## Comradeship, Service, Sacrifice

### ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATION SERVICE

The 37th anniversary of Anzac Day was fittingly observed at Beaufort.

After making a pilgrimage to the Cemetery, under the auspices of the Ripon Sub-branch, R.S.L., about 40 ex-service men marched to the Memorial Park, headed by the Town Band, and followed by the Scouts and Guides.

The impressive commemoration service at the local Shrine, which was conducted by Envoy Bywaters, of the Salvation Army, was attended by a fair number of citizens. Mr C. H. McKay (president of the Ripon R.S.L. and State Country Vice-president) presided. The Town Band (under Mr R. Saddler) assisted.

The National Anthem opened the service, and was followed by the hymn, "O God Our Help in Ages Past" and The Lord's Prayer.

Wreaths were placed on the Shrine as follows:—R.S.L., Mr McKay; R.S.L. Women's Auxiliary, Mrs C. Ward; Fathers' Association, Mr J. K. Finlin; Mothers' Auxiliary, Mrs J. Duke; Legion, Mr Freestun-Neville; Shire of Ripon, Cr. H. J. Buchanan; Scouts and Guides.

Among the private wreaths were those from Mrs R. Dooley and Mrs W. Chibnall, of Melbourne.

Two minutes' silence was observed, after which Envoy Bywaters read a prayer for the fallen, and the hymn, "Abide With Me" was sung.

The Anzac Day address was delivered by Mr F. F. Dunn, M.M., O.B.E., who was introduced by Mr McKay.

### COMRADESHIP, SERVICE AND SACRIFICE.

To-day, said Mr Dunn, was Anzac Day — Australia's national day. He urged them to forget the everyday things of life and concentrate their minds on the reason of their gathering that afternoon. If they did, they would to some extent realise the importance of the occasion. The older ones could take their minds back to 25th April, 1915, when the Australians, the New Zealanders, the 29th British Division, and French troops landed on the craggy cliffs of Gallipoli against the Turkish Army. That was the first large scale military force of Australia up to the time. It was one of the greatest military achievements in history. The Turkish Army was held in a vice and made incapable of effective action elsewhere. That was the beginning of Anzac Day.

To-day they commemorated the 37th anniversary of that day, and on that day Australia was raised to the stature of nationhood and became entitled to take her place at the council table of Empire. Many gallant men gave their lives on that day and many thousands more were maimed.

The Australians served in every theatre of war in the years following from 1914 to 1918, and tremendous sacrifices were made on land and sea, and in France, Belgium and Mesopotamia.

When the nation was called to fight for freedom again in 1939 the great spirit of Anzac still lived. The men and women of Australia responded to the call.

The same great sacrifices were made and the same bravery shown as on the first day at Gallipoli, by those who served in the desert at Libya, Bardia, Tobruk, and in Greece and Crete, and the jungles of Malaya and New Guinea.

Today the Australian soldier, sailor and airman was taking his part in serving Australia with the United Nations' Forces serving in Korea.

Their sacrifices were matchless — all they had they gave. The men and women they honoured to-day served even unto death. Most of the graves into which they were lying were in far-off lands, and there were many unknown graves on the battlefields on which they fought. Anzac Day was a reminder of a grim period in the history of Australia. There must be

something they could learn from Anzac Day. He would like to bring forward three qualities of these men and women, which were — (1) comradeship; (2) service; and (3) sacrifice.

Touching on comradeship, Mr Dunn said the Australian soldier was a great mate and a great friend to everyone. With his comrades he would share his last cigarette and loaf of bread. He had no need to give examples of the sacrifice made by these men, which was outstanding.

To give service it was necessary to make sacrifice, and great sacrifice was made by those who served their country. Greater sacrifice could not be made than by those they honoured to-day, who gave their lives for this country and humanity in general.

The three qualities he had mentioned were outstanding from a soldier's point of view. He would like to try and encourage the people here to-day to bring these three same qualities into their own particular lives. If they could do that, this would be a much better world to live in.

While they honoured the dead, let them not forget the living. There were many thousands of returned men and women suffering from war-caused defects. The R.S.L. was endeavouring to put into practice these three qualities mentioned. They were trying to help those people less fortunate than themselves. In Melbourne alone there were 2500 ex-servicemen and women in hospital, and they were endeavouring to help these by a Hospital Visitation Committee, and to show that comradeship they knew on service. Every Sunday throughout the year the Committee visited these Hospitals. The service they tried to give they knew was what the men they left behind would expect them to give. Sacrifices were made to do that by 300 men of the sub-branches in Melbourne. He did not say that in a boastful way. He hoped they would resolve to heed what the speaker said at their Anzac service, and try to show comradeship to others, give service, and make sacrifices to do so.

