## GOOD SHOOTING AND FINANCING

### RIFLE CLUB ANNUAL MEETING

A successful year financially and in regard to shooting was disclosed by the reports at the annual meeting of the Beaufort Rifle Club, held at the new shed on the range on Wednesday night, 23rd July. Mr W. J. Waldron (captain) presided. Sixteen members were present.

**Correspondence**  
Correspondence was read from the Supervisor of Rifle Clubs, Defence Department, stating that three tenders should be obtained for cutting timber on the rifle range. — Received.

From Ballarat Rifle Club, inviting two representatives to smoke social and presentation of trophies on Friday night, 25th July. — Received.  
From Northcote Rifle Club, asking if a match could be arranged the same as last year. — Received.

**BALANCE-SHEET**  
The treasurer (Mr Ken Whitaker) presented a balance-sheet for the past year showing:—Receipts, £247/15/5; expenditure, £140. Cr. balance, £97/13/9; cash in hand, £14/4/26. Outstanding accounts reduced the Cr. balance to £59/6/8.

The year commenced with a Cr. balance of £87/3/3. Mr A. J. Saph certified to the correctness of accounts.  
The secretary (Mr C. S. Gillingham) said when the outstanding accounts were paid, the shed would be completely paid for.

The balance-sheet was adopted, on motion of Messrs. W. Waller and E. Gillingham.

**CAPTAIN'S REPORT**  
The captain (Mr J. Waldron) said they had wound up a successful year. The main improvement had been to the shed, where they could now hold meetings and socials if they wished to. They had their heads well ahead of it financially. He would like to see more financial members. In teams' shoots they had not been beaten on this range, and had run a close second in the Skene Shield competition. He had held the position of captain since the club started, and would like to see someone else take it over. He thanked the secretary, treasurer, and members for their past help.

**ELECTION OF OFFICERS**  
Mr K. Owen was appointed interim chairman for the election of officers.  
The officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows:—Captain, Mr W. Waller (who was complimented by the retiring captain, who wished him every success); secretary, Mr K. Owen (Messrs. C. S. Gillingham and K. Whitaker declining nomination); treasurer, Mr K. Whitaker; committee, Messrs. J. Waldron, Ron Dunn, A. E. Hughes, and C. S. Gillingham; vice-captain, Mr J. McKenzie; handicapper, Mr Ron Dunn.  
At this stage Mr Waller took the chair.

**General Business**  
The matter of dealing with tenders for clearing wood from the range was left in the captain's hands.  
Messrs. J. McKenzie and K. Owen were appointed to attend the smoke social of the Ballarat Rifle Club.  
Mr C. S. Gillingham conveyed the sympathy of the members to Messrs. Waller and Owen in the illness of their wives.  
The captain and secretary are to act as delegates to the Ballarat District Rifle Clubs' Union, and the meeting at Stawell in connection with the Skene Shield Competition.

It was decided to accept the invitation of the Northcote Club to a match, and to arrange one before October, if possible.  
Mr E. Gillingham moved that the Supervisor of Rifle Clubs be written to in regard to two 900 yds. targets. Seconded by Mr K. Whitaker, and carried.  
Mr Owen suggested that the shire be approached to allow an 800 yds. mound to be made outside the reserve, to be used in the summer when there was no golf. He moved to that effect. Seconded by Mr P. Larkens, and carried.

It was decided to continue the local teams' matches, on motion of Mr A. E. Hughes, snapped by Mr Owen. A monthly aggregate for spoons is also to be held.  
Mr Owen moved that a knock-out pairs competition be held for spoons. — Agreed to.  
A replica (as nearly as possible) of the Mackenzie Cup is to be obtained for each year's winner, to be retrospective, and the original cup is to be inscribed with each year's winner and the score; the cup to be handed in a fortnight beforehand.  
The member's subscription was fixed at 5/.

It was decided to circularise all members on the nominal roll for subscriptions.  
Mr Owen said he would like to see some rules about handicapping, or a chart drawn up. — It was decided to borrow a copy of the McGill chart.

