MANAGER'S REPORT

2016 was certainly a big one for the Kensington Neighbourhood House. The highlight of the year was without a doubt, receiving the Victorian Training Award. As a small organisation and one of 300 Learn Locals across Victoria this was a huge honour.

The main focus of the Award was our adult education programs however the additional services we offer our students such as Morning Childcare, Resume Support and help filling out forms were also contributing factors. We were able to demonstrate to the judging panel that we understood our community, were responsive to their needs and knew how to engage them. Our partnerships and governance also added weight to our nomination.

One of the most enjoyable aspects of receiving the Award was the opportunity to reflect on our achievements. Rebecca Smith, our Further Education Co-ordinator, developed a 20 minute powerpoint presentation for our interview with the judging panel. It could have easily been one hour and 20 minutes as we had so much we wanted to include.

At the Presentation Ceremony itself, we felt like small fish in a big pond. With some 700 people in attendance at the Crown Palladium we were seated in the far back corner. We waited in anticipation as Awards were given to apprentices and trainees from Institutes and TAFEs, Employers and other large Training Providers. Finally it was our turn, the penultimate Award for the evening ... and we won!

Talking to one of the judges after the presentation she said one of the things that stood out for them as a panel was our



passion and enthusiasm for what we do. This bit comes easy when it's echoed across the organization in spades by our staff, volunteers, Board and participants.

I believe as an organization we've always been prepared to taken on new challenges and create solutions to local issues however receiving the Award will only empower us to do more. The monetary side of the award has placed the House in a very strong financial position which will enable us to increase staffing in 2017 across our adult education and community development programs. I'm really excited about the potential for the new opportunities that this will bring.

So thank you to all our partners and funders, dedicated team of staff, teachers and volunteers. It is their contribution that helps to make the Kensington Neighbourhood House such a successful organisation.

Finally I'd like to thank the Board for their guidance and support in what has been a very successful and rewarding year.

PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

FURTHER EDUCATION

Further Education courses at the House provide students with study and work skills that enable them to access education pathways as well as paid employment.

Each program responds to a specific community need and is designed for a particular learner cohort.

In 2016 Kensington Neighbourhood House offered five English as an Additional Language classes, seven Digital Literacy courses and six Vocational courses as well as community based learning through our volunteer outreach program.

Our vocational courses focused on preparing students for work in the childcare, hospitality and warehousing sectors.

These pathways into employment will be further strengthened in 2017 with the Jobs Victoria Employment Network contract signed at the end of the year in partnership with Wingate Avenue Community Centre and Maribyrnong & Moonee Valley LLEN.



MORNING CHILDCARE

The morning childcare is one of the most in demand activities run by the House. Three hours of morning childcare is offered five days a week.

Those that attend value the warm caring environment provided by staff and the individual personalised attention.

Parents studying upstairs have peace of mind knowing their children are nearby and being well cared for. 10 parents were able to attend English classes in 2016 and have their childcare fees subsidised by the State Government's Family Learning Support Program.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The aim of our community development programs is to support people in the local community and encourage community connections.

The House does this by working with local agencies and residents to determine the needs of the community.

In 2016 we ran four different social groups that were low cost or free. The Wednesday Social Group meets weekly for lunch and bingo. These lunches alternate with a day trip every three weeks.

The largest group, the Elderly Vietnamese group, boasts over 50 members. Group meetings begin with gentle exercise and are followed by information sessions in Vietnamese and a meal. This group also goes on day trips and camp once a year.

Our other groups, the Book & Movie Group and Tuesday Night Social meet monthly.

We introduced our Local Talent Program to give community members an opportunity to share their skills and talents and started the Family Literacy Program.

Our volunteer supported programs that assist people to fill in forms and write resumes continued throughout the year.



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The House offers a diverse range of recreational activities that cater for both adults and children. They are run during the day, in the evening and on weekends.

In 2016 the House offered:

- seven arts courses and one arts workshop
- six courses for children
- four environmental workshops
- five health and wellbeing courses
- nine cooking workshops.

As with all of our programs we aim to keep costs as low as possible to enable everyone to participate.

