SILAGE MAKING
 Although silage making is by no means general in Victoria, it is significant that those who begin the practice usually continue it in subsequent seasons. They find that the work is much simpler than is generally supposed, and that attention to certain essential details assures at least a reasonable degree of success.

According to Mr C. P. Gould, Manager of the State Research Farm at Werribee, the main essential in the making of pasture silage is time of cutting. Although the ideal stage for cutting is about the flowering time of the main species, it is not possible to cut more than a fraction of the total at precisely that stage. In practice it will be found that good silage can be made in most districts over a period of about four weeks, beginning just before flowering time. Very early cutting, especially where the clover content is high, tends to produce a sour, unpalatable silage, while very late cutting gives a product too low in moisture content.

Ensiling should be carried out almost immediately after mowing, except when the crop is very succulent early in the season and especially if there is a high percentage of legumes, when it should be allowed to wilt for a period of from a few hours to perhaps half a day, depending on weather conditions.

Consolidation is usually easy to achieve with early cut material, and may be too rapid if filling is done quickly or pressure is applied by tramping or driving over the material. On the other hand, cuts must be well packed or excess aeration and losses may occur, particularly at the top of the mass and around the edges of stacks.

Rate of filling (or stacking) will depend on the nature of the material, e.g., slower if moisture content is high, and faster if it is low. A good general rule is to aim at about one foot depth of consolidated material per day.

The attainment of this rate is influenced by several factors, including the speed with which the material is handled and the surface area in use.

Depth of trenches or height of stacks should be sufficient to provide reasonable pressure. A minimum of say 5 feet (consolidated) is advisable.

Covering and weighing assist in consolidation and the exclusion of air, and is essential when the material is tending to be dry. On the other hand little loss may occur in very succulent silage even though no covering is done. It is largely a question of estimating the probable losses in relation to the cost of providing and removing the covering, keeping in mind that the longer the period of storage the greater the losses are likely to be.

Overhead silos are expensive and have not become popular in Victoria. Where suitable sites are available ensiling in trenches is probably the most satisfactory method, especially for long term storage. The ideal site is one where the trench can be constructed with the bottom above the level of the ground at one end, so providing drainage and easy access for removal of the material. If filling is to be done from the sides, a maximum width of 12" to 14 feet is convenient.



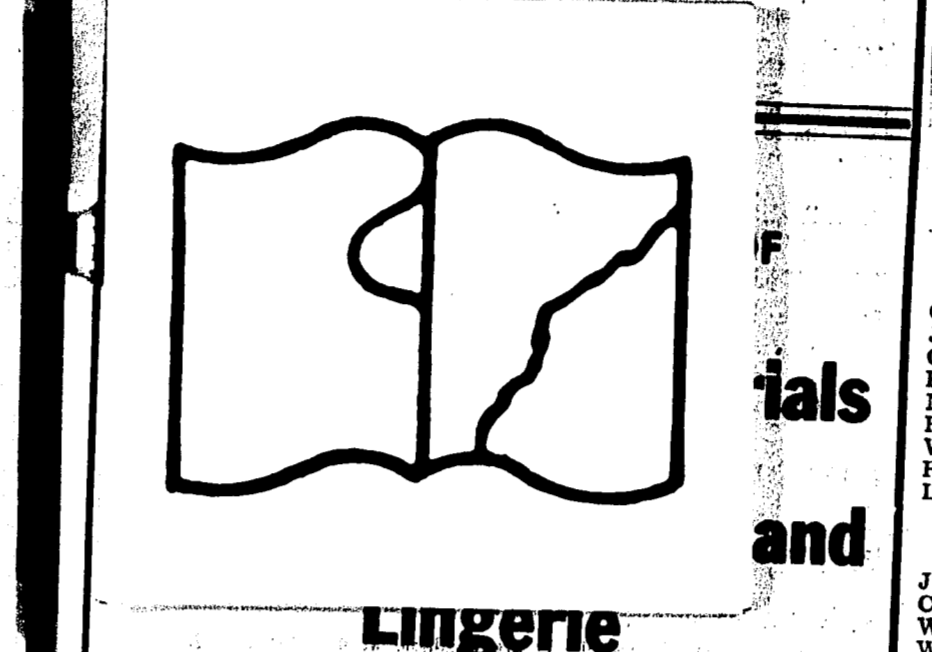

Glenister, for siting of six additional residential houses on the Beaufort Hotel site at a contract price of £3840.

