SCHOOL COMMITTEE

MONTHLY MEETING.

PLAN FOR PLAYGROUND BUILDING

Beaufort School Committee now has a scale plan for the proposed building on the playing field.

The Committee met in the H.E. School Staff Room on Monday night, when five members and the head teacher (Mr C. V. Saunder) were present. Mr A. J. Hughes was voted to the chair. An apology was received for the absence of Mr Q. W. Gregory.

Correspondence was read from the Education Department in regard to complete list of repairs, and stating that the Public Works Department had been asked to inspect the school building and furnish details of the work. — Received.

From Education Department, informing Committee that there was no decision yet in regard to supply of milk for school children for 1950. In some schools children paid a small sum daily towards cost of milk, which relieved Mothers' Clubs of the burden. — Deferred till July meeting, on motion of Mrs M. Watkin and Mr Arthur Crick.

The correspondent (Mr H. A. Stowell) said plans for buildings, etc., at the school playground had been received from Messrs. J. M. Muntz and Savage. The approximate cost of the building was £300. — To be submitted to Plantation Trustees for approval, on motion of Mr Arthur Crick and Mrs Watkin; it being understood it would subsequently be submitted to the Education Department.

H.T.'S REPORT.

The head teacher (Mr C. V. Saunder) reported that the asphalt on the upper playground had been completed. It was to be marked out for basket ball and bat tennis. Basket ball and football teams were to visit them from Ballarat in July. Two architects had visited him in regard to the cookery school and shelter shed. They thought his (Mr Saunder's) plan was by far the better one, and he was told the work would be carried out. The whole of the school and fencing were to be painted externally. He had got an extra 20 yds. of gravel from Mr Sist. Two heaters in the science room had been repaired and were going satisfactorily. In the works and buildings fund there was a balance of £17/10/5 left for the school and £6/1/6 for the residence. The power point had been installed and an urn put in for the use of the teachers and Mothers' Club. The estimate of the cost of the power point was £6/10/9, but there was a little more to go on it. The next group day fell on Thursday, 29th June, and Ercildoune and Burrumbet schools had been granted permission to come in, making eight schools in all. There was an initial cost of £4/4/ for pictures; each school committee paying 12/. Plantation Day was on Wednesday, 28th June. An acre had been cleared and Mr Godfrey was coming up from Melbourne for the day. Mr Godfrey suggested that the Forest Officer, Mr Bolton, be invited, and he had accepted. Members of the School Committee were also invited. Sixteen names for the English class for New Australians from Chute camp had been submitted, and they had all the books here. Monday and Wednesday nights had been chosen; the classes to last for two hours each night. They expected to start the classes next Wednesday. It had been arranged to have half-yearly school examinations in June and November. Friday, 30th June, was to be made correction day. He had been asked by the Department to assist the Ripon Shire Council in regard to the diphtheria immunization campaign. The extension of the telephone had been completed to the school residence. It had its advantages, particularly to the bus children's parents, the bus drivers and proprietors. He would like it discussed at next meeting. The attendance was 159, primary; and 71, secondary;

WATERLOO AND CHUTE

REFORMATORY SUPERINTENDENT AT WATERLOO.

On Sunday 18th June, Mr Matthews, superintendent of the Reformatory at Langi-Kal-Kal, took the pulpit at the Waterloo Church, in place of Rev. A. T. Cottrell, who had been called away to St. Andrew's Kirk at Ballarat. Mr Matthews took his text, "Be of Courage," from Josiah. He referred to his appointment as superintendent of the penal establishment at Langi Kal Kal, and said so far there were no boys there, but he expected about 20 very soon. He went on to say there was a fear in the minds of the community of the presence of these boys in the district. He thought they had nothing to fear. Of course he could not guarantee everything, but should any get away, they should give him or them a meal and bring them back; as it was the community's as well as his responsibility, for they were their boys. He had had vast experience overseas and in Australia and New Zealand of penal and prison reform, and he said that the day of chasing escapees with the bullet had gone—more kindly action had proved better. To put them behind iron bars only made them scheme to get out and lowered their morals. In his experience in New Zealand and in penal establishments, he found that quite a lot of these boys went out into life afterwards and made good citizens; many doing well and writing to him for guidance. He felt that many of them were like sons of his, and he was deeply attached to them. There might be a fear of fire with these lads, but they would have a good brigade of their own, in which the boys would be interested, and it would be a help to the district. Members of the community would be invited from time to time to come over and see how they were carrying on.

In a private talk Mr Matthews said they had about 5000 Romney Marsh sheep and about 300 head of cattle on the place. They had a substantial wool cheque. Besides himself he had a farm manager, two other men, and one man with local experience, but he would have the staff increased as soon as they got going.