To ascertain ways of doing so, they should contact their local sub-branch and support it in everything it did. He could assure them that every pound it received would be used for the right purpose.

In conclusion, he urged them not to go away from the service with the thought, "Thank God that is over for another 12 months. Wherever a few returned soldiers met, they stood in memory of fallen comrades — they did not expect people to do that all the time, but expected them to give some consideration during the 12 months intervening between Anzac Day services to those who needed their help. That was not too much to ask — only a small service.

Of those to whom they did honour to-day it had been written —

They will not grow old  
 As we who are left grow old—  
 Age will not weary them;  
 Nor the years condemn;  
 At the going down of the sun  
 And in the morning,  
 We will remember them.  
 "Lest we forget."

Kipling's Recessional was then sung.

Mr McKay apologised for the absence of the clergymen, and thanked Envoy Bywaters for leading them in prayer. He appealed to them to give their help in maintaining that service to the living so ably pointed out by Mr Dunn. The R.S.L. had instituted certain War Veterans' Homes, taken up welfare work for many children of ex-servicemen, and conducted a Family Health Bureau. Recently they purchased an estate on the Murray at Burnewang where 30 or 40 aged men would be cared for, and they catered at St. Kilda House for aged women of the Services. The League could not entirely finance these institutions, and once or twice a year asked for the help of the public for them. Spiralling prices made it more expensive to keep these Houses going. A

flag was placed before them into which they were asked to throw their contributions to-day.

Bandsman R. L. Crick sounded "The Last Post," followed by "The Reveille."

Subsequently the ex-servicemen were given afternoon tea at the C.W.A. Hall by the R.S.L. Women's Auxiliary, and a short address was made by Mr Dunn.

The secretarial duties were in the hands of Mr Norman Lamb.

### SOIL CONSERVATION IN PYRENEES AREA

#### BEAUFORT FARMER WINS 1952 COMPETITION.

The Hanslow Cup for competition in the Pyrenees Soil Conservation District has been won this year by Mr J. L. Kirkpatrick, of "Warrawong," Beaufort.

This property was formerly badly affected by sheet erosion, tunnelling and gulleying, but is now a fine example of what can be done with an eroded property. In 1938 when "Warrawong" was first taken over, it carried 700 sheep and was badly rabbit infested. In 1951, 1470 sheep were shorn for a total of 44 bales, weighing 14,261 lb., a return of 20 lb. of wool per acre. The property was brought into better production by following, breaking down tunnels, scooping to fill tunnels and gullies, cultivating the whole area and sowing with perennial rye, Mt. Barker sub. clover and a cover crop of 2 bushels of oats and 120 lb. super to the acre.

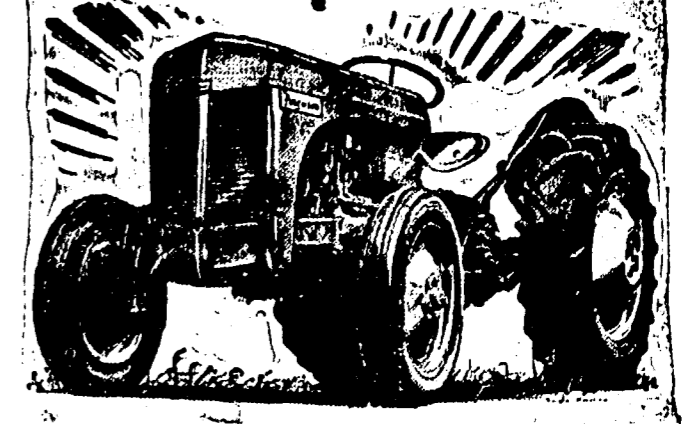

At the opening of the series on Monday, 21st April, competition was keen and widespread, with the result that when compared with rates at the close of the pre-Easter Geelong sales; merino types advanced by 5 per cent., comeback types by 5 per cent., to 10 per cent. fine and medium crossbreds 10 per cent., strong crossbred 20 per cent. At their sale on the 22nd, buoyant competition resulted in merino and comeback types showing a further increase of 2½ per cent. on the previous day's rates. 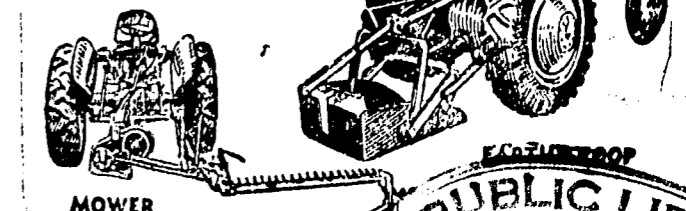

