
LOAN PROGRAMME The most important discussio n Parliament last week was the Premier's report on the Premiers' Conference and the Loan Council meeting, and the following are extracts from his state-

The Prime Minister gave early ntimation that the plan submitted by the New South Wales Premier to increase this year's grant to the States from £86,000,000 to £135,000,000 an amount of £30,000,000 from Commonwealth revenue was not acceptable to the Commonwealth overnment. The Prime Minister was prepared to make available £120.000,000. which is an increase of £33,000,000. Under the formula Victoria would have received £28,200,000. After strong exception by the Premier of Victoria re the formula, it was decided to grant Victoria £29.500,000, which is £7.300,000 more that the 'State received last year. In 1958 the grant will be decided on a population basis and if this method applied this year, the grant would have been £30,800.000 or £1,300,000 this year.

The Commonwealth Budge last year was increased by £261,000,000, and the Premie said he believed this year's budget would show an increase of more than £300,000,000, and in view of this enormous increase the Commonwealth attitude is unfair, and is really the adoption of master and slave tactics, cuoted the Premier.

The total Loan Programme for Victoria was approximately [£120.480.000. The Loan Programime for all States amounted to £300,382,000. The Prime Miniser indicated that the maximum amount of £225,000.000 was the limit to which the Loan Programme could go, and added that cut of 33 1-3 per cent, would be necessary in the States' Loan Programmes, but after some ession on this matter, a cut of 25 per cent, was agreed upon. The Prime Minister has been equested to allocate a further 3d per gallon from the Petro revenue, and that it should be distributed on the basis of the State where it is collected, rather than on the present pop

The Communist Referendum has been defeated largely through the inbred disinclination of the Australian people to give any Government more power, and now we have to face Mr Fadden's unpopular which is well named. If it does anything to check inflation and reckless spending, it may be a plessing in disguise.

Beaufort Progress Association intends to hit out in its treeplanting programme next year, and is contemplating taking over and extending the Honour Avenue, to embrace memorial trees to those who served in World War II.

The Shire Engineer, Mr R. Linsten, has sounded a timely warning to those who waste water. Next summer will be a critical time in regard to the local supply; the town having outgrown in 20 years the capacity of the pipeline. 


