



The position is that newsprint, which used to cost us between £5 and £6 a 5 cwt. bale in pre-war days, now costs £43 a 6 cwt. bale to land at Beaufort — it went up about £20 a ton after the depreciation of sterling last year. So you see we can't afford to waste newsprint by printing extra coplies just on the offchance of selling a few of them.

The Commonwealth Government is subsidising benefits paid by registered Hospital Benefit Organisations (see list below) to contributors who are paying

The minimum weekly benefits now provided for hospital fund contributors charged for hospital treatment are:

Commonwealth Ordinary Benefit 2 16 -£6 6 -

The additional Commonwealth Benefit is payable from the moment the first contribution is paid to the Hospital Benefit Organisation if the contributor or a dependant incurs hospital charges in an approved hospital. The Hospital Benefit Organisation payments are made according to its rules.

HOW TO BECOME ENTITLED TO THESE BENEFITS.

· Join a registered Hospital Benefit Organisation. · Benefits offered by organisations depend on rates of contribution but they must provide at least 6/- a day or £2/2/- a week. The organisations will supply details of

their benefits, rates of contributions and other conditions on application. For single persons the usual contribution to a hospital benefit fund is 3d. a week which entitles the member to fund benefit of £2/2/or more weekly. With Commonwealth subsidies of £4/4/. the

member receives combined benefits of at least £6/6/. a week while incurring hospital charges. A married man may take out hos pital insurance with an organisation to, cover himself, his wife and children. The organisation will provide benefit of at least £2/2/- a week and with the Commonwealth subsidies of £4/4/-, £6/6/- or more is available to him each week while any member of the

family is being charged for hospital

The organisations usually provid higher benefits for higher contributions. A person who contributes for fund benefit of, for example, £4/4/- a week is still entitled to the Commonwealth subsidies of £4/4/and thus has £8/8/- a week total benefits available for hospital

expenses. The Commonwealth additional benefit of 4/- a day (£1/8/- a week) is being paid or allowed through the registered Hospital Benefit Organisations. This is strictly for members of the organisations and their dependants only.

The Commonwealth ordinary benefit of 8/- a day (£2/16/- a week) will be deducted from the patient's hospital account as usual. Safeguard yourself against hospital



# NATIONAL (SERVICE

NOTICE TO MEN ATTAINING THE AGE OF 18 YEARS BETWEEN 1st MAY and 31st AUGUST, 1952

Under the National Service Acts 1951, all male persons, not exempt under the Acts from liability to register, who are British subjects and ordinar ly resident in Australia and have attained or will attain the age of 18 years between 1st May, 1952, and 31st August, 1952 (both dates inclusive), ARE REQUIRED TO REGISTER BY 2nd JUNE, 1952.

A person who has arrived and intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia es from the time of his arrival.

A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he is required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane of so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf.

Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to the penalties prescribed under the Acts.

The only exemptions from liability to register are:-(a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces,

(b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Acts, (c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal extraction living is aborigines. If a male person of 17 years of age has good reason for wishing to

to register, he may register voluntarily even though he is not 18. Further details may be obtained from Commonwealth Employment Service Offices. HOW TO REGISTER

Registration Forms (Forms N.S.1) are available at all Money Order Post Offices and Commonwealth Employment Service Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in Telephone Directories, Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.