ENGINEER'S REPORT

The engineer (Mr R. Linton) reported as follows at the Ripon Shire Council meeting on Wednesday:-

GRANT WORKS. Allocation of 1951/52 Main Roads Maintenance Grants has been received. Information gained to date indicates that no grants will be available for other than main roads this financial year. The extent of approved grant works for roads and bridges is:- Main roads works approved £10,700 Fed. Aid works approved, £10,800 P.W.D. grant works approved £1000

Estimated cost of Shire Works, 51/52 £6000. Total cost of works, 1951/52 £40,100. Based on last year's expenditure, about 14 months' work is in hand. The following applications for grants have been received:- Main Roads - Carnham, Reconstruction, 1 mile; Seal, 1 mile. Beaufort - Amphitheatre, Reconstruction, 1 mile; Seal, 1 mile. Beaufort - Carnham, Realignment, Beaufort - Lexton, Reconstruction, 1 1/2 miles; Seal, 1 1/2 miles. Euramben - Streatham (Ripon), Sheetling 2 miles. Euramben - Streatham (Jt. Ararat), Sheetling 1 mile. Skipton, Reconstruction, 1 mile. Federal Aid Roads. - No application granted. Isolated Settlers' Roads. - No application granted. Federal Maintenance. - No application granted.

Council's contribution to the works totalling £40,100 will be as follows:- Main Roads (contribution for 50/51) £3200 Federal Aid £200 P.W.D. Grants £500 Estimated Shire Works, 51/52 £6000 Plant, Interest on Loans, excess over hire £2000 Total Shire Contribution to works for 51/52 £13,700 This is a reduction of £7700, due to the reduced grant works. McEwale's Bridge, Trawalla, and two bridges in Beaufort have been reconstructed. Patrol Maintenance and drainage improvement work has been carried out on all Main roads. A meeting has been attended at the Beaufort, Park, dealing with improvements to the kitchen and the reserve. The transfer of the grant from the playing area to the kitchen is likely to be approved by the P.W.D., upon submission of a report on the proposal. An inspection of proposed roads was carried out on the Euramben Soldier Settlement Estate. Clause 1 - The engineer said they had not been hard hit by the grant cut this year, but would be next year. The engineer reported on the meeting of 16 representatives of local bodies, which carried a motion that the Council be asked to shift the present dining room and erect a new kitchen on the end of the present building. The P.W. Department would transfer the grant if agreed to in respect of bricks and secondhand galvanised iron. Cr. Kirkpatrick and Cr. Mackinnon endorsed the engineer's remarks. - That portion of the report was adopted, on motion of Crs. Kirkpatrick and Watkin. The engineer suggested that a copy of plan be sent to interested bodies. - Agreed to.

The engineer said Mr Campbell agreed to certain minimum funds to be constructed by the shire by grants in regard to Euramben Soldier Settlement. In reply to Cr. Kirkpatrick, the engineer said they would get 7-8 assistance from the Government. 2. SHIRE WORKS. Tree planting has been completed for this season. Light reconstruction has been given to a number of roads in all ridings. Damage has occurred to Closed Roads used by timber traffic under permit, and deposits of carter's permits on the following roads should be used as contribution towards the repairs which have already been carried out:- Raglan - Mc Cole Road; Beaufort - Elmhurst Road; Chute-Raglan Road; Euramben-Raglan Road.

Improvements to the crossing over the Vee in Middle Creek would be a charge against the Ripon Shire only. Subdivision, Liston to Liston, Carranballac, is recommended for sealing. Clause 2 - The engineer said about £30 would be contributed to the damaged roads. Depositors to be informed that their deposits would be used to repair roads, on motion of Crs. Hinton and Mackinnon.

The engineer said they may be up for about £150 for the work at the V crossing, Middle Creek. - Work to be carried out, on motion of Crs. Watkin and Schlicht.

