## Bright Prospects for Coming Season

### FOOTBALL CLUB: ANNUAL MEETING

### BEAUFORT WHEAT CROP COMPETITION

Report of the Judge — Mr. J. V. Mullaly, B.Agr.Sc., Agricultural Research Officer.

The Wheat Crop Competition conducted by the Beaufort Agricultural Society attracted six entries which were of a high standard, considering the abnormally wet season experienced. Crops were true to type, and except for a few thistles in some cases, were free of any important weeds. The only diseases evident were loose smut and deadheads, but these were not expected to reduce the yield to any marked extent. Most crops showed some unevenness but this is readily explained by the wet conditions and the undulating nature of the district.

The Beaufort district, favoured as it is with a good rainfall, offers scope for the development of improved pastures. Under these conditions, wheat growing is regarded only as a sideline activity. When cereals are grown in such a system of farm management, the best time to prepare the land for cropping depends on a number of factors. If a good clover ley has been established over a number of years, experience at the Rutherglen Research Station can serve as a useful guide. At that Research Station much research has been conducted into the best practices to be followed when growing wheat after clover ley, and it has been shown that autumn cultivation is quite satisfactory. Autumn cultivation has the threefold advantage of providing more grazing in the spring, of allowing the clover to seed, so maintaining the population of "hard" clover seed in the soil for subsequent reconstitution of the clover pasture when the land reverts to pasture after cropping, and of reducing the liability of soil erosion by run-off which is a definite risk on some of the hilly land in the Beaufort district. If the acreage to be cropped is too large to enable the preparation of a satisfactory seedbed with autumn cultivation, late spring cultivation should be undertaken on at least a portion of the area to be sown.

Experiments at Rutherglen have shown that the best implement for breaking up clover ley land to a uniform depth is the mouldboard plough. However, if the soil is in a particularly good condition a disc implement may be preferable and covers a greater acreage per day. The most desirable method to adopt depends entirely on the seasonal soil conditions and the time available to cope with the area planned for cropping. On virgin land or on land which has not carried a good clover pasture, winter following may be necessary. The use of the wheat as a cover crop for the establishment of a clover pasture on such land is an excellent practice.

First prize in the competition was awarded to Mr. J. Jess. The entry consisted of Pinnacle and Quadrat varieties and was a first crop after many years of clover pasture. The land was broken up in June, tandem disc sown and harrowed. Seed was sown at 75 lb/acre and superphosphate was applied at 1 cwt./acre.

Second and third places were gained by Ford Bros. and Daniels Bros. (Quadrat entry) respectively.





**REGISTRATION FOR NATIONAL SERVICE**

**NOTICE TO MEN ATTAINING THE AGE OF 18 YEARS**  
BETWEEN 1st JANUARY and 30th APRIL 1952

Under the National Service Acts 1951, all male persons, not exempt under the Acts from liability to register, who are British subjects and ordinarily resident in Australia and have attained or will attain the age of 18 years between 1st January, 1952, and 30th April, 1952 (both dates inclusive), ARE REQUIRED TO REGISTER BY 10th MARCH, 1952.

A person who has arrived and intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia from the time of his arrival. A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he is required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane or mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is, for the time being must do so on his behalf.

Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to the penalties prescribed under the Acts.

**EXEMPTIONS**

The only exemptions from liability to register are:-

(a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces, or

(b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Acts, and

(c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal extraction living as aborigines.

**EARLY REGISTRATION**

It is a man of 17 years of age has good reason for wishing to commence his military training without waiting until he is required to register, he may register voluntarily even though he is not liable to register, he may obtain Commonwealth Employment Service Office.

Details may be obtained from Commonwealth Employment Service Office.

**HOW TO REGISTER**

Registration Forms (N.S.1) are available at all Money Order Post Offices and Commonwealth Employment Service Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in Telephone Directories. Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.

**POLICE COURT**

RECOGNISED HORSE AFTER TWELVE MONTHS.

The manager of a Ballarat dairy company, reports the "Courier," states that the Clerk of the Court, on March 6, that he identified a horse belonging to his company, as being the same horse, which he had traced 12 months after he had last seen the animal.

It was Ernest John Aitchell, manager of the Modern Dairy, Sturt street, and he was giving evidence against Edward Bennett, 44 horse dealer, of Corbett street, Ballarat.

Bennett was charged with that at Menz Park, near Beaufort, he had stolen a mare and foal belonging to Modern Dairy, and valued at £20; and that he had stolen a mare and foal between the same dates, stolen another horse, belonging to a person unknown, and valued at £6.

After six police witnesses had given evidence, Mr J. Dugan, S.M., adjourned the hearing until the following Wednesday. Then two more police witnesses had been heard.

Aitchell said that on February 6, he went to Delaney's, near where he saw a bay delivery horse enter the ring. He recognised the horse as having been from a paddock at Alfreton when it was out for a spell. He said that which he approached Bennett, the latter said the animal had been running wild near Beaufort.

"FENCES BROKEN"

Earlier witnesses, Stanley Rupert Pascoe, farmer of Menz Park, and Andrew Ripon, day worker of Chapskove, said that during the past year three horses, including the two involved in the case, had been wandering about the district. They had been breaking down fences to get into properties.

Ripon said that although Bennett had never told him, he understood that Bennett and the ranger worked in together.

The ranger, Cecil Taylor, of Chapskove, said in evidence that he saw Bennett in Beaufort, and asked him to give a hand in getting the horses into Beaufort.

Ripon continued that on February 6 he saw four horses in the district, two of which he identified as answering the description of the horses involved. When he asked Bennett who gave him authority to remove the animals, he allegedly replied, "Andrew Aitchell."

Raymond James Taylor, of 9 Palling street, Ballarat, said that about February 11 he and Bennett went to Menz Park, and took four horses to Beaufort, and later to Ballarat.

Mr Dugan then adjourned the hearing until the following Wednesday.

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





We are proud of the Beaufort-Skipton Team, comprised of members of our Club and the Skipton Club, which won the District Shield.

In spite of a generous donation of £50 from the Associates, the scheme to finance the purchase of a new gang of mowers by the issue of debentures had to be abandoned, because of lack of support from members. The Committee has made other financial arrangements. The mowers have been ordered and will arrive soon.

Many improvements are necessary at the Club House. I hope members will give earnest consideration to this matter and devise some means of raising money for this purpose.

The Committee feels that praise is due to the greenkeeper for the excellence of the scrapes last year. The prohibition of the use of scrapers also contributed in this direction.

Your Committee have been most assiduous in the discharge of their duties. The Club is indeed fortunate to have men who are prepared to devote so much of their time to the welfare of the Club and its members.

May I ask all members to do their utmost to make this coming season a very successful one, and may 1952 be for you all a golfing season of unprecedented achievements.
