

ADDITIONAL TRUNK LINE CHANNELS BETWEEN MELBOURNE AND SYDNEY

Twenty-four new telephone trunk line channels were brought into Melbourne on 30th April. Since the end of the war there has been an unprecedented demand for trunk facilities between Sydney and Melbourne. On the main direct route the number of channels has increased from 36 at the end of 1939 to 45 at present. Modern multi-channel carrier telephone systems have made it possible for the Department to increase the number of circuits on all its main trunk line routes. Point-to-point channels are approximately 80 per cent of the existing trunk channels between Melbourne and Sydney are equipped for direct dialling between the two centres. Mr Anthony (P.M.G.) said that the Department would press on with the equipping of other channels.

DISTRICT NEWS ITEMS

Trawalla

WET JUNE
 Trawalla has had a very wet June. Not only the quantity of rain but the constant falls have left our roads in a shocking state. Many are the reports of bogged cars and trucks. The rainfall for June is 326 points, while the total to date for the year is 1022 points.

ELECTION DAY

Messrs. C. W. and A. Broadbent had a constant occupation on Saturday, June 21, at the local polling booth on the occasion of the Legislative Council election when over 100 persons cast their votes in spite of a very showery day.

FREE MILK SCHEME

The local children are now participating in the Free Milk Scheme. This has been made possible by the co-operation of the distributor, the local railway staff and the head teacher.

REPAIRS TO CHURCH LANE

The shire grader is at present working on the Church Lane, which was more like a creek than a road for the past month; school children from the Trawalla Estate finding it difficult to get along and remain dry.

VISIT OF MR BOLTE

LOCAL PROBLEMS DISCUSSED

During his recent visit to this area, the Hon. H. E. Bolte, Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the State Parliament discussed several local problems.

SOLDIER SETTLEMENT

Probably the most topical was the question of Soldier Settlement, on which we have already published a statement from Mr Bolte.

HOUSING COMMISSION HOMES

Mr Bolte said he was very disturbed that no steps have been taken by the Housing Commission to value Housing Commission homes so that they may be offered to the tenants for purchase. The present position is that some of the tenants who wish to buy the homes from the Commission will not be able to do so for five years until the whole settlement is completed. They will not even know the cost until then. As the scheme involves only 14 houses at the moment, Mr Bolte said steps should be immediately taken by the Commission to put a price on these homes, and so allow tenants to start paying off the principal instead of paying rent for the houses over a long period.

PENAL FARM AT LANGI KAL KAL

Mr Bolte said he also found a great deal of concern in regard to the Penal Farm at Langi Kal Kal. He said he understood there were 30 youths at the Farm and that there had been 30 escapes since the Farm was started. Originally the Farm was set up as a rehabilitation centre for first offenders, but this principle has apparently been abandoned. Mr Bolte said he would take steps to investigate the present basis of commitments to this Farm.

END OF SOLDIER SETTLER PLAN

Loan cuts had brought soldier settlement to a standstill, Mr C. McKay, Returned Servicemen's League Land Settlement Committee Chairman, said on Wednesday, June 9.

The Soldier Settlement Commission had informed the R.S.L. that the cuts had ended the settlement, he said. Mr McKay added, "We have 6000 men who have been waiting nearly seven years for land. This is a gross repudiation of a promise given to the men when they were away, and on their return. Not only is the State letting returned men down, it is letting Australia down. This country has a responsibility to develop food production to the utmost. The value of soldier settlement has been proved. Production figures from purchased estates have increased two and a half times under the scheme. Mr McDonald, Premier, is not allocating loan moneys to the full advantage of the State. Drastic action is needed immediately. If the Premier will not do it, each of the 430 R.S.L. branches in Victoria will call on their Parliamentary members to deal with the matter on the floor of the House."

At a meeting of the Ballarat A. & P. Society, Mr J. K. Pickford, of Bunangor, was appointed judge of fine and superior merino ewes at the sheep show to be held in August. Mr F. S. Taylor, of Beaufort, is to judge the farmers' and soldier settlers' classes.