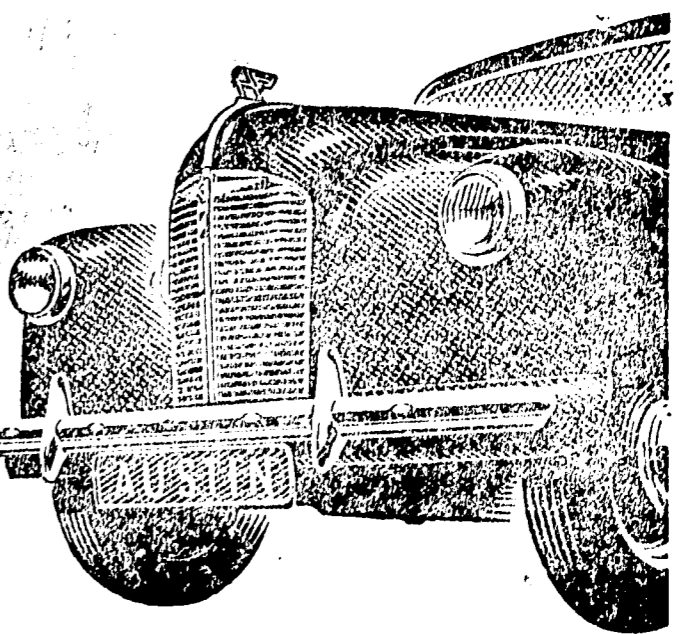

INQUEST FINDING OF ACCIDENTAL DEATH.

An inquest touching the death of Mrs. Lillian Sice, of Beaufort, who was killed when accidentally struck by a motor car at the intersection of Stuart and Speke Sts., Beaufort, on the night of April 3, was conducted at the Court House, Beaufort, on Monday by Mr. W. Wilkinson, J.P.

Secior-Constable A. B. McIntosh conducted the proceedings on behalf of the police, and Mr. W. J. Hall (of Curwen-Walker, Hall & Samuel Wynn) appeared on behalf of Mr. T. R. Lewis.

Thomas Robert Lewis, wood contractor, Halpin Street, Beaufort, gave evidence that at 8.15 p.m. on 3rd April, he was driving a motor car along Speke St., Beaufort, at 15 m.p.h. approaching Stuart St. intersection.

Dr. G. G. Little, Beaufort, stated that on 3rd April he examined Lillian Sice, who was unconscious. He found multiple lacerations of the scalp and left arm, and the base of the skull was fractured. Her condition rapidly deteriorated and she died at 11 p.m. on the same day.

Secior-Constable A. B. McIntosh, Beaufort, stated that at 9 p.m. on 3rd April he was called to the scene of an accident at the intersection of Stuart and Speke Sts., Beaufort. He saw a car off the side of the road on its incorrect side.

Mr. Wilkinson found that Lillian Sice died from injuries received when accidentally struck by a motor car, driven by T. R. Lewis, at Beaufort, on 3rd April of this year.

