Each having lost one of seven matches played (the "Courier" reports), Midlands and Beaufort will contest the final of the Ballarat District Golf Association's pennant competition at Buninyong this week-end. The ninth round, which would have no bearing on which teams would be finalists, has been cancelled.

Before the seventh and eighth rounds were played last week-end at Maryborough, Ballarat, Beaufort, Hepburn Springs and Midlands had been defeated once each.

Both Hepburn Springs and Ballarat suffered two reverses, and Beaufort and Midlands won twice at Maryborough.

LAST OF SEASON

DALGETY & CO. LTD.

Dalgety and Company Limited, Geelong, report having held their last sale of the 1950/1951 season on Thursday, 28th June, when they brought forward a catalogue of 2000 bales. The offering consisted of bulk-classed wools and crutchings, with a few early shorn clips from the far North. The market showed all the better features reported from other centres recently, with improved competition and more widespread demand. Values were fully firm on late rates, and change being in sellers' favour. Bulk-classed wool sold up to 140d and crutchings to 72d.

The tenth and last series of sales for the 1950/51 wool selling season were held in Geelong centre on Thursday, 28th June, when we submitted a catalogue of 1400 bales. As is usual at the close of the season, a very big percentage of the offering was made up with bulk classed wools and crutchings. In the crutching section there was a very good selection. Under good competition a most satisfactory clearance was made. Prices for practically all descriptions were very firm on those ruling in Melbourne earlier in the week. Good length, free crutchings commanded much attention and sold at prices little below those ruling in May; the shorter, stained and burry sorts, however, met with restricted competition and sold at prices below May levels. Bulk classed merino fleece sold up to 150d, comeback fleece to 148d and lambs to 140d.

Messrs. Elder, Smith & Co. Limited report that they held the final sale of the 1950/51 wool selling season on Thursday, 28th June, when they offered a catalogue of 2255 bales. The offering was principally made up of crutchings, a final batch of bulk classed wool and several new season clips from the Darling River district of N.S.W. Prices for all types of wool were firm on the lower level of values established at other centres earlier in the week. There was good competition for all wool when free of vegetable fault, but burry and carbonizing sorts were very irregular and difficult of sale. This sale brings to a close a season during which the firm handled their record quantity of wool; altogether 78,842 bales were consigned to them for sale, which is 530 bales above that of the previous season.


WAUBRA WINS BY WIDE MARGIN.





It was decided to invite Mr. R. Lindsay, Shire engineer, to attend next practice night and discuss suitable running tracks with him.

Names were handed in of members willing to go to the Indoor Competition at Ballarat on Monday night, 26th July. The brigade has already secured two first and two second places at this competition.

Captain Day was appointed as the Beaufort Brigade's representative on the Committee of the Ballarat Indoor Competition.

Firemen A. and D. McGregor were appointed for hall duty for the month, and Apparatus-Officer G. Grant and Fireman A. Torney for motor pump duty.

The captain said the Brigade would like every householder with a fireplug in front of his house to chip the grass around it and keep it clean.

The captain promised a trophy for the fireman who could name the most fireplugs.

Spring Sowing of PHALARIS TUBEROSA

Phalaris tuberosa is a valuable permanent pasture for growing on Victorian pasture land which is too wet or too dry for perennial ryegrass. It will not persist in the lower rainfall districts where the soils are too dry in summer to enable it to survive, but in marginal areas it has proved to be remarkably drought resistant. Phalaris has been successfully established in districts receiving less than 18 inches of annual rainfall.

Mr. S. C. Powell, Agricultural Research Officer of the Victorian Department of Agriculture, states that Phalaris can be sown in autumn or spring in Victoria, but spring sowing is risky where late spring or summer rains cannot be relied on. Phalaris seedlings are delicate, and early spring sowing is desirable to enable the plants to become established and get their roots well down before summer.

Phalaris provides stock with a varied diet, but it is not so palatable as ryegrass, and may be rejected by stock particularly if allowed to make strong, coarse growth, or where other species provide a balanced ration. An over-abundance of Phalaris is an undesirable factor as an over-abundance of any other, single species.