INCREASED CALLING FEE FROM PUBLIC TELEPHONE

In order that the Post Office may be better able to meet the higher costs being incurred, it is proposed to increase the fee for local calls from a public telephone from 2d to 3d, said the Postmaster-General (Mr. Anthony) to-day. This adjustment will also bring the Public telephone calling fee into line with that paid by subscribers in the capital cities and other large centres of Australia. The fee for a public telephone conversation has remained unchanged since 1915, when it was raised from 1d to 2d and in the interim wages costs of materials have risen greatly. An increase to 3d would have taken effect with a general increase in rates for telephone calls in July, 1951, but for the technical problem of providing, in automatic telephone exchange areas, coin attachments capable of operation only on the insertion of three pennies. A suitable design has now been developed, but as there are more than 8,400 automatic public telephones in service in Australia, the manufacture of the special apparatus required in the conversion of all existing attachments must necessarily occupy considerable time. As a first step, the Post Office will obtain equipment from Australian sources, and present indications are that it will be available within twelve months. As it comes to hand, the equipment will be used to convert automatic in accordance with a predetermined programme. Meanwhile, the fee for a call from a public telephone connected to manual exchanges will not be raised to 3d. More than 100,000,000 calls are originated yearly from public telephones throughout the Commonwealth, added Mr. Anthony and an increase in the fee from 2d to 3d could produce, ultimately, additional revenue of the order of £500,000 a year.



SCHOOL COMMITTEE MONTHLY MEETING

It was decided to draw the attention of the Education Department to the long delay in installing the Cookery Room at the July meeting of the Beaufort H.E. School Committee on Monday night.

Mr. W. Thompson (chairman) presided, and five members and Mr. A. H. Ruxton (head teacher) were present.

The Shire Engineer's account was held over till a further letter was received from the Education Department.

It was decided that any buck-jumping, show or circus wishing to use the old school playground (near Gun Club grounds) be charged £1 a night, on motion of Messrs. A. Crick and J. Ahern.

It was resolved to write to Mr. Ackerley (who has left the district), asking for his resignation, so that the vacancy on the committee can be filled.

Mr. Crick undertook to see Mr. Paul about work on the school oval.

Mr. Ruxton, H.T., reported that he had received nomination forms to fill the vacancy on the committee, and would send them out to parents before next meeting. One of the lady teachers had obtained private board. Miss McKenzie was leaving in September. He had a letter from the National Safety Council in regard to safety precautions on the Highway opposite the school and forwarding the necessary flags and arm-bands for safety monitors, and giving legal opinion as to liability of teachers. He also had a visit from Mr. Linston and two C.R.B. engineers, as the result of which the signposts had been shifted to better positions. He proposed only to put the flags up on the Highway when the children were being dismissed at 12 noon and 4 p.m.

The Chairman — The matter originated with the Progress Association.

The head teacher presented two small accounts totalling 16/ for payment. — These were duly authorised.

The head teacher presented a balance-sheet of the Works and Buildings Account for 12 months, which showed a Cr. balance of £45/18/4 for the school, and £12/12/3 for the residence. — Adopted, on motion of Messrs. A. Crick and A. A. Wilkinson.

The head teacher said further delay had occurred in regard to the wiring of the cookery room. The school attendance was 210 in the Primary School and 66 in the H.E. School; total, 276. They planted 690 pine trees on the tree planting day on one acre, and the children seemed to enjoy the outing. The school drain was blocked. The Education week would be held from 10th to 16th August, and the details had to be worked out yet. A cup presented by Mr. A. Campbell to the school boys who played the curtain-raiser at the football match last Saturday was on view. The cup would be used for annual competition. They should try and get the cookery room, which had been started 3 1/2 years ago, finalised. Water was pouring under the building, and he suggested that they write to the Department and draw attention to the state the building had been left in. It would not be used for another 12 months the way it was going. They should be asked to finish it by the end of the term.

Mr. A. Crick moved to that effect. Seconded by Mr. J. Ahern, and carried.

Mr. Ahern moved that Mr. Campbell be written to and thanked for donating the cup. Seconded by Mr. A. A. Wilkinson and carried.

Beaufort - Skipton was too strong for the lads in that match, and entered the final against Midlands.


