

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

FODDER COMPETITION

A fodder competition was held for 1952/53 by the Beaufort Agricultural Society, in association with the Devartment of Agriculture and the Royal Agricultural Society of Vic-

Following is the report of the udge, Mr R. H. Brady, Seeds Inspector):-

A Fodder Conservation Compeition was conducted by the Beaufort Agricultural Society in conjunction with the Royal Agricultural Society during the 1952/53 season. Nine entries were receiv-ed from district farmers.

During the autumn of this year pastures made little growth and up to the time of judging, in the latter part of April, quite a large quantity of conserved fodder had been used on some properties. LETTER FROM JOHN SIMPSON

The Rev. A. L. Mills has rereived the following letter form John Simpson, Ripon Shire representative on the Youth Coronation Tour.

S.S. Strathaven, 8th July, 1953.

Mr Mills

Dear Sir:-The tour of England and Scotland is now over and it is my duty to report on that which took place during th five weeks.

Upon arrival at Tilbury we were taken to Westminster, London, to meet our hosts who looked after us for eight days. The 26th May, — day of arrival, — fine, after that - nothing but rain.

Even the Coronation was partly spoilt because of the rain, which hampered photography. Although I was awake at 4.30 on the 2nd (June, it was worth waiting 9 hours (6 a.m. to 3 p.m.) to see a hyperstant of the representatives from procession of representatives from all British countries march before their Queen. A magnificent ceremony it was. People cheered as the Queen approached the Abbey to be crowned. It rained and rained again. When at 2.45 p.m. the Queen left the annexe to the Abbey, the crowds rose and cheered her away—I was already standing, because we boys had a standing position in Parliament Square. Before her went the Royal Family. With the Duke of Edinburgh at her side the Queen Edinburgh at her side, the Queen looked spectacular in her gold coach. As the coach disappeared around the corner, the sun shone the first two quarters of the game brilliantly, and the crowds went were interesting, but Raglan did not score after half-time.

REGISTRATION FOR

NATIONAL SERVICE NOTICE TO MEN ATTAINING THE AGE OF 18 YEARS BETWEEN 1st SEPT., and 31st DECEMBER, 1953

Under the National Service Act 1951-1953, all male persons, not exempt under the Act from liability to register, who are British subjects and ordinarily resident in Australia and who will attain the age of 18 years between 1st September, 1953, and 31st December, 1953 (both dates inclusive), ARE REQUIRED TO REGISTER BETWEEN 17th AUGUST AND 31st AUGUST, 1953.

A person who has arrived and intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia as from the time of his arrival.

A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane or so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf. Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to the penalties prescribed under the Act.

The only exemptions from liability to register are:—
(a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces, (b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Act, (c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal extraction living as aborigines.

If a male person of 17 years of age has good reason for wishing to commence his National Service training without waiting until he is required to register, he may apply to register early even though he is not 18. Further details may be obtained from the National Service Registration Office or any District Employment Office.

HOW TO REGISTER Registration Forms (Forms N.S.1) are available at all Money Order Post Offices and District Employment Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in telephone directories. Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.
