response. About 15 people attended the meeting and all ex-pressed a desire to form an association. Mr McLoone said the meeting decided to meet again early in the new vear





# **Meals for Park** Orchards ? CLYDE &

#### It is likely the Warrandyte meals-on-wheels scheme will be extended to Park Orchards this year.

A request to participate in the scheme has been re-ceived from a group of Park Orchards people who are prepared to act as drivers for delivery of request to participate

The President of the War-randyte and District Wel-fare Centre, Mrs N. Cole-man, says there has been

man, says there has been an encouraging increase in the number of people tak-ing meals on wheels. The scheme is run by the welfare centre and provides delivered meals on Mon-days, Wednesdays and Fri-days

days, Wednesdays and Fri-days. This year it may be necessary to recruit more drivers and helpers. Mrs Coleman pointed out that extra drivers would help increase the number of delivery days, and more importantly, the amount of

time drivers could spend chatting to each meal recipi-

time drivers could spend chatting to each meal recipi-ent. "For some people to have a daily visitor is quite as important as to have a cooked meal," said Mrs Coleman. Usually, meals are de-livered to elderly or chron-ically ill people on a long-term basis. But meals can be delivered for short terms to anyone in need of such assistance. Volunteers interested in helping with delivery of meals should phone Mrs Jean Cole (844-3413) or Mrs Mavis McLaughlin (844-3746). The Warrandyte and Dis-trict Welfare Service has been told the service is eligible for a Common-wealth subsidy of 10 cents for each meal delivered.

### **Pollution debate: 'No** takers' Harry Hudson's popular feature, WARRANDYTE

The Liberal Federal members for Casey and Diamond Valley, Mr. Peter Howson and Mr. Neil Brown, have declined a challenge from their A.L.P. opponents, Mr. Race Mathews and Councillor David Mackenzie, to debate publicly the issue of Yarra **River** pollution.

Mr Mathews told War-randyte Diary that follow-ing a call for Federal aid in the battle for the Yarra from the Chairman of the from the Chairman of the Melbourne and Metropoli-tan Board of Works, Mr A. Croxford, he and Councillor Mackenzie had issued their challenge to the Liberal members in telegrams from the secretary of the A.L.P. Diamond Valley campaign committee, Mr M. Homes. Mr Homes had received a reply from Mr Howson and Mr Brown in which they said it was not for them as members of the Commonwealth Parliament to debate the issue. Mr Howson and Mr

to debate the issue. Mr Howson and Mr Brown asserted the provi-sion of water, sewerage and drainage in the Melbourne metropolitan area was a State responsibility. Pollution in the Yarra was a State problem which was being dealt with by the Victorian Environmental Protection Authority. Commenting on the tele-

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gram from Mr Howson and Mr Brown, Mr Mathews said that he was puzzled by their suggestion that he and Councillor Mackenzie should consult the State Government and the Mel-bourne Metropolitan Board of Works.

The Premier, Sir Henry Bolte, had made clear the attitude of the State Gov-ernment when he said that pollution in the Yarra was no worse today than 10 years ago.

years ago. The chairman of the Board of Works had stated categorically that Yarra pollution could not be con-trolled without Federal fin-ancial aid for sewerage and drainage works in the val-leys of the Yarra and its tributaries. leys of the tributaries.

tributaries. Requests for such aid had been refused by the Commonwealth on the grounds that the matter was one for the States. Mr Mathews said it was absurd for Mr Howson and Mr Brown to claim that pollution in the Yarra was being dealt with by the Victorian Environmental Protection Agency.

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


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