2016 HIGHLIGHTS

PROGRAMS

- Prepare for Work in Warehousing course successfully piloted in partnership with Linfox. Funding secured from Aspire Foundation to enhance and extend the course in 2017.
- Family Literacy Program pilot successful in helping eight primary school aged children improve their reading.
- Funding secured to pilot the Play and Learn playgroup for pre-schoolers with disabilities.
- Completed Phase 1 of Arden Street Garden project which involved identifying and securing a site for construction of a community food garden.
- Developed the Local Talent program for residents to share their skills and knowledge via workshops.
- The House received approximately 900 enrolments across our courses and activities during 2016. On average 315 people attend the House each week to participate in one of our programs. In total we delivered close to 5,900 hours of activity.
- The retention rate of students in our Adult Education courses is over 90%.



- 85% of participants in our Personal Development and Community Strengthening Programs indicated that they were “very satisfied” and 13% were “satisfied” with our program.

EVENTS

- 40 people attended our free community lunch “A Taste of Kensington” in celebration of Cultural Diversity Week.
- Conducted a community consultation for people with disabilities and their carers to help us understand the educational, recreational and social needs of people with disabilities.
- Active participant in the Kensington Celebrating Community Festival and inaugural *Sustainability Expo* component of the Festival.
- 20 members of our Elderly Vietnamese Group went on a four day trip to Apollo Bay.
- Co-hosted an INC “Joint Committees of Management” Forum which was attended by Board representatives from all six partner organisations.

INNOVATION

- Raised awareness of Learn Local centres amongst people with disabilities and their carers through the development of a publication “*What Are Learn Locals and How Can They Help You?*”.
- Developed a guide “*What does the NDIS mean for Learn Locals?*” to help the sector understand and prepare for the implementation of the NDIS.

ORGANISATION

- Won the Victorian Training Award for Victorian Community Training Provider of the Year.
- The Board developed and endorsed a new three year Strategic Plan.
- Organisational Disability Action and Facilities Master Plans were developed and implemented. This included securing funding to carry out works to improve front entry access to the building.
- Consulted with 31 different agencies and organisations across the year.
- Co-convenor of Kensington Community Network and Kensington Children and Youth Committee.
- The annual staff satisfaction survey revealed that 100% of respondents are either satisfied or very satisfied with working at Kensington Neighbourhood House. Staff value the flexible working hours, relationship with their supervisor and their ability to influence decisions.
- On average we were open 67 hours per week which is 26% longer than the average Neighbourhood House in Victoria.

PARTNERSHIPS

- Developed a new partnership with Linfox Operational Training to provide a pathway for our students to obtain their Forklift Licence.
- Partnered with Service Stars – Job Alliance to run two Prepare For Work courses for 27 students which culminated in paid hospitality work during the opening round of the AFL season and Melbourne Cup Carnival.



- Hotham Mission and Christ Church Kensington continued to provide funding for English classes for asylum seekers.
- Partnered with VincentCare to deliver community development activities to members of their over 55s PAG group.
- Joined a consortium with Wingate Avenue Community Centre and Maribyrnong and Moonee Valley Local Learning Employment Network to implement an employment pathway program funded by the State Government's Jobs Victoria Employment Network program.
- Partnered with Farnham Street Neighbourhood Learning Centre to commission a report "Flemington/Kensington: The Business Case" which investigated the potential for both organisations to deliver training to business, industry or other community based organisations.
- Continued to work with the Inner North Cluster (INC) of Neighbourhood Houses. A highlight for the year was the completion of our "Partnering & Planning for Disability Pathways" project which was led by KNH.
- Delivered *Wheel It Right*, two free bicycle safety and skills courses for adults sponsored by the RACV Foundation in partnership with Urban Communities and Wheel Women.

STUDENT OF THE YEAR



Meet local Kensington resident Obsitu Mohamed, our Student of The Year for 2016.

Born in Ethiopia but living much of her life in Kenya, Obsitu had very limited access to schooling when growing up. Even so, she made the most of small opportunities, studying when she could with the nuns from Mother Theresa's Missionaries of Charity. "It was nearly all men in the school but I went anyway," says Obsitu. I said, "I don't see men. I am here to learn."

This persevering nature served Obsitu well once she arrived in Australia in 1998. After undertaking just 500 hours of English study, she was told to "get a job". Despite speaking

very limited English, Obsitu found her first work making chocolate Easter Eggs in a factory in Brunswick. She then started a training program at GPS Butchers and after 6 weeks gained a permanent position. Obsitu has now worked at GPS Butchers – scanning packaged meat – for 12 years and is very proud of obtaining her long service award with the company.

