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





In other areas which have been over ropped (even years ago) or cut too frequently for grass hay, or ubjected to bad grazing mangement, there may be a serious deficiency of soil potash. CAN A HAYSTACK BE SAVED?

By "An Observer." The spirit of "Help one an-

other" was never more evident than at the stack fires on Mr Drew's property at Raglan recently.

Watching men work in a chain to pass unburnt hay along a line out of harm's way, and others working in extremely difficult conditions to laboriously fork hay from the stack, wet to the skin from necessary jets of water, one could not but feel proud of the community spirit so evident amongst country folk in times of need.

It was indeed a thrill to note the ready response -- particularly from Urban Brigade members - to orders necessarily shouted over the noise of enggines, flames and voices; and to note the unselfish disregard of wearing apparel, particularly a uniform of blue.

The ready response of the ladies to muster a meal for those who arrived without tea, also provided "food for thought."

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL **ELECTIONS**

The Divisional Returning Officer for Corangamite (Mr Wm. Dunstan, 176 Murray St., Colac) advises that a reprint of rolls has been effected and subdivisional copies may now be inspected at all Post Offices.

State Legislative Council Elections will be held 21st June next, when adult persons over 21 years of of age and enrolled, must vote.

At the triennial elections, 1949, a property or professional claim operated to secure enrolment, but this qualification was repealed by Act of Parliament, 1/11/1951, in favour of adult franchise.

It is anticipated that rolls will close some weeks prior to election date for the reprint of a Supplemental Roll.

A review of subdivisional enrolment subsequent to the Referendum reveals that many persons entitled to vote remain unenrolled while others have failed to notify change of address.

The Commonwealth Electoral Act prescribes a penalty not exceeding £2 for contravention of its Compulsory enrolment or Change of Address provisions. Persons in doubt are therefore urged to examine their position to avoid further action being taken.

Notification to the Electoral Office os compulsory after one month's residence and electoral claim cards are available at any Post Office.

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
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
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