3. STAFF. Considerable absence from duty occurred due to sickness. Clause 3 - Adopted.

4. PLAN. Approval has been received from the State Treasury to borrow up to £20,000 for the purchase of plant. It is recommended that the following items of plant be purchased from loan:- 4 Berrymans Loaders for Council's trucks £240 1 Secondhand M. Moore Power-master Grader £1200 1 Secondhand Ford 4 x 4

TRUCK

Fitting of hoist, job, etc. £300 Mobilco Power Outfit, incl. attachment for drag saw, posthole and rock drill, electric generator for hand drill; grinder and saw, and air compressor; approximate cost £800 1 welding generator for attachment to Council's Front End Loader £240 1 Engine for sprayer outfit being assembled in yard, £100

Total recommended expenditure £3740

The conversion of the Steam Roller to kero. operation should be deferred until more funds are made available for sealing work. Provision of the plant scheduled above would accelerate construction of road and bridge works in hand considerably. Further consideration should be given to the purchase of additional graders after next year's grants are available. A major overhaul has been carried out on the No. 3 Power Grader. The Front End Loader has been fitted with a reconditioned block, ex stock. All plant units are in operation. The Forest Commission Grader has been hired for two weeks. Clause 4 - The engineer - He had been as economical as possible. Cr. Kirkpatrick moved that the W.R. get one Berrymans loader. Cr. Schlicht - He moved that they purchase the lot, as recommended by the engineer. Some people took exception to buying secondhand machinery. The engineer - With their present financial position, they must get the maximum out of their resources. He felt they should not be committed to loans beyond the expected life of plant.

In answer to Cr. Mackinnon, the engineer said the rest of the loan was open to the end of the financial year. Cr. Kirkpatrick - He would rather see a new grader, but accepted the assurance of the engineer that it was a good job. Cr. Watkin - Their hope of getting future finance was to get through the work they had in hand. He moved that the plant as listed by the engineer, be purchased. Seconded by Cr. Hinton, and carried.

Cr. Watkin moved that a loan of £5000 be applied for. Seconded by Cr. Mackinnon, and carried. The chairman said he was sorry he had overlooked Cr. Schlicht's previous motion. The secretary asked the engineer to keep to what he wanted for this year, as it upset his estimates.

The matter of the loan was left in the secretary's hands. The engineer thanked the Council for their consideration. Cr. Schlicht said they should convert the steam roller to kero. and have it ready when they wanted it. - It was agreed to have this done. 5. BEAUFORT WATER SUPPLY. Signatures for the petition towards constitution of the Trust have been obtained and an Order in Council Plan is submitted for signing and sealing.

The provision of emergency supplies for the summer has been discussed with the SRWSC's officers. After receipt of the report on Headworks, Trunk Mains and Storage, consideration would be given to the installation of a booster pump on the trunkmain for immediate installation. Official approval to proceed with the preparation of plans and specifications for reticulation improvements, metering and storage extension cannot be given, as no loan funds are available this financial year.

A special waterproofing agent has been obtained and will be tried on leaks in the existing concrete pipes. Replacement of the existing wood main at H. H. George's would be approved from loan upon receipt of plans and specifications. No depreciation funds are available for this section. Clause 5 - Plan to be signed and sealed. In regard to the installation of booster pump Cr. Schlicht said they should buy the pump immediately, as it was a better supply than from the Park. The water business was serious. The engineer - They had a pump in stock, and an alternative was to purchase a prime mover for it. They may also have fittings in stock. - Left in hands of engineer and N.R. members with power to act, on motion of Crs. Hinton and Mackinnon.

Cr. Watkin - At last meeting he moved that they bring under the notice of the matter of saving of co-operative Jonathan's precinct to them to that, of Kirkpatrick. The engineer should be for George opted, and then to be for submit. In answer to any reason for should no

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Dealt with in engineer's report. From Housing Commission, in regard to reservation of playground, Beaufort Estate. It was stated that present reservation was not warranted, and the matter deferred. - Council to object and notify Commission to that effect, on motion of Cr. Russell and Schlicht. The engineer - The Commission put up the proposition first. - This was included in the motion.

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Refer to Greater Melbourne Bill. - Received. From Shire of Wallepeup in reference to Ouyen - Hay railway. The Council was asked to affiliate with the League at a fee of £5/5/ - Received.

From Shire of Ararat in regard to insurance on vehicles used during firebreak burning. The only cover the Council had was a cover risk policy in respect to its own vehicles. - Cr. Schlicht - Most of the vehicles used were already insured. Referred to Proper Officer for his attention, at time of regional meeting; copy of Ararat letter to be sent to Lake Goldsmith Brigade.