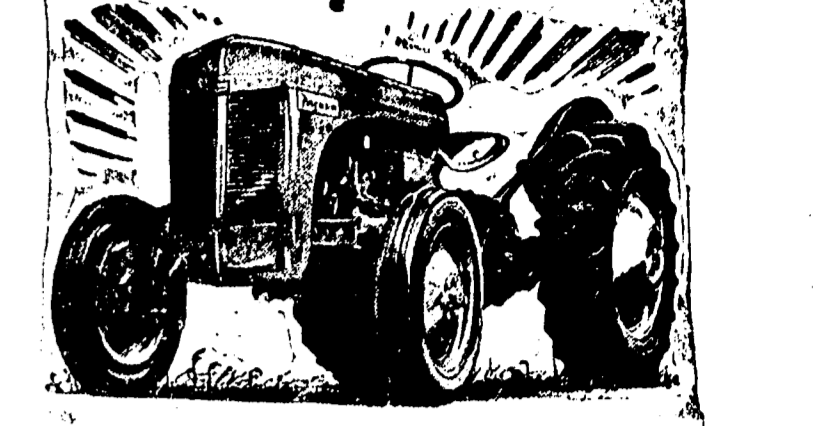

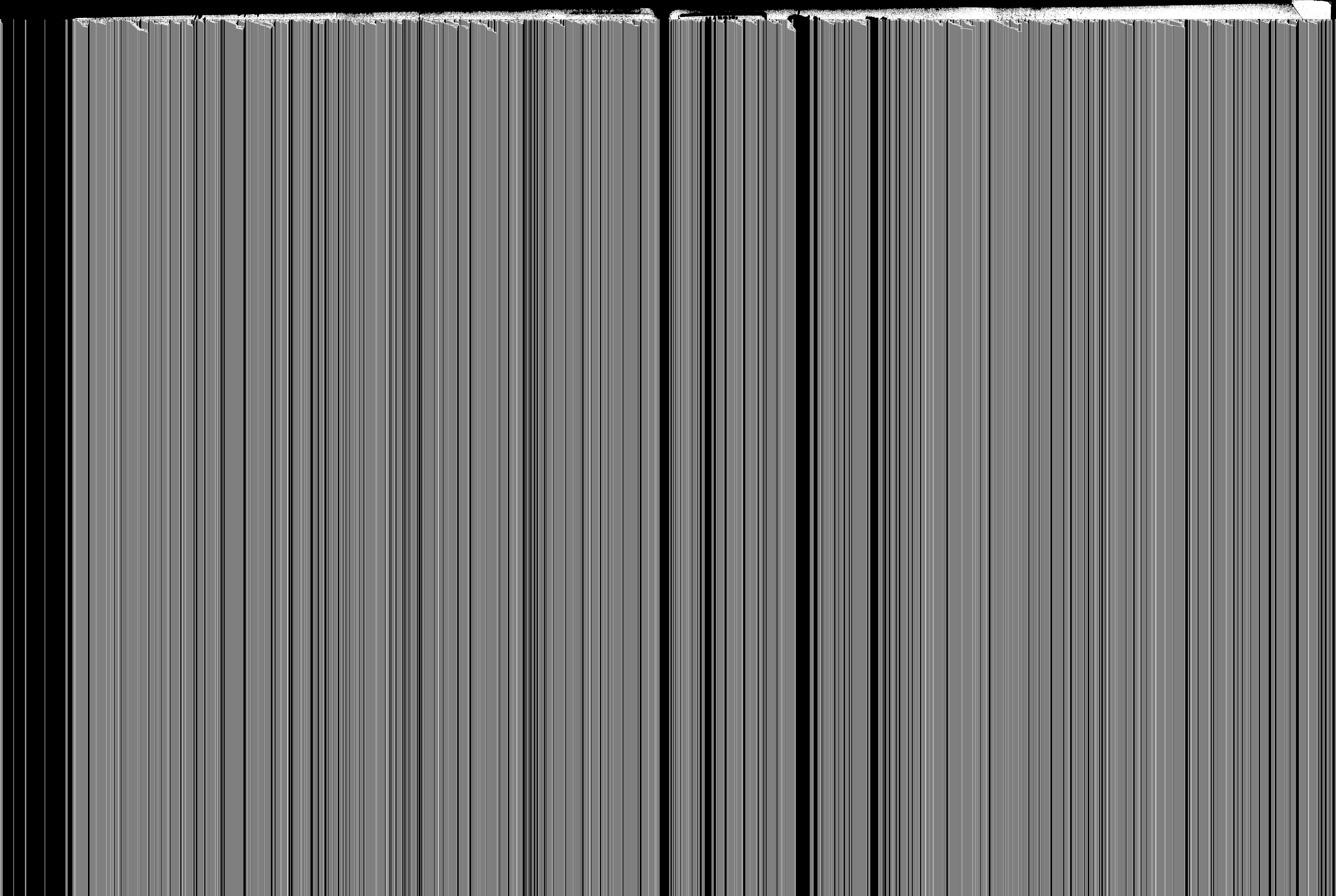

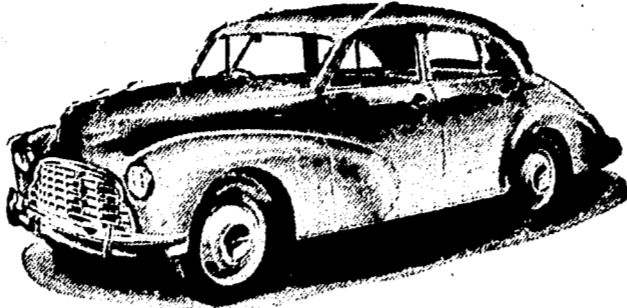
VARIETY ON PARADE