Mr Ron Dunn asked if it were possible to run a local prize meeting.  
Mr C. S. Gillingham said it could be done, but entries would have to be limited. The club was holding £10/10/ for a prize meeting.

Mr Waldron said the holes in the stop - butt mounds would have to be filled up.  
Mr Ron Dunn moved that the committee draw up a programme for a prize meeting and submit it to headquarters and fix a date. Seconded by Mr P. Larkens and carried.

An account for 19/8 was passed for payment.  
A trophy brought back from Mildura by Mr Ron Dunn is to be shot for.  
Mr C. S. Gillingham presented a trophy to Mr Dave Harrison, which he won in an aggregate competition.

The sum of £2 petty cash was voted to the secretary.  
The retiring secretary and captain reported on equipment held by the club.  
It was decided to arrange a smoke night on similar lines to last; Messrs. W. Waller, K. Owen, P. Larkens, C. S. Gillingham, and G. Mulcahy being placed in charge of the catering, etc. Neighboring clubs are to be invited.

Mr J. Waldron suggested that trophies donated by members and business people be shot for on certain days. He moved that the committee try and arrange this, and draw up a syllabus. Seconded by Mr Waller, and carried.  
The secretary is to write to other clubs the club usually has matches with and arrange dates.

Most of the members present (14) promised to donate trophies.  
Mr Ron Dunn suggested a six-months' championship, and promised a trophy.  
Mr C. S. Gillingham promised a trophy for the second half-year.

Mr Larkens moved that an appreciative minute be recorded of the good work of the past secretary and captain. This was seconded and heartily supported by Mr W. Waller, and carried.  
Messrs. C. S. Gillingham and Waldron returned thanks.

### LEXTON FOOTBALL LEAGUE

#### RAGLAN EASILY DEFEATED BY NAVARRE

Although at the head of the list, Raglan failed to show premiership form on Saturday, when they were defeated by Navarre by the wide margin of 33 points. There was a good attendance at the Raglan Oval, and although it was a sunny day, the ground was in a very muddy state from recent rains and cut up easily. The central umpire was Micklejohn.

**NAVARRE LEADS EARLY**  
Play in the opening term was fairly even; Navarre having six scoring shots for 3.3 and Raglan eight for 1.7. The long string of behinds so early in the game was probably the deciding factor against Raglan. Laurie Hannett secured Navarre's first goal, as the result of a hand-out from Friend. Some nice passing by Raglan men gave Alex. Cuthbertson the opportunity to register maximum points. After Parry had goal for Navarre, a shot by Laurie Hannett hit the goal post for a single. Marking nicely, Parry again obtained a major point for Navarre. The visitors led by eight points at quarter-time.

In the second quarter Navarre continued to have the better of the encounter by adding 2.5; Raglan scoring 1.2. A snapshot by Duncan gave Raglan their second goal. Les Hannett was doing great work on Navarre's back line. Parry took another good mark, and the outcome was a goal for Navarre. Awarded a free, Parry scored the visitors' fifth goal with an angle shot. At half-time Navarre had the handy lead of 17 points.

Its winning margin was six matches to three.

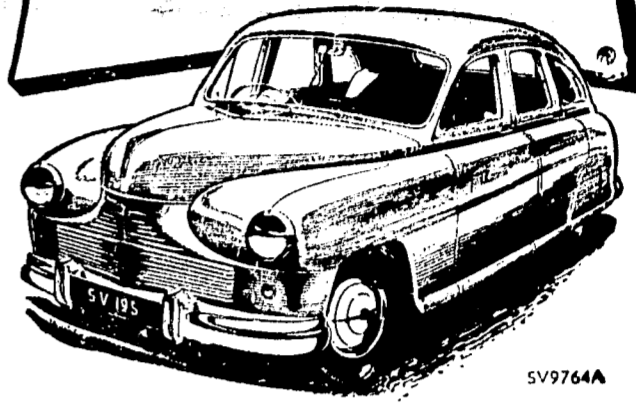

A DRAINAGE SCHEME for the Western Area of Beaufort will have to be prepared and the Council's instructions are asked for.

