

Again and again at rehearsal,
Galliera stops his players,
singing a bar here and a bar
there to emphasise his
meaning. He speaks very
little English, but makes
himself perfectly understood to his
musicians. "All musical terms are
Italian and the less you say the
better," he remarked in an inter-
view after the rehearsal.



Galliera, just 40 years old, was
cradled in music. His father was
a professor of the organ at the
Conservatorium at Milan, and a
composer. His mother, a Brazil-
ian, was an outstanding pianist.
Like most musicians who have
known to the full the ups and

downs of their exacting profes-
sion, his father did his best to
dissuade his son from following
in his footsteps, but to no avail.
At 22, Galliera, junior, was ap-
pointed professor of organ and
composition at the Milan Con-
servatorium. Conducting, how-
ever, was his heart's desire. At
long last the opportunity arrived
when he was 30. Just as he was
making his name as a conductor
in his own country the war came,
and he had to leave Italy to seek
sanctuary in Switzerland. On foot
he and his family crossed the
Alps.

Since the war he has again
made Italy his headquarters, but
his reputation is growing so
rapidly that he is constantly
travelling between London, Vien-
na, Paris and the other great
music centres to conduct their
principal orchestras.

His best audiences in Europe?
He said he had found them in
Austria, Switzerland and England.
Speeder driving is one of his
hobbies. Asked if there was a
similarity between driving a car
and conducting an orchestra, he
agreed that there was, adding
with a smile: "But cars are more
luciferic!"

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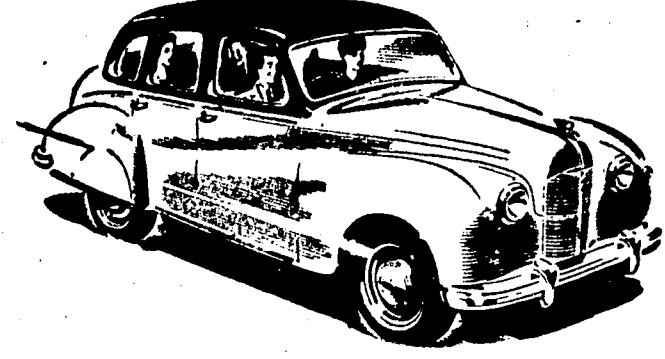

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USSR AND USA

There is need for objective com-
parisons between economic condi-
tions in Communist Russia and
"free enterprise" U.S.A., states
the "Review" of the Institute of
Public Affairs. The Institute
quotes from reports made recent-
ly by delegations of Norwegian
trade unionists to both countries.
The Norwegians reported that the
average wage level in Russia is
sufficient only for purchasing ab-
solute necessities. Most people
subsist on simple foods such as
bread and potatoes. Prices of
meat, butter, canned foods, etc.,
are beyond all but the elite. Lit-
tle is left for clothes and foot-
wear, which are particularly ex-
pensive. Partly because of the in-
sufficiency of their husband's
earnings, women are forced to
work on dock, road and construc-
tion projects. The Norwegians re-
fer to the low level of rentals in
Russia, but comment: "The short-
age of housing is frightful, and
therefore the majority of the popu-
lation can draw no great advan-
tage from low rents. The Norwe-
gians were appalled by the gen-
eral standard of living in Russia,
but they praise the reconstruc-
tion of such cities as Stalingrad
and Leningrad. Despite a back-
ground which would certainly not
predispose them towards free en-
terprise, the Norwegian labor lead-
ers state: "The American worker
to-day is the best paid in the
world. The high level of income
and production have in large
parts of the country resulted in
a standard of living which far ex-
ceeds anything we know in our
hemisphere. The American stand-
ard rests on high production. It
has become clear to the American
worker and employee that the fu-
ture of their country depends on
their ability to produce."

Inequalities of income in Rus-
sia are possibly greater than in
any country in the world. Top
party men, writers and actors,
earn 10,000 — 20,000 roubles per
month plus special extras and
privileges; professors, doctors and
technicians from 1000 — 3000 rou-
bles, while white collar and in-
dustrial workers get 500 — 1000
roubles a month. Shock workers on
incentive systems receive as high
as 14,000 roubles monthly. Russian
trade unions cannot engage in
wage disputes, since the entire
wage structure is planned by the
Government. The Norwegians
candidly admit that the great
American unions, the A.F.L. and
the C.I.O. support free enter-
prise.