In referring to his trip overseas, Mr Matthews mentioned that when in Great Britain he was impressed by the beautiful churches spread throughout the land, which were lasting monuments and he thought the basis of Britain's greatness. When he was in America, he was astounded at the great churches America had. From what they read here and there, they thought that country was a place where they went in only for making money, but there the churches were packed on the day of worship. On going to one Presbyterian Church, he found thousands trying to gain admittance, and they had to hold two services the same morning to give the overflow a chance to worship.

Speaking of "Be of courage," the speaker said it required great courage to go up in an aeroplane. He had travelled 20000 miles by plane in Skymasters in his trip overseas, and on going up, wondered if they would ever come down again safely. He had since read of two Skymasters falling into the ocean.

NOTES ON THE GAME.

Strengthened by the inclusion of N. Day and C. O'Brien (who have been playing with Golden Point), and also J. Martin, the Beaufort team was extended by Amphitheatre at the Park on Saturday. The game was closely contested till half-time, when Beaufort only led by a point. In the remaining quarters the visitors did very little scoring, and Beaufort won by 28 points.

In the opening term Beaufort put on 2.4 to 2.1. Amphitheatre's goals were scored by Garsed and Ray Anderson, and Beaufort's by S. Clarke. O'Brien's three shots were off the target. It was an interesting term in which Clark, Hansford, F. Glenister and Allen did much useful work for Beaufort, and Morley, Garsed, Ray Anderson and P. Jolly shone on the opposing side.

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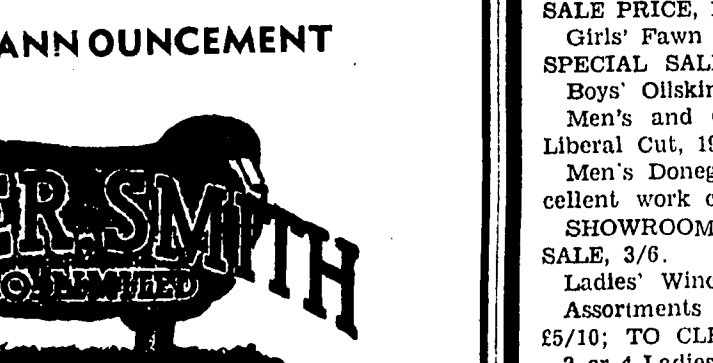

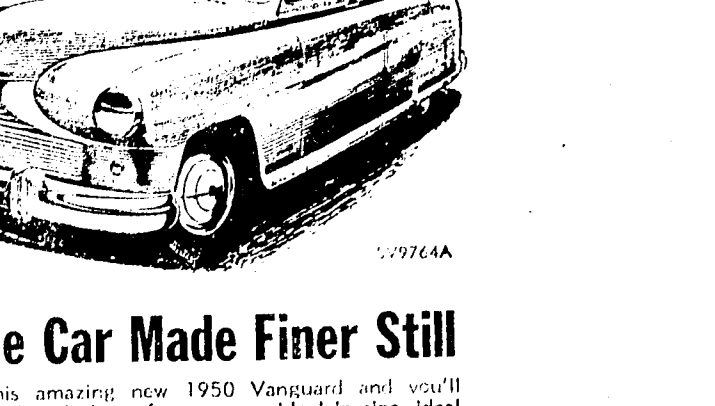

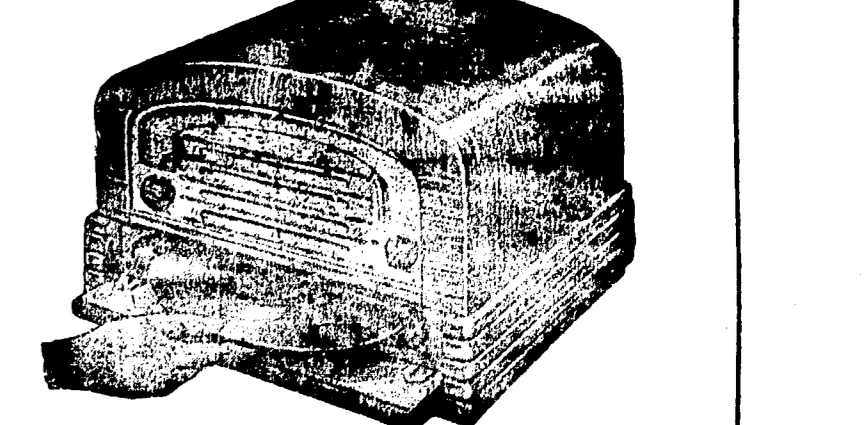
