EXTRA TAXIS NEEDED

More taxis are needed to serve Warrandyte and surrounding districts.

Warrandyte Diary has received a number of complaints from residents who have had difficulty obtaining taxis in the area.

Not everyone in Warrandyte owns a motor car. Because of the lack of public transport a permanent taxi service is essential.

Difficult hilly terrain and scattered development further emphasise the need for more taxis.

Elderly people — most of them without cars — are the hardest hit.

They are having difficulty getting out to shop, to collect their pensions, to visit the doctor, or to engage in any social activities.

It is understood the Transport Regulation Board is enquiring into the matter and that a board inspector recently visited the town.

Now the village is becoming so traffic-congested, the time could be ripe for a re-siting of the taxi rank. The present rank is inadequate.

The Transport Regulation Board might also like to

consider the possibility of providing a public bus service between Warrandyte and Kangaroo Ground-Research-Eltham.

One of the first people to bring the taxi shortcomings to our attention was Diary columnist, Briarly Martin. She wrote:

"Our taxi service has taken flight. There we sit hopefully at the taxi stand, but in vain. I think we will have to acquire an old-fashioned hansom cab to trundle us on our various ways."

Bulk postage inquiries

Warrandyte Traders' Association is investigating the possibility of bulk postage facilities at the Warrandyte Post Office.

If the move is successful it will allow organisations and business people to post their mail in bulk instead of having to travel to other post offices outside Warrandyte.

It is understood that if enough residents write to the Postmaster - General there is a possibility he may consider bulk postage facilities.

People wishing to use the service should write to Box 34, Post Office, Warrandyte, with information on the number of letters they post monthly, quarterly or an annual basis.

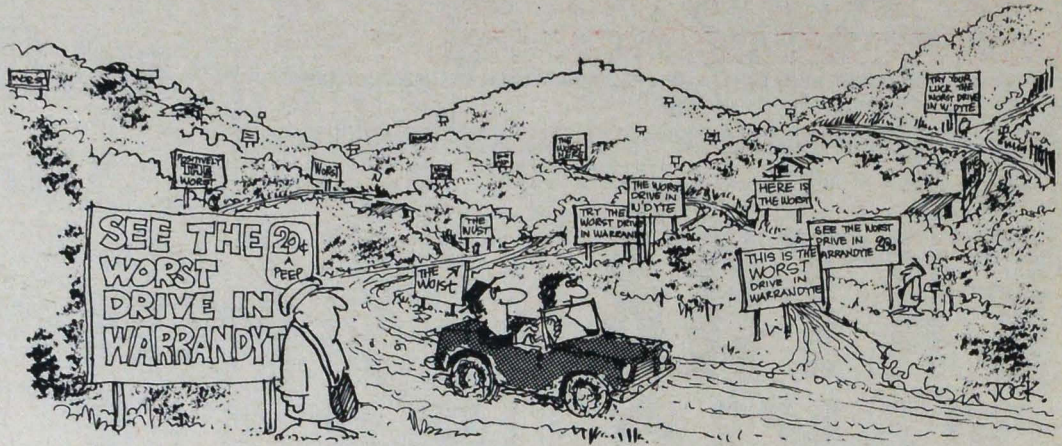

There should never be another "sub-standard" subdivision authorised in Warrandyte, Mr Race Mathews, the Federal Labor Party candidate for Casey, said recently.

Mr Mathews was speaking at an election rally before about 200 people in the Mechanics Institute.

The Premier of South Australia, Mr Don Dunstan, spoke in support of Mr Mathews.

Mr Mathews said it was time people acknowledged that Warrandyte was being turned into "just another suburb", and that the trees, open spaces, and the beauty of the river, would soon be gone.

He said there should not be another acre of bush bulldozed or another source of pollution brought into being.

"With proper Commonwealth financial initiatives from the Loan Council and the Grants Commission, we can relieve the population pressures which are now driving us in the direction of urban anonymity," said Mr Mathews.

He said a Labor government would establish a Department of Housing, Urban Affairs and Regional Development.

"This new department would see that where necessary environmental initiatives were taken by the

Commonwealth," said Mr Mathews.

Mr Mathews said scientists investigating pollution levels in the Yarra had found the water contained salmonella bacteria, the cause of gastro-enteritis.

"This situation has been caused because our governments have failed to invest adequately in sewerage and drainage for expanding areas such as Warrandyte, Doncaster, and Templestowe.

