### BALANCE - SHEET

The balance for the past year showed,: - Receipts £8573/13/4; Expenditure Credit Balance, £8216/7/6; outstanding £372/4/4; less cheques amounting to\_£14; net credit balance £367/5/10; Contributory Account — Cr. £25/10/4; Equipment Account - Credit Balance £339/5/3; The satement of Assets and Liabilities showed that assets totalled £4909/14/6.

Mr Williams said the amount of wages and salaries (£5000) was almost equal to the amount paid in fees.

Mr Hodgetts referred to the amount of donations and said 240 had been raised by Mr E. Warren at his hotel. It was gratifying to the committee that they had such people in the town.

Mr Wotherspoon endorsed these remarks and said the total amount of donations was about £700.

In moving the adoption of the balance-sheets the president said he was pleased that Messrs. Hodgetts and Wotherspoon had referred to the donations. It was gratifying to the committee that they were not pushing the pram alone by themselves. In the salaries and wages there was a big amount of overtime. Really they should have a staff of 10. They were pressing on and had got through the year with a small credit balance.

The contribtory account received 2500 and paid out £300. They needed the co-operation of the whole town and district, and were endeavoring to cater for everyone and keep their charges within reason and as low as possible. They did not raise their charges for it cost nearly 29000 to Wages and had gone up 2200.

On behalf of the committee of management, I have the honour to present for your adoption the annual report for the year 1953/54.

This year the hospital has given relief to 308 In patients and 228 outpatients. This total represents 23 less in patients but 13 more out patients. The daily average number of in patents was 8.4 as against 9.2 for last year. However the average stay in hospital was 10.1 as against 10 last year. The approximate cost this year per patient treated was £26/4 as against £22/4 last vear. The average cost per day was this year approximately £2/12/7 as against £2/2/5 last year. Rises in the cost of commodities and wages being the main reason for this.

Buildings:

No major work has been done this year, but consideration is being given to a programme of painting to keep the buildings in good state of repair, and a new septic tank will need to be built and surface drainage replaced. This has been approved by the Hospitals and Charities Commission. An auxiliary water supply has been installed, as a safety precaution.

### Furniture and Equipment:

This has been well cared for the staff, and is in good state of repair. We are indebted to the H.E.S. social club for the gift of a new O bed table. This was handed over by the Headmaster and the pupils and they were entertained to morning tea by the Sister-In-Charge.

Staff:

To all members of the Staff under the able leadership of Sister-In-Charge, Sister Evans we express our appreciation for their services whether they be Medical, Nursing, General or Administrive. We also thank those Sisters who came from for places to releive Sister Evans when she had to leave the hospital overnight on occasions. We are at a loss to find a Sister for Charge to replace Sister Evans when she eaves on August 1st. We appeal to anyone knowing a suitable person to undertake this appointment to let us know as soon as possible.

Hospitals and Charities Commission:

We received a visit form Dr. Lindell this year and as a result of his visit,, we can look forward to brighter outlook for our New Hospital. We thank him for coming and being so courteous and for his understanding of our position.

A person who intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia as from the time of his arrival.

A person who has been in Australia continuously for not less than 12 months is also regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia. A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he is required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane or so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf.

Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to the palties prescribed under the Act.

### **EXEMPTIONS**

The only exemptions from liability to register are:-


(a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces.

(b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Act.

(c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal extraction living as aborigines.

A person who intends to make his home in Australia is regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia as from the time of his arrival. A person who has been in Australia continuously for not less than 12 months is also regarded as ordinarily resident in Australia.

A person who is absent from Australia during the period within which he is required to register, must register within 14 days after his return. If a person required to register is insane or so mentally or physically incapacitated as to be unable to register personally, the person in whose charge he is for the time being must do so on his behalf.

Any person who is required to register and who fails to do so is liable to the penalties prescribed under the Act.

## EXEMPTIONS

The only exemptions from liability to register are:-

(a) Persons on full-time duty with the Permanent Defence Forces, (b) Diplomatic personnel specified in Section 18 of the Act.


(c) Aboriginal natives of Australia including half-castes, and persons of aboriginal extraction living as aborigines.

### HOW TO REGISTER

Registration Forms (Forms N.S.1) are evallable at all MonBy Order Poet Offices and District Employment Offices. Addresses of the latter offices are in telephone directories. Detailed instructions on how to register are in the Registration Form and the Sheet (N.S.1A) attached to it.




