ally from rates only. From 1916 to 1926, a period of 11 years, the effect of Country Roads Board grants can be seen by the considerable increase in total expenditure. Council also increased its rate income by 50 per cent. in 1916 to meet its contribution to such heavier expenditure. From 1927 to 1932, a period of 6 years, Council again raised its income to meet the cost of construction works on the Trawalla Estate for which additional developmental road funds were made available by the Country Roads Board. From 1933 to 1947, a period of 15 years, which covered the depression and the Second World War, Council's expenditure decreased continuously from about £16,000 in 1932 to about £11,000 in 1947. This was 21 times what Council spent in 1885. The real value of such reduced expenditure was further decreased by the diminishing purchasing power of the pound. The road system consequently deteriorated and bridges fell into disrepair. rehabilitation had to be commenced in 1948 at a time when costs were rising, man power and material we lacking, but C.R.B. grants were available. Not until 4 years after such increased spending commenced, did Council have a revaluation. For 3 years, 1948 to 1950, Council spent about £5000 more per year, than its income would have permitted. The effect of the recent revaluation was first noticeable in 1952 and the extensive programme of reconditioning of roads and bridges is still in progress. Average expenditure for the last 3 years, 1951 to 1953, was over £52,000 per year and approximately 60 per cent. of this expenditure is met from shire funds.