Circular from Returned Soldiers' League, in reference to Poppy Day Appeal on 11th Nov - Wealth to be procured. From Curwen - Walker, Hall & S. Young, making application for subdivision of land, on behalf of J. and J. Liston, Carranballac. - No objection to sealing on motion of Crs. Hinton and Kirkpatrick.

From Geo. T. Brumby, Snake Valley, asking permission to cut drain across road. Cr. Roddis moved that permission be granted; 6 ft. cut from fence. Seconded by Cr. Russell, and carried. From Lexton Football League concerning Jubilee trophy for 1951. - The engineer - Lexton Shire was providing one if the grant money was still available. Letter deferred till next meeting.

From Infants Sub-branch, League of Ex-Servicemen, inviting Council to attend smoke social on 5th October. Received. Cr. Hinton reported that he represented the Council. From Infant Welfare Sister, forwarding quarterly report. Attendances - Skipton, Beaufort, 284; Snake Valley, 58. - Received.

From Ballarat City Council, forwarding agreement re joint library service for sealing. Deferred till next meeting, on suggestion by phone by Cr. Buchanan.

From State Electricity Commission, forwarding agreement re Skipton lighting for sealing. To be sealed and signed, on motion of Crs. Kirkpatrick and Hinton.

From C. W. Candy, forwarding report in regard to Snake Valley Water Supply. Copies sent to Crs. Russell and Roddis, Cr. Russell. - They had not yet arrived. They had waited 11 months for the report, and he was very disappointed with it. They asked for improvement of the supply and all he had recommended was that it be enlarged. He recommended, in the £1, which was a very high rate. His recommendation would give more pressure, but he had not provided for increasing the capacity of the dam or bringing in Dawson's dam. The matter was further discussed in committee. Mr Linton said they wanted the State Rivers Commission to assist they had not a chance for this financial year, and a proper plan had to be submitted. The Council could do it from their own revenue. He thought they should call a meeting of ratepayers. Cr. Russell moved that they write to Mr Candy for his account, and that a meeting of ratepayers be called. Seconded by Cr. Roddis, and carried. The meeting was fixed for Thursday, 18th October; the deputy-president to arrange advertising.

From C.W.A. - Beaufort branch in reference to complaint of disturbance of Hall, paid patients by dances in Hall. The Council was informed that the dances were held in the best possible manner, and the Association was not responsible for noise outside. From Beaufort C.W.A., asking to co-operate with Council in regard to Emergency Housekeeper Service. - Cr. Kirkpatrick - He understood a committee had been appointed.

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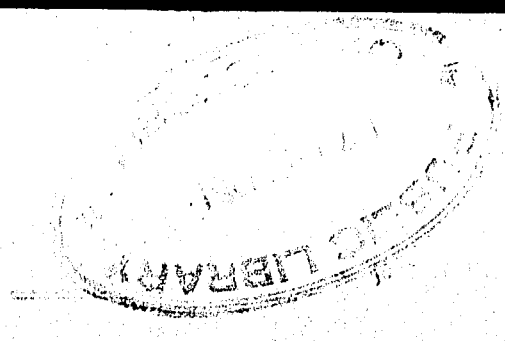
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The secretary - He thought they had to pay the housekeeper if working or not, unless other terms could be arranged. Cr. Schlicht said this small community like this they could not interest themselves in a movement like this. The secretary - He suggested that the organiser be asked to interview the Council. The Government financed it to 4-5 of the cost. Cr. Schlicht - One housekeeper was not sufficient. He felt the Council had too many commitments at present. He moved that they take no action. Cr. Kirkpatrick - There would be no harm in getting Miss Duncan along. He agreed with Cr. Schlicht to a point - some of the other schemes were too ambitious. He moved that this lady come along. The secretary - The Government would not finance the scheme unless run by the Council. Cr. Schlicht's motion was not seconded. Cr. Russell seconded Cr. Kirkpatrick's motion, which was carried. Cr. Mackinnon said the C.W.A. representatives should be invited to the meeting to give advice. Agreed to.

From R. J. Millar, Beaufort, drawing attention to state of road leading to his house, east of the Skipton Road. The engineer - They would be in the vicinity shortly and make it trafficable. Cr. Kirkpatrick - He had been bringing it up for a long time, and it was a shocking road. Ratepayers were entitled to a road, and he hoped it would be attended to as soon as possible. The engineer - That was impossible; they could not shift the plant from another part of the shire for one road. They had started to do it and should finish it. Cr. Kirkpatrick - He would like to see the road promised to Mr. Cross. They would be in that part of the shire in three weeks. They could only work to the capacity of the plant. Cr. Kirkpatrick replied that people paid their rates and felt their roads were being neglected.

