Objects of historic interest were also included in the procession. The plough used by Edward Henty to turn the first sod at Portland was fixed to the front of a huge modern implement, and one of the earliest harvesters made in Victoria was carried on a lorry. But probably most interest was taken in a team of bullocks brought from the Upper Murray. The bullocks drew a high-wheeled waggon commemorating the historic overland trek of Hume and Hovell from Appin (N.S.W.) to Lara in Victoria in 1824.