"More than 400,000 of Melbourne's population live in homes which have still not been sewered. Their sullage water, the overflow from their septic tanks, and in some cases their raw sewage, finds its way directly or indirectly into our natural waterways," said Mr Mathews.

He said water was regarded as undrinkable with an intestinal bacteria count of 50 and unswimmable with a count of more than 1,000.

Mr Mathews claimed the count in the Mullum Mullum Creek was 77,000 at Oban Road, Croydon, 39,000 at Deep Creek Road, Ringwood, 16,000 at Old Warrandyte Road, and 18,000 at Warrandyte Road,

The death of a bridge

First there was a punt across the Yarra at Warrandyte.

Then a bridge was built, behind where the old post office now stands and almost opposite the Grand Hotel, but this was swept away by the floods of 1863.

For twelve years, at a time when the population of the district was rapidly increasing, the only way across the river was by boat and other makeshift means.

Finally, after much haggling between councils and government, a new bridge was agreed upon, to be shared by the Shires of Doncaster and Eltham, the boundary being the centre of the river.

The new bridge was sited upstream, where the present steel and concrete structure now stands.

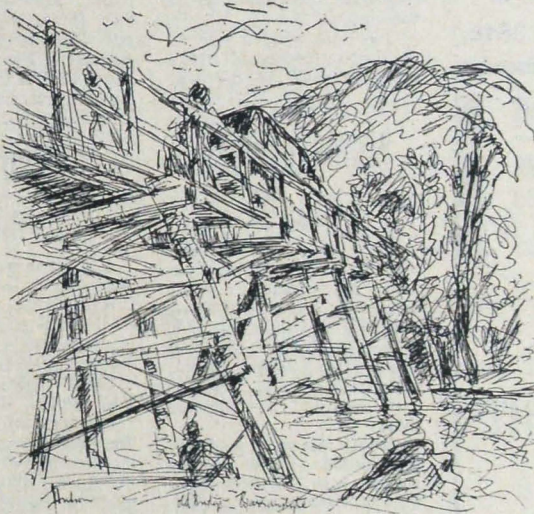
Designed by C. S. Wingrove, Shire Clerk and Engineer for Eltham, the bridge cost £2,119 and was completed on October 7, 1875.

The old bridge stood as a magnificent monument to the pioneers of our area and was regarded with great affection by all the residents who knew it.

Unfortunately, newcomers to Warrandyte cannot, except in imagination, feel as we felt at its demise in 1956.

Constructed of yellow box cut from the forests along Stony Creek, it had withstood the ravages of floods and fires for more than 80 years until it was finally — and justifiably — considered to be unsafe.

It had become a traditional meeting place, especially on New Year's Eve. To the singing of "Auld Lang Syne", the skirl of bagpipes and the explosion of fireworks there was much hilarious jollity, everyone kissed everyone else — known and unknown. Gradually the multitude



would melt away into the darkness; some to bed, most to all-night parties. The old bridge was left alone with the moon, another year of life behind it.

The war memorial was built on the hill above the bridge after World War I, then the RSL built its club-rooms behind the memorial.

The bridge acts as major stopping place for motor buses and directional guide for visitors. "Meet you at the bridge," or "Turn right (or left) across the bridge," according to which way the visitor travels.

A few statistics may help our memories.

The old bridge was 311 feet long and 11 feet wide. It rested on 47 piles each 14 inches in diameter, forming a trestle approximately 47 feet high, which gives some idea of the volume and depth of the water during the floods of the 1930's, when the platform was covered to a depth of between four and eight feet.

Since the construction of the Upper Yarra Dam it would be almost impossible

for such river levels to occur again.

There were many of us who would rather not have heard the whining of chain-saws as the executioners cut through those romantic timbers.

An old and tenacious lady, the late artist Jo Sweatman, traversed the hills and gulleys in the hottest summer weather with a petition to preserve the Old Bridge. Not only as a memorial to the past, but also as a functional foot-bridge. Her dream, and the many supporting signatures she collected, came to naught.

Nothing remains now but a few stumps.

The present bridge was officially opened by the Hon. G. O. Reid, MLA, in the early days of January, 1956. Wider, higher and longer, the new bridge is at times barely adequate for the volume of traffic crossing to and fro.

We cross it every day, we admire its functional steel beauty, but it will never replace the old wooden bridge in our affections.
