

Officials of the Warrandyte Community Youth Club are disturbed at allegations being made about the club.

Trouble has occurred following recent dances in the Mechanics' Institute.

There have been reports of vandalism and assault. Drinking by young people has also occurred.

Unfortunately the youth ub is being blamed for all club the trouble.

Youth club officials stated Youth club officials stated emphatically this week that they had not received any complaints about the con-duct of the club's monthly dance and that there had never been any trouble IN-SIDE the hall. Every effort is made to

Every effort is made to exclude alcohol being taken into the hall, and once the young people are inside, they are not permitted to go out until 10.30.

The local police are in-formed prior to each dance, and they work in close co-operation with the club. The presence of a uniformed policeman and a police car at the hall acts as a deterrent

at the hall acts as a deterrent to those who stay outside in an attempt to make trouble. Club president, Mr K. McKenzie, told the Diary that it was not denied the dances attracted a certain "element". He said this was inevitable.

"These are not members of the youth club. Some are locals, some are outsiders. "The dances are organised by the club's Keystone group — young people between the ages of 16 and 21 — with the assistance of the general assistance of the general

committee. "It is only natural that some youngsters will 'knock' the efforts of others of their

"But when some of the 'critics' resort to physical

violence, then I believe that the parents need to show a much keener interest in the younger set's activities." The September dance has been cancelled. The club feels it needs time to or-ganise more parents to help with dances.

ganise more parents to help with dances. "What a tragedy if, be-cause of the apathy of our generation, the young were forced to terminate their activities," Mr McKenzie said. 

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
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BIG DAY AT THE

NEW ROVER



A painter's studio in **'Snake Gully'**

It was the year 1939. The holocaust of World War II had begun.

In Warrandyte, another holocaust was sweeping through the countryside, voraciously devouring all before it - bushfire.

There was no Country Fire Authority to call on at that time, just volunteers who rallied to battle against overwhelming odds.

I was overseas at the time, but my father sent me news-papers containing photo-graphs of the devastation.

Among the many proper-ties lost was the studio of the late artist, Penleigh Boyd, father of the late Robin Boyd, world-famous architect, and TAA test pilot, known as "Pappy" Boyd.

known as "Pappy" Boyd. For some time, a group of National Gallery art stu-dents, of which I was one, had the pleasure of leasing and inhabiting the studio for long weekends and holi-days, but this was some years prior to that ghastly bush-fire.

prior to that ghastly bush-fire. Set in a declivity off Kan-garoo Ground Road known as "Snake Gully", the studio was designed and built by Penleigh from wattle and daub, lined inside with hes-sian — in which possums made their homes. Penleigh Boyd was an artist of world renown. Although young, he was most advanced in thought and on several occasions brought exhibitions of mod-ern art to this country, which he exhibited at great per-sonal financial loss. Aus-tralia was not yet ready for such "rubbish"! During the periods he lived here, Penleigh did some remarkably fine paintings, on of which — "Breath of



Spring" — resides in the new Melbourne Arts Centre. This is a very large painting of warandyte bridge. — Mow much Boyd would have ultimately contributed to Australia's art heritage will never be known, for his life was cut short when his car hit a cow, at night, on the Hume Highway. Penleigh was on one of his frequent visits to Sydney. — This ke was only 36 or 37 years of age at the time of his death. — The studio was large enough to have housed a large cart and several horses, if need be, with — This was necessary be-custed be with a painted very large canvase. — There was a wonderful "top light" and other facili-ties only appreciated by ar-tists or art students. — The fire-place was about

six feet across by four feet high, so that great logs could be fed into its huge orifice. There were only two small

There were only two small windows at the north end, near a sink and tap. There-fore, all painting light came from above. By favour of one of those freak winds that occur dur-ing bushfires, the small cot-tage in which the Boyds lived, and a magnificent mag-nolia tree standing nearby, were untouched. The cottage was only 30 yards from the only 30 yards from the

was only 30 yards from the studio. As students we enjoyed the use of PB's studio through the courtesy of Mrs Boyd, and we gained a great deal of inspiration from its atmocrhere. atmosphere. I wonder

where the I wonder where the sketches and paintings, which we so happily made there, are today? But, of course, this was, as my step-son says, " in the olden days".


