
Good afternoon,

Toni,

Done a bit of research - was supposed to be at Hawthorn today, but to no avail.

Copy of my notes attached. I looked at similar tickets we have in the collection and then looked at the Sections and Fares Books we have and put part of the story together. I haven't done this before.

Used between 1934 and the mid to late 1940's

Would have been printed most likely in Melbourne, most likely by Sands McDougall

From a MMTB 1946 Timetable pamphlet it appears that they were sold by conductors. I don't know how they were accounted for. Possibly in small pads and only so many were issued to the Conductor and the Revenue clerk counted them back into the Revenue from the number of strips returned to the depot at the end of the day. They may have also been sold at depots.

One interesting thing is yours is a yellow series G, while ours is fawn series R. They may have started at A and changed colours every so often. Tickets systems can be mysterious in how they work, designed to keep the Conductors honest.

I have copied this into our Committee members for their information. They may have more.