Holding down full time work for 12 years is an achievement. When your working hours are 4am to 2pm every day, five days a week, it reflects real dedication. With such unsociable work hours, Obsitu felt isolated from the community and had no time to attend English classes, even though she wanted to improve her literacy. In 2014 Obsitu was matched with one of our volunteer tutors – Barbara Holland – and began attending an hour long one-to-one English tutoring session every Tuesday afternoon. Three years later, Obsitu and Barbara are still meeting at KNH every single Tuesday.

Obsitu's English learning has been slow and steady but she never gives up and rarely ever misses a class. She now watches the news every day in English and likes to keep up with current events. In tutoring sessions, her favourite activity is solving the mixed-up words in the "Reading Eggs" program Barbara has introduced.

When asked why she continues to study, Obsitu simply says: "For the future, I need to learn. So I can help other people one day."

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR



Barbara Holland may be a relatively recent arrival in Kensington but she has made a big impact. Having spent most of her life in Perth, Barbara moved to our local area only three years ago and contacted us about volunteering almost straight away.

"I love to be involved in my local community, and have volunteered ever since I reduced my working hours. I volunteered at KNH almost as soon as I got here. I attended the course provided by KNH for six weeks, then took on my first student immediately. Later that year I met Obsitu, and we have been together ever since!"

Just as Obsitu is one of our most consistent and dedicated students, Barbara is an equally consistent and dedicated volunteer. We can set our office clock by their regular Tuesday afternoon arrivals and the

sound of newspaper articles being discussed, and reading and writing practised. Once a term, they break with routine and go out for coffee and a chat.

"I have really enjoyed Obsitu's company, and hearing tales of her life in Ethiopia and Kenya. She is a delightful person, and I have been impressed with her determination to make the most of her life here, and her gratitude for a home, a car and a job - all she feels she needs to be content.

"Another reason I have enjoyed tutoring her is hearing what she has to say about her Muslim religion, and how she and her family and friends regard terrorism as being entirely against their beliefs. Every Tuesday we have discussed current affairs, due to her keenness to understand life and culture in Australia."

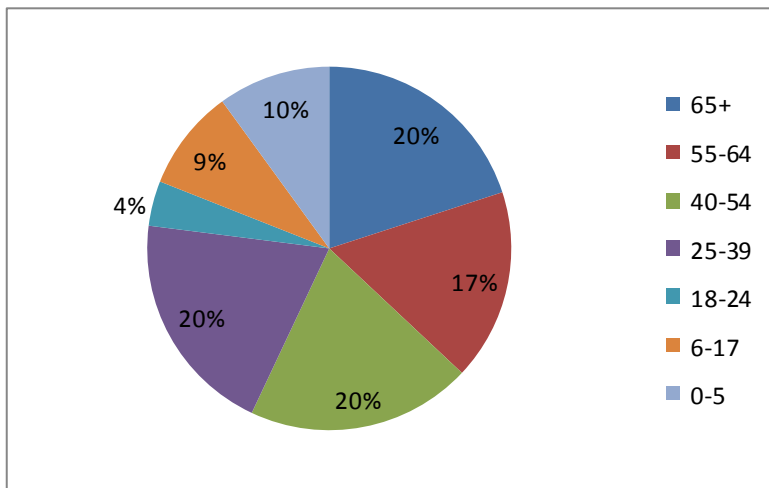
Barbara has found the biggest challenge to be finding material that is of interest to Obsitu, while not being too child-oriented, as much of the ESL material for adults has been too advanced. They recently found the ABC Reading Eggs program and have been incorporating that into lessons. "It has been most helpful, even though it is designed for children. Best of all, it makes us both laugh at times," says Barbara.

Due to a move to another suburb, Barbara cannot continue tutoring after April this year. "I am very sorry that I can no longer tutor Obsitu; however I will keep in touch with her from time to time. She has been a significant part of my life for these last three years, and I will miss our Tuesdays together."