2. SHIRE WORKS: Financial position of Shire Works is as follows:—

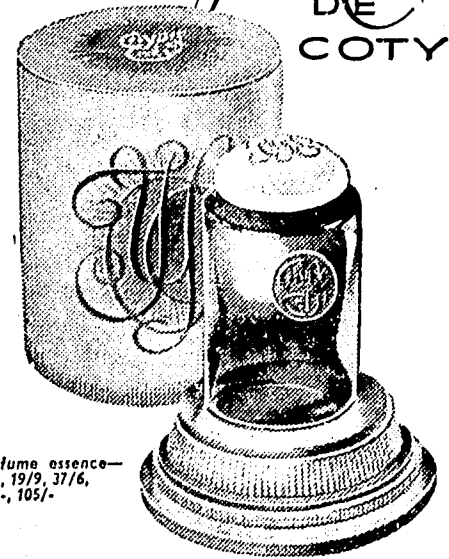

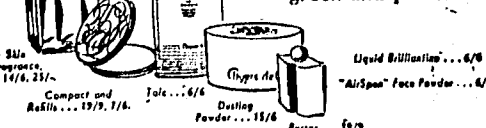

**PROGRESS ASSOCIATION**

**COMMITTEE MEETING**

Many matters of local interest  
cropped up at the monthly meet-  
ing of the Committee of Beau-  
fort Progress Association held  
on Monday night at the Shire  
Hall. There was an attendance  
of nine members: Rev. A. L.  
Mills (president) presiding.

Apologies were received for  
the absence of Mr G. Grant and  
Miss Gwen Young.  
In answer to a question, Mr  
Linsten said the Shire Council  
had no power to fix a speed  
limit for the Western Highway.

The President said he saw the  
Safety Council flags being used  
by the School to-day.

Mr Linsten said the Council  
was interested in the Youth  
Travel Scheme, and had written  
further to the "Sun". The present  
tour was not yet finished.  
In answer to the President Mr  
Linsten said there was a com-  
plete road scheme planned for  
the Housing Commission Estate,  
but the C.R.B. and Council had  
not yet made up their minds  
about it.

In reply to further questions,  
Mr Linsten said the lights were  
to be installed at the Park. The  
Agricultural Society suggested a  
telephone in the secretary's of-  
fice at the Park with a key, and  
that all societies using the Park  
be asked to bear the cost of ren-  
tal and calls.

The secretary (Mr R. S. Pitt)  
reported a Cr. balance of £113.  
—Received.

It was decided that a financial  
statement be presented at each  
meeting.

**Correspondence**

Correspondence was read from  
the Pre-School Building Com-  
mittee, re annual meeting. —  
The President said the plans  
were being finalised.  
From Imperial Chemical Indus-  
tries Australia and N.Z., in re-  
ference to killing weeds at Lake,  
and asking for samples of  
weeds to be sent. — The secre-  
tary said he had approached the  
Anglers Club, who would secure  
specimens of weeds for the As-  
sociation to send.

An account for 4/8 was passed  
for payment.

**General Business**

The President said the mer-  
cury vapour light at Mr Fleay's  
had not been operating for at  
least four months. Mr Hall said  
replacements were hard to get  
and cost £4. He (the President)  
suggested that an ordinary one  
be put there. There were several  
other mercury vapour lights out  
of action.

Mr Linsten said the Council  
had carried a motion to restore  
the lights on the band rotunda.  
It was suggested that a de-  
putation wait on the Council in re-  
gard to the mercury vapour  
lights.

Mr Hodgetts said they should  
have all the information tabu-  
lated first.

Mr Pitt said he would under-  
take to walk all over the town  
and find out where the lights  
were missing.

The President said he would  
help Mr Pitt.

Mr Hodgetts moved that a de-  
putation, to consist of the Presi-  
dent, wait on the Council's Elec-  
tricity Supply Committee to di-  
rect attention to the state of the  
town lighting, and present a  
comprehensive statement as to  
where lights were missing. Sec-  
onded by Mr P. Larkens, and  
carried.

