Mr R. G. Downes, a member of the Soil Conservation Authority of Victoria, attended the neeting and accompanied the nmittee on a comprehensive ree-day tour of inspection of Pyrences District.

The Committee is pleased with the number of entries received for the 1951 Pyrences District Soil Conservation Competition. Thirty-two entries have been received, which is an increase on last year's very successful competition. These entries are distributed throughout the five shires comprising the Pyrenees District as follows:-Stawell Shire, 8 entries; Ararat Shire, 7: Avoca Shire, 6; Lexton Shire, 6 Ripon Shire, 5. As sufficient entries have been received from each of the five shires in the Pyrenees District, it is possible to award the shire prizes which each shire council has donated for the best effort at soil conservation within their shire. representative on the Pyrenees District Advisory Committee from each shire will also accompany the judge through the shire they represent. The Committee has asked the



The Committee was shown extensively eroded areas in each of the five shires, and is convinced that no time should be lost in setting about both reclaiming the eroded areas and in publicising land husbandry methods which will ensure that soil erosion will not develop on at present sound The opportunity was taken at

the meeting to say farewell to the Lands Department representative on the Committee, Mr A. **E.** Davey, who is leaving this district. Mr Davey has rendered considerable eervice to soil conservation in this district for a number of years.

In replying to the remarks of the Committee, Mr Davey, a lands inspector, said that his connection with and interest in soil conservation sprang first from a selfish motive as he felt that, once the farming and grazng community became more and more aware of the need for soil conservation, they would realise the great menace to the welfare of the soil that lack of rabbit control constituted.



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



Company Profits Not a Cause of High Prices

Many people reading of record profits jump to the conclusion that the mounting cost of living is accounted for by high profits. But company profits represent only one-tenth of the cost of goods sold; seven-tenths goes to employees and people such as farmers and shopkeepers working on their own account. The Government actually takes in sales tax, etc., more than is taken in company profits.