Phalaris seed should be sown on a well-worked fallow, alone, or with a little subterranean clover seed only. In the early stages it does not compete well with perennial ryegrass seedlings. Usual rate of sowing is 1 to 2 lb. of seed per acre. Once well established, Phalaris makes strong competitive growth with other species introduced later.

Explanation: In reply to comment, it is explained that the Riponshire Advocate's Building Committee does not propose to ask for two of the 10 Commission houses to be built at Beaufort, but to request that two extra houses be built for the accommodation of workmen.

Parliamentary Notes (By Earn Morton)

It will be of interest to learn that the old railway line between Stawell and the Grampians is to be removed and as this line was laid to remove the sandstone from Mt. Difficult to build Parliament House over 70 years ago, your member will take the opportunity during the debate to remind the people of Victoria how close a connection Stawell has with the legislation of Victoria.

A long overdue Bill to provide for the registration of sickness, hospital, medical and funeral benefit associations has been introduced. A Bill to restrict Sunday entertainment will be debated soon. A Bill to allow the bank overdraft of the State Electricity Commission to be increased from £2,000,000 to £7,000,000 after your member has the opportunity to ask the Government to extend the electricity power lines to rural areas, especially to soldier settlers who are within easy reach of the present power lines.

In answer to a question in the House it was revealed that since the present Government took office, 85,475 acres have been acquired for soldier settlement, which includes approximately 20,000 acres in the electorate of Ripon.

Pirates of Kangaroo Island. It is difficult to realise that Kangaroo Island today, a prosperous pastoral community and a tourist resort, was once a refuge for desperate escapees from the penal settlement of Van Diemen's Land and New South Wales. In the July issue of the "Australian Journal" Rex Gray, in an article on an exciting tale showing Alexander Tolmer then Commanding Officer of the South Australian Mounted Police, faced with the almost insurmountable task of obtaining a number of murderous villains who had escaped to this remote island sanctuary. This colourful and authentic story vividly illustrates a little-known phase of pioneering life in Australia, and gives a graphic picture of old-time troopers at work on land and sea, under difficult conditions which would startle a modern commando.

SOIL CONSERVATION AUTHORITY
 EXTRACTS FROM OFFICIAL REPORT.

We take the following from the report of the Judge, Mr. P. C. McNaught, D.D.A., in regard to local prize-winners in the recent Pyrenees District Soil Conservation competition (Mr. McNaught is the Conservation Officer for the Avoca District):—

HANSLOW CUP. — Mr. A. R. Beggs, Buln Gherin, Beaufort, awarded the Hanslow Cup for 1951. His property, about 12 miles south of Beaufort, consists of 3550 acres, varying from undulating basaltic country to steep hills of sedimentary origin.

In 1944 when Mr. Beggs first occupied Buln Gherin, the area carried 2700 green sheep and 100 lambs. Last season's production was 97 bales of wool from 3500 sheep (including 900 lambs), 700 sheep and 10 head of cattle were fattened and sold, 31 calves were reared, and 8000 lb. of butter fat produced from an average of 30 cows milked.

At the time of inspection, live stock carried was seven horses, 100 stud Red Poll cattle, 3500 merino sheep (with 1200 lambs expected) and 32 cows being milked. The dairy section of the property consists of approximately 90 acres, mainly comprising sub-irrigated ranean clover and phalaris tuberosa pastures. Approximately 100 acres is cropped annually for establishing improved pasture species and fodder conservation.

Fodder reserves comprised meadow hay with some oat hay, and about 800 bags of oats. The hay is stored in a shed, or mouse-proof stand, and the oats in two iron silos. Where possible, the fodder is fed out on bare patches. Rabbit control has been assisted by completely netting the boundary. One gully has been treated with a diversion bank around the head, approximately 50 acres of the catchment having been completed. This gully has now been partly filled.