Mr Linsten said the Council  
had replaced 8 doz. missing  
trees, and had also procured 3  
doz. salt-resisting trees from  
Broken Hill.

It was arranged to have a  
working bee to attend to the 49  
trees planted last year, on mo-  
tion of Messrs. Larkens and  
Pitt.

Mr Linsten suggested that the  
holes be dug for the next plant-  
ing now, and that they spend  
more on the hole than the tree.  
If they could get the labour 2 1/2  
miles of the road to Mt. Cole, he  
could find the cash. He also sug-  
gested planting the road at the  
back of the station and the road  
to Kearney's Mill.

Mr Hodgetts said they were up  
against something in lack of  
public interest. It was totally  
unfair to ask a few people to  
carry out the work.

The President — They had to  
continue with the tree planting,  
if it were only 50 a year.

Mr Linsten doubted whether  
they could finance that number.  
(The President deplored the  
lack of interest of townspeople.)  
Mr Linsten — The general at-  
titude of the townspeople was  
that they wanted something  
done for them.

Mr Linsten mentioned that  
the proposed scheme for a Com-  
forts Station was about to be fin-  
alised, and he doubted whether  
the Council was prepared to go  
on with it without outside finan-  
cial assistance. It would be  
ideal for drainage of the propos-  
ed site.

Mr Hodgetts said he was op-  
posed to its being made a res-  
ponsibility of the Association.  
They should wait till they saw  
the attitude of the Shire Coun-  
cil.

Mrs J. E. Day, and carried.  
Mr Linsten said they would  
have to keep pushing in regard  
to the speed limit signs. They  
should ascertain whether the  
local police had been contacted.  
—C.R.B. to be again written to  
in the event of S/Const. Colsh  
not having been contacted, on  
motion of Messrs. Hodgetts and  
Larkens.

Mr Hodgetts said the speed  
limit sign should be put further  
up the road than opposite Mr  
Norman's shop.

Mr Williams said the signs  
should be at Mr Duncan's and  
Mr Fleay's.

It was decided to again write  
to the Railway Commissioners in  
regard to some safety device at  
the Lawrence St. crossing, on  
motion of Mrs Day and Mr Hod-  
getts.

Mr Linsten said he had made a  
mistake about a railway ser-  
vice every evening from Melb-  
ourne.

The matter of a daily train  
service was lengthily discussed.  
It was decided to write to the  
Railway Department, and ask  
it to reinstate the Diesel train  
from Ballarat in the evening,  
and as an alternative that the  
8.30 p.m. to Ballarat be extend-  
ed to Beaufort, on motion of Mr  
Larkens and Mrs Duke.

Mr Pitt — He would like a  
little clarity on who was drawn  
for the Housing Commission  
homes. He saw that one was al-  
located to a school teacher who  
was not here yet.

Mr Larkens said there were  
14 applications for the 10  
houses. Four had been allotted.  
The local committee had not  
held a meeting yet in regard to  
the remaining six houses.

Mr Larkens said that he read  
that the local contractor was  
making his own palls. At the  
Housing Commission mill at  
Homesglen there were thousands  
of palls.

The President said the com-  
tractor was refused palls by  
the Housing Commission mills  
and told to get his own.

Mr Linsten said the water sup-  
ply was now at the Housing  
Commission Estate.

Mr Pitt said the local people  
should not go without houses to  
let an outsider (a school teacher)  
in. The Education Department  
should build their own houses.  
He pointed out that some people  
who were born here and wanted  
to come back to live were unable  
to get a house.

Mr Williams — Personally, he  
would be surprised if the 10  
houses were occupied.

Mr Linsten — If the 10 were  
occupied, they could then apply  
for more.

Mr Linsten said they would be  
pleased to know that Troy's re-  
servoir was full.

**RIPON M.L.A. UNDER FIRE**

protest in the Legislative Assem-  
bly next week against a state-  
ment made by Mr Morton (Lab.  
Ripon). Mr Morton challenged
