Paddocks carrying pastures in tended for cutting need to be closed in the early spring. In planning the season's hay making operations, it is necessary to give some thought to their effect on the pastures.

Too frequent cutting of a pasture for grass hay often produces sward composed of fibrous grasses, an excess of rib grass and flat weeds with an absence of over. An excess of rib grass and flatweed is frequently a sign potash deficiency in the soil, and a pasture showing such symoms should not be cut for igrass hav but restored in vigour

by the use of a mixed super-& RAWLINGS phosphate and potash fertilizer. Pastures reserved for grass hay benefit often when harrowed and given a dressing of superphosphate in the early spring, provided such treatment is not aimed at producing an excessively heavy cut of hay. Moderate rather than heavy cuts of grass hay are preferable because they give a bettr quality hay, are easer to cure, are less exhausting on soil fertility and do not have quent growth. Mr Twentyman considers it far better to cut a larger area for moderate yields of good hay than to obtain

NATIONAL SERVICE

NOTICE TO MEN ATTAINING THE AGE OF 18 YEARS BETWEEN 1st AUGUST and 31st DECEMBER, 1951

Under the National Service Act 1951, all male persons, not exempt under the Act from liability to register, who are British subjects and ordinarily resident in Australia and have attained or will attain the age of 18 years between 1st August, 1951, and 31st December, 1951 (both dates inclusive), ARE REDUIRED TO REGISTER BY 22nd OCTOBER, 1951.

A person who has arrived and intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia as from the time of his arrival. A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane or so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf. Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to

the penalties prescribed under the Act. **EXEMPTIONS**

The only exemptions from liability to register are:-(a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces, (b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Act. (c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes; and persons of aboriginal extraction living as aboriginals.

EARLY REGISTRATION If a male person of 17 years of age has good reason for wishing to

commence his National Service training without waiting until he is required to register, he may register voluntarily even though he is not 18. Further Registration Forms (Forms N.S.1) are available at all Money Order Post Offices and Commonwealth Employment Service Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in Telephone Directories. Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.

# REGISTRATION FOR

NATIONAL SERVICE NOTICE TO MEN ATTAINING THE AGE OF 18 YEARS BETWEEN 1st AUGUST and 31st DECEMBER, 1951

Under the National Service Act 1951, all male persons, not exempt under the Act from liability to register, who are British subjects and ordinarily resident in Australia and have attained or will attain the age of 18 years between 1st August, 1951, and 31st December, 1951 (both dates inclusive), ARE REQUIRED TO REGISTER BY 22nd OCTOBER, 1951.

A person who has arrived and intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia as from the time of his arrival. A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he is required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. f a person required to register is insane or so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf. Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to

the penalties prescribed under the Act.

EXEMPTIONS

The only exemptions from liability to register are: (a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces. (b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Act. (c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal extraction living as aboriginals.

EARLY REGISTRATION

If a male person of 17 years of age has good reason for wishing to commence his National Service training without waiting until he is required to register, he may register voluntarily even though he is not 18. Further details may be obtained from Commonwealth Employment Service Offices.

Registration Forms (Forms N.S.1) are available at all Money Order Post Offices and Commonwealth Employment Service Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in Telephone Directories. Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.

#### FAMOUS, AXEMAN PASSES ON ....

An old man who died in the Queen Elizabeth Home las week. reports Ballarat "Courier" of October 11, left behind a grand reputation as an axeman. He was 78-year-old John Naylor - one of two brothers whole fame as axemen was widely known among woodcutters for years in Ballarat districts. Born of a Spanish father, the two men amazed woodcutters at a competition held at Bolwarah more than 42 years ago. They cut and split 25 tons of 5 ft. wood out of standing trees in 71 hours. The other brother, Tom, died at Learmonth 12 months ago. He was remembered for his feat in cutting eight tons of 2 ft. wood out of tough 4 timber from one o'clock to dark. "I saw Jack Naylor chop 11 tons of 5 ft, wood daily where the Spargo Creek Reservoir it to-day. It was in scorehing weather," said Mr Steve McKenna, of Brown Hill. Mr McKenna knew the brothers well. He recalled that the brothers' flashing axes once bit into 73 tons of wood which they stacked in six days. This was at Barkstead. Som years ago when John was 66, he supplied Ballan with wood, o Daily he went to Barkstead, where he cut 2½ tons of wood and split 25 posts before returning to Ballan at night. "The Naylor Bros. were two of the greatest men ever to send an axe into the hardwoods of Australia's forests," said Mr McKenna.

The Naylor Bros. at one time lived at Lexton, and many years ago had a blacksmith's shop at Beaufort.

Par at Mt. Xavier



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
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
