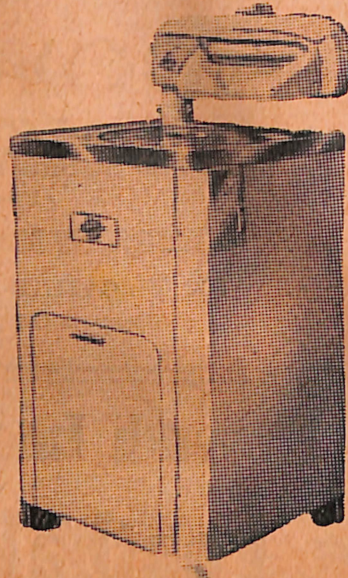

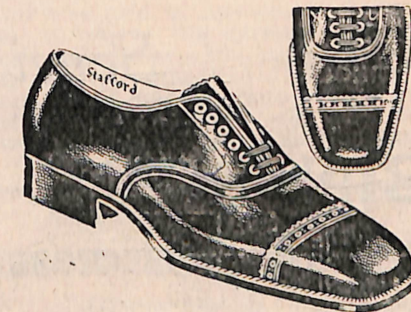

## HISTORY OF TRAMWAYS AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL FOOTBALL — Interstate Tramway Football

In 1926 the Tramwaymen of N.S.W. formed an Australian Rules Football Association. The three pioneers were Johnnie Walker, of Waverley (deceased), Frank Arthur of Port Macquarie, and W. Orr, of Dowling Street. Five inter-Depot teams were formed, namely, Waverley, Dowling Street, Newtown, Rozelle, and Port Macquarie. Dowling Street team, under the captaincy of Ernie Beller, won the premiership in 1926, 1927 and 1928. Alf. Milton was the first President of the Association.

The following season the Association sent a combined New South Wales side to Victoria, under the management of W. Orr and Alf. Milton. Two matches were played against a combination selected from the eight Clubs of the Victorian Tramway Football Association, the V.T.F.A. which had been in existence for 17 years at that time. Both games were won by Victoria, the scores being Victoria 15-16, New South Wales 7-13; second match, Victoria 22-15, New South Wales 8-11. Later in the season the South Australian Tramway Football Club, which had been formed three months previously, sent a team to Melbourne, under the captaincy of W. Lewis, a former Glenelg player. Victoria won the only match, scores being Victoria 10-14, South Australia 7-8.

A Victorian combination visited Sydney the following season and defeated New South Wales twice—Victoria 6-15, New South Wales 5-10; second match, Victoria 7-10, New South Wales 5-3. In 1930, Victoria sent a team to Adelaide, where two matches were played against the South Australian team. South Australia won both these matches, scores being South Australia 14-17, Victoria 13-11; second match, South Australia 8-17, Victoria 6-13.

In 1931 South Australia sent a team to Victoria. On this occasion Victoria was successful, winning both matches. During the period of the South Australian visit, the Secretary of the New South Wales Tramway Football Association, W. Orr, wrote to the Victorian Tramway Football Association to the effect that New South Wales would be prepared to go to Adelaide the following year, provided Victoria did likewise, with a view to starting interstate tramway football carnivals between the different States. Mr. Orr's letter was the initial move towards bringing the first interstate tramway football carnival between Victoria, South Australia, and New South Wales. The first carnival was held in Adelaide in 1932, and was won by South Australia. It was at this carnival that the first Interstate Tramway Football Council came into being. There were three delegates each from the Victorian and New South Wales Tramway Football Associations and four delegates from South Australia. Mr. A. Fourra, of South Australia presided, and it was decided to form a Council which would in future control all interstate carnival games.

A Constitution was drawn up, Mr. W. Orr, of New South Wales, was elected President, and it was resolved that the next interstate football carnival would be held in Sydney in 1934. Sir William Goodman, General Manager of the Adelaide Tramways Trust, donated a shield and Mr. Orr donated a cup to the Council. In due course Victoria and South Australia visited New South Wales. In 1934 Victoria won the carnival in 16 matches. Victoria has had six wins, South Australia five, and New South Wales, nil.

Victoria, South Australia, and New South Wales all took part in the interstate carnival held in Adelaide in 1947. Victoria was again successful in winning this carnival.

26th August.—Victoria met and defeated New South Wales at Henson Park. Scores: Victoria 20-22 to New South Wales 11-10.

Saturday — South Australia played Victoria. Scores: Victoria 10-9 to South Australia 8-13.

Victoria retained the Sir William Goodman Shield, Frank Bunny Curtin Cup and Keith E. Mills Memorial Cup.

Moved Mr. Nicholls, seconded Mr. Salter, that the minute re medallions be rescinded. (Lost).

## HISTORY OF TRAMWAY FOOTBALL CARNIVALS

The first Carnival was held in South Australia on the Norwood Oval in September, 1932. The Chairman of the S.A.N.F. League (the late Mr. T. S. O'Halloran, KC.) declared the Carnival opened before a big crowd.

Sir William Goodman bounced the ball to set the game in progress.

The South Australian team won the first Carnival of Tramways football held by defeating both Victoria and New South Wales. They thus won the shields donated by Sir William Goodman and Mr. W. Orr. These shields were donated for competition between New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia. It was hoped that other States would be represented, but finance would not permit this. We hope that the time will come when all States will be able to compete in these Carnivals.

The results of the first Carnival were as follows:—

**First match—S.A. 12.21 defeated N.S.W. 5.6**

**Second Match—S.A. 16.16 defeated Victoria 12.13**

**Third Match—Victoria 7.13 defeated N.S.W. 5.11**

It was decided at the first Council meeting held in Adelaide during the Carnival that Carnivals be held every two years, and the second Carnival was held in Sydney in 1934.

Victoria, by defeating New South Wales and South Australia, were successful in the second Carnival, thus gaining possession of the two shields. South Australia defeated New South Wales.

The third Carnival was held in Victoria in 1936, and again Victoria defeated both New South Wales and South Australia, and retained possession of the shields. Here again South Australia defeated New South Wales.

Victoria visited South Australia in 1938, but New South Wales was unable to send a team over to compete. During the war years all matches were suspended. Last year South Australia visited Victoria, but again New South Wales was not represented.
