LEGION SPORTS

COMMITTEE SCORES ANOTHER BIG SUCCESS.

Although showery weather was experienced on the morning and in the early afternoon of Foundation Day (Monday), the Legion Axemen's and Cyclists' Carnival at the Beaufort Park was again very successful. There was a large attendance of the public; about 150 cars and buses lining the arena. Gate receipts were about £95—a drop of approximately £20 on last year. A good entry was received for the principal events; leading axemen being present from various parts of Victoria and S. Australia. Among them were Simon Laidlaw and A. A. Brown, who are over 65 years of age and still cutting. Mr Hayden Newey, of the Athletic Club Hotel, Ballarat, conducted the public's booth, and the luncheon and soft drinks booths were in charge of the Legion Ladies' Auxiliary. A boxing booth helped to provide the public with amusement. S/Const. A. B. McIntosh and F/Const. J. Duke had no difficulty in controlling the crowd. A lively musical programme was supplied by the Ballarat Scottish Pipe Band. A band of enthusiastic officials worked well under the leadership of Mr Basil Neil (president) and Messrs. W. Williams and Eric Westin, junr., secretaries. The meeting was well managed, and after each event the used logs and chips were removed in a truck. Results of events were broadcast by Mr Dave Wylie, and Mr A. A. Brown gave an interesting commentary on the competitors in the semi-finals and finals of the chops. Mr E. Morton, M.L.A. for Ripon was among the visitors.

At the close of the programme the logs and chips were auctioned by Mr A. Astbury, and purchased by Mr Tom Lewis for £6/10/.

Mr Basil Neil (president), speaking over the sound system, thanked the public and choppers for their support. Mr E. Morton, M.L.A., in presenting the prize money and trophies to the winners, congratulated the people on the support given the gathering, and the Legion on the way they had conducted the meeting. He mentioned that the gold medal for the championship was the gift of Mr A. E. Crick, one of the members of the original Axemen's Committee of Victoria.

O'Toole, of Melbourne, won by seven blows (completing a double); with J. Caldwell, of Boolara, filling second place. There was good competition in the dancing events.

Sequel to Motor Accident

At the Beaufort Police Court on Monday, before Messrs. J. F. Waters and W. Wilkinson, J.P.s, a debt case was listed in which the summons had not been served.

TRAFFIC CASES. S/Const. A. B. McIntosh charged Allan Smith, of Ballarat, with having a motor cycle recently driven a motor cycle negligently in the public highway.
