OIL BURNING ENGINES MORE FUEL STORAGES IN COUNTRY.

The Railway Department's de-

cision to use heavy residual in ired locomotives has necessitated nore installations and pre-heating facilities at the main country lepots. Heavy residual oil has almost twice the stickiness of light furnace oil, and it will only flow freely at temperatures above 7 deg. Fahrenheit. Consequently it must be pre-heated before use. More oil storage and heating appliances have been provided at Ararat, Bandigo and Geelong Locomotive Depots. At Ballarat, Traralgon, Maryborough and Dimboola small vertical boilers are now used or heating. A 24,000 gallon oil storage has also been installed at Wondonga, together with a low pressure heater boiler to treat heavy oil for the four S class (Spirit of Progress) engines. At the major depots, North Melbourne, Ararat, Geelong and Bendigo Locomotive Depots, steam pipe lines hae been placed around the sheds, so that locomotives can be lit up from a cold condition.

ANTIBIOTICS SUCCESS-FUL AGAINST RHEUMA-TOID ARTHRITIS

New York, 24/7/51 A new concept of rheumatic diseases and their treatment with the broad-range antibiotic drugs is reported by Dr. Thomas M. Brown of George Washington University School, Washington, D.C., U.S.A., in the American Journal of the Medical Science. roach is the assumption that arhritis and related crippling afflictions may arise from hypersensivity to "L organisms," supersmall microbes which can be eliminated by antibiotic therapy. Aureomycin, chloramphenicol and terramycin, sometimes combined with cortisone or ACTH, were all tested by Dr Brown and co-workers in clinical studies of 150 rheumatic patients at George Washington University Hospital and Mt. Auto Veteran's Hospital, | Washington D.C. Terramycin proved the most effective.

The L organisms, which were the starting point for the new clinical and research direction taked by the Brown group, are bacteria of unusually small size. Like viruses, which are even smaler, but unlike most bacteria, they are able to pass into and out of body cells. In rheumatoid diseases Dr. Brown's study led him to conclude, they multiply within the cell, until the elements of the organisms emerge into intercellular spaces.

In some cases treated, antibiotic therapy led to a flare-up of rheumatic symptoms. Supplemental dosages with cortisone eliminated these effects. They are attributed to rapid destruction of the L organisms by the antibiotic causing the bacteria to flood out of the cells and resulting in exaggeration of the body's response. At present, rheumatic diseases have been treated most effectivey with cortisone, a ster id horone of the adrenal gland cortex, or ACTH, an anterior pituitary gland hormone Cortisons and ACTH do not actually cure arthritis but provide relief of symptoms. Treatment must continue indefinitely and relapses follow discontinuance. 3194(6)