From C. E. A. Smith, Beaufort, applying for culvert to be made into his place at Nerring; also writing in reference to inspection of pit at Mt. Emu. The engineer suggested that they give approval to the culvert, and he would discuss the other matter with Mr. Smith. - Referred to engineer.

From J. F. Martin, Livingstone St., Beaufort, asking for crossing to his place, and he would pay the expense. - Referred to engineer.

From W. A. Skene, asking that drain be cleaned at back of Picture Theatre going past several properties in Leichardt St. - Cr. Schlicht - There was no Council drain between Leichardt St. and Neill St, as far as he knew - they were all private drains. - Referred to engineer for report.

From C. T. Whitfield, Speke St., asking for a drain along the said slabs would be required. - Referred to engineer, with power to act.

From Agricultural Society, applying for use of Park for show on Nov. 3rd, with right to run public's booth. Granted, under usual conditions.

Schlicht - Increased costs would easily absorb 60 per cent. The secretary - They could not frame their estimates till they got the final figures. He could bring the estimates out at next meeting; if they accepted the 60 per cent. rise. - This was agreed to; it being understood that a special meeting would be held to strike the rate. The engineer - They were holding their own regard to debit balance and overdraft.

REGISTRATION FOR NATIONAL SERVICE NOTICE TO MEN ATTAINING THE AGE OF 18 YEARS BETWEEN 1st AUGUST and 31st DECEMBER, 1951

Under the National Service Act 1951, all male persons, not exempt under the Act from liability to register, who are British subjects and ordinarily resident in Australia and have attained or will attain the age of 18 years between 1st August, 1951, and 31st December, 1951 (both dates inclusive), ARE REQUIRED TO REGISTER BY 22nd OCTOBER, 1951.

A person who has arrived and intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia as from the time of his arrival. A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he is required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane, or so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf.

EXEMPTIONS The only exemptions from liability to register are: (a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces. (b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Act. (c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal origin living as aborigines.

EARLY REGISTRATION If a male person of 17 years of age, has good reason for wishing to commence his National Service training without waiting until he is required to register, he may register voluntarily if he is not 18. Further details may be obtained from Commonwealth Employment Service Offices.

HOW TO REGISTER Registration Forms (Form N.S.1) are available at all Money Order Post Offices and Commonwealth Employment Service Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in Telephone Directories. Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.

"I saw Jack Naylor chop 41 tons of 5 ft. wood daily where the Spargo Creek Reservoir is to-day. It was in scorching weather," said Mr Steve McKenna, of Brown Hill. Mr McKenna knew the brothers well. He recalled that the brothers' flashing axes once bit into 73 tons of wood which they stacked in six days. This was at Barkstead. Some years ago when John was 66, he supplied Ballan with wood. Daily he went to Barkstead, where he cut 2 1/2 tons of wood and split 25 posts before returning to Ballan at night. "The Naylor Bros. were two of the greatest men ever to send an axe into the hardwoods of Australia's forests," said Mr McKenna.

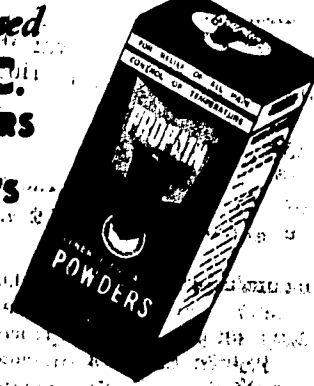

The car was travelling towards Ballarat, and the truck towards Seardsdale. Neither truck occupant was injured, although the vehicle finished on its side partly over the edge of the bridge. Both crawled out of the top of the truck. The car, its sedan roof a mass of wreckage, was wedged firmly against the bridge. Four panels of bridge railing were ripped out by the impact. The accident occurred on the Smythesdale side of the bridge which is on the Linton side of that township. Residents a mile away heard the impact. The dead woman's husband and baby were rushed to Ballarat Base Hospital by Ballarat Motor Ambulance Service. They received severe head injuries and shock. Mrs McDonald leaves two other children, William 10, and Ada 7.

Joe Briody Equals Par at Mt. Xavier