In all, there are 27 paddocks varying in size from 10 to 600 acres. The increase in production of the feed on the improved volcanic country has allowed Mr. Beggs to carry out a sound system of grazing management by allowing the lighter land of sedimentary origin the chance to improve in vegetable cover. Mr. Beggs endeavours to avoid the "lambling-down" of ewes in the same paddocks for two consecutive years, and he does not move the breeding ewes after joining the rams to avoid any upset in the plane of nutrition. "Top-dressing" the grass has been carried out to advantage on Buln Gherin, and as the Scotchman would say, "You cannot farm without a plough," Mr. Beggs considers "and a mower should also be added."

Some well situated pine shelter belts, together with an area of ornamental trees and shrubs add greatly to the attractiveness of the home and the very well-kept surrounding farm buildings.

Mr. Beggs is a real soil conservationist, and having recognised the production potential of the land is carrying out a programme of safe increase development — the objective of the true conservationist.

RIPON SHIRE. — The trophy donated by the Ripon Shire was awarded to Mr. G. Topper, Oaklands, Beaufort.

The property, 3500 acres of undulating country varying from gentle to steep slopes, showed signs of sheet erosion, tunnelling and gullying. Of this area, 1500 acres has been sown to improved pasture which is top-dressed annually, and at the time of inspection, the property was carrying 20 horses, 50 beef cattle and 3000 sheep.

Mr. Topper has endeavoured to control gully-head erosion by means of concrete and grouted stone chutes, but as in many instances of this type of work, only



SOIL CONSERVATION

The Pyrenees Soil Conservation District Advisory Committee held its third meeting at Beaufort on 28th June, following the very successful Field Day on the farm of the Haslow Cup winner in this year's Pyrenees Soil Conservation Competition.

The Committee was gratified to see a large attendance of district folk at the field day on Mr A. R. Beggs' property, Balm Gherin, Beaufort, as it indicated an ever-growing interest in the very important matter of soil conservation. It is hoped that in future this field day can be held earlier in the year.

The Minister for Conservation, Hon. R. K. Brose, the local member, Mr E. Morton, and the Chairman of the Soil Conservation Authority, Mr G. T. Thompson, attended the meeting of the Pyrenees Committee, and accompanied them next day on inspections in the Pyrenees District.

To assist the District Conservation Officer, Mr F. D. Runge, the Committee decided to group landholders who had requested inspections. Arrangements for inspections will be made by the landholder representatives of the Committee, and Mr Runge will carry out inspections of possibly 2000 properties in the district.

The recent stalling of temporary assistants and plant in this district has enabled the carrying out of an increased amount of work in the field, but even so, the demand on the services of the District Conservation Officer is far greater than he can hope to satisfy. This situation will continue until permanent assistants can be stationed in the Pyrenees District.

On Friday, 29th June, the Committee inspected the work recently completed by the Soil Conservation Authority plant, on the Bugar-Co-operative Project. This co-operative project involved two landholders, the Victorian Railway and the S.C.A. All are highly pleased with the result of this, the first co-operative scheme implemented in this district.

£402,970 Contributed Since 1941. BEAUFORT SMASHES LOAN RECORD.

In one of the most spectacular Commonwealth Loan operations of recent years, Beaufort subscriptions to the recent Security Loan, smashed all previous records with a phenomenal total of £73,800, more than £24,000 in excess of its previous record of £49,800 established in December last.



Mr Russell said the trees available from the Forests Commission were only one-year trees.

It was understood that the trees would be protected by small uniform guards; the price of wire netting fencing at £600 a mile ruling fencing out.

The scarlet oak, rowan, silver birch, and silk oaks are to be considered.

The shire secretary is to be approached immediately; it being considered the consent of the three N.R. members to the project could be obtained.

Mr Linsten said the High St. site (Martin's Corner) would kill the varieties of trees selected.

It was understood that 50 trees would be applied for.

In answer to a question, Mr George said he thought the saw mills would supply timber for tree guards gratis.

General Business