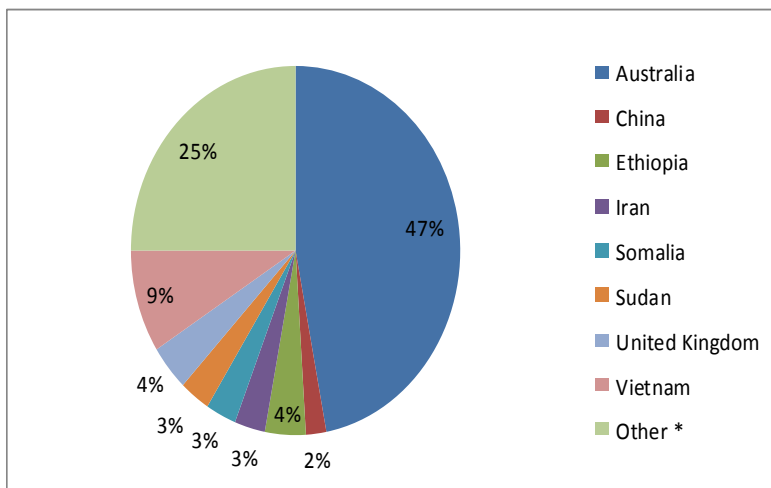
We will miss Barbara too and are very pleased to recognise her contribution to our community as our Volunteer of the Year 2016!

AGE GROUPS

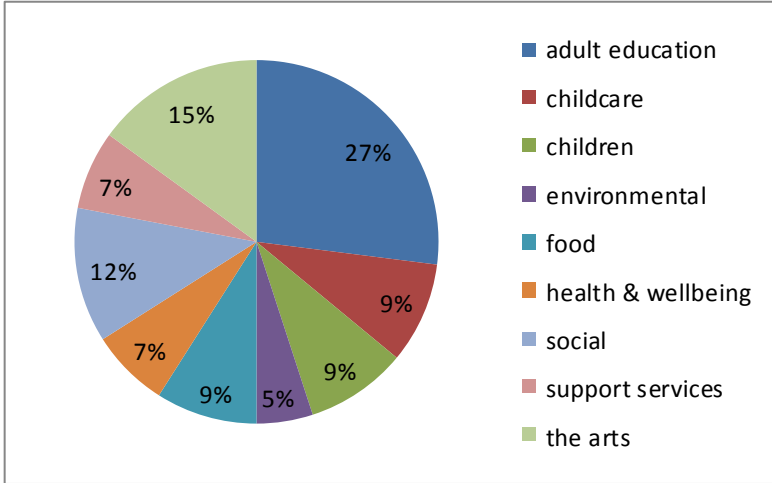


COUNTRY OF BIRTH

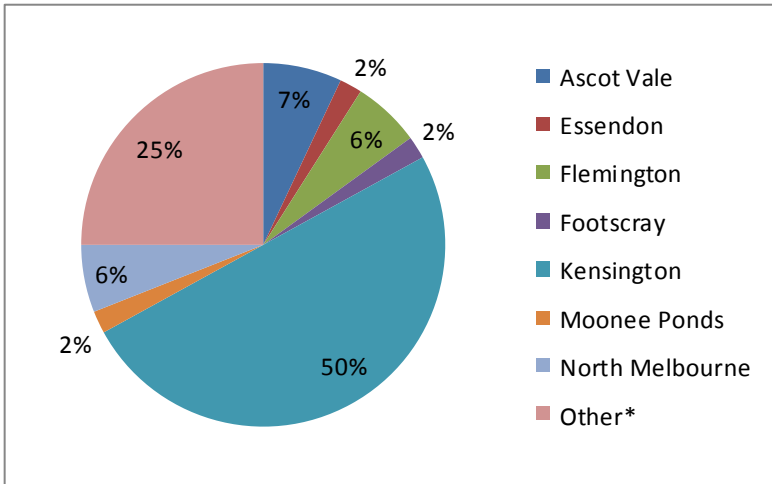

TREASURER'S REPORT

I would like to present the 2016 financial statements and 2016 financial year auditor report to the board for approval.

We have engaged JP Hardwick and Associates to conduct the annual audit for our entity and I have been advised that the 2016 financial reports have passed the annual audit tests.

Despite year on year revenue falling in 2016 from \$630,904 down to \$582,161, the operating surplus of the house increased 15% due to a reduction in expenses.



The team at the Neighbourhood House, led by Carolyn Webster, have done an excellent job delivering services to the wider community and maintaining a strong balance sheet.
