The Campaign Chairman, Mr. John Ross, opened the final meeting, and after a friendly chat, asked the various chairman to report their final totals. Each turn received an ovation, and when the final total was announced there was loud and prolonged applause.

Mr. Ross was supported by Mr. Reg Ansett, the General Chairman, who also thanked the Committees for the great part played in exceeding the £100,000 target and expressed appreciation to the 685 donors.

The Headmaster's Speech

Like them I just want to say to you all, to all who have helped, to all who have given, a simple thank you








Committee Members with their wives and friends at the Final Meeting.

THE NEW SCIENCE LABORATORIES UNDER CONSTRUCTION



John Donne, and similarly we, who are charged with the science teaching in the Peninsula School, also state boldly that no man can consider himself as separate from scientific knowledge and understanding. Education in the true sense must be all embracing, and to be adequate it must include training in the many branches of science. For the boy commencing secondary school a comprehensive general science course is now mandatory. This four year course gives a broad, general outline of the gigantic sweep of science, laying firm foundations upon which, later, may be built the specialised techniques and skills which lead to a science course at a university.

SPORTING ROUND-UP

ATHLETICS

Athletics occupies the major portion of the sporting calendar in third term. However, many boys are practising golf, tennis and cricket as well.

Athletics is the one sport which enables all to participate and achieve a considerable measure of personal satisfaction. of personal satisfaction. It is a sport which is not dependent upon any special skills, and because of this, it is a vital part of the school's sporting programme. As an added incentive gramme. As an added incentive to spur the boys along to do their very best, we have divided the school that is all boys nine and above, into two groups, Town and Country, and are conducting a standards and achievements competition.

For standards we have instituted a system of six graded standards in each event. As a boy achieves one of these he gains one point for his group. This gives the more athletic minded boys an opportunity to prove themselves. Combined with this every boy is able to gain this every boy is able to gain points for his group, regardless of ability, but dependent purely upon degree of improvement shown in each event over the whole season. This ensures that the less athletically gifted boy has an incentive to improve him-self, even though his perfor-mances are not sufficienty good to gain many points in standards.

To help the school in the coaching of the boys Mr. John-Fallon-kindly-offered-his-services, and he is attending training every Wednesday and Friday afternoons. Himself a former well known Victorian athlete, his assistance is very much valued and appreciated. and appreciated.

(Third Term, 1961)


