

Marsden in by 50 votes

CLOSE G

Mr Ian Marsden of Park Orchards won the recent Warrandyte Ward extraordinary election by 50 votes from Mr Wally Walsh, of Warrandyte.

The campaign was one of the most aggressive ever fought in the ward.

Solid backing from resigned Cr K. Buxton and former Park Orchards councillor Mr D. Marsh, played a big part in clinching the election for Mr Marsden.

Mr Marsden had missed by 39 votes against Mr A. Morton, also of Park Or-chards, in the recent annual council elections. Mr Walsh's supporters were pleased with his good polling. They claim the sup-port fully justified their con-servation stand. Mr Walsh was sponsored by the Warrandyte Environ-ment League and received

no support from outside bodies.

A feature of the election was the support for Mr Walsh in South Warrandyte and Warrandyte. South War-randyte was considered to be a stronghold for Mr Marsden.

Mr R. Morton, secretary of the Warrandyte Environ-ment League, said this week

ment League, said this week the league was disappointed Mr Walsh was defeated. "However, we are grati-fied he came so very close to success, fighting an elec-tion solely on the environ-ment issue.

"The fact that this issue formed a major part of all the candidates' election the candidates' election policies is an indication of the concern felt for the environment by the vast majority of residents in the Warrandyte Ward.

"Cr. Marsden has pledged himself to do all he can to protect the environment in Warrandyte and we offer him every support in his endeavours," said Mr R. Morton

At the declaration of the poll Mr Marsden said it was the first time for a number of years that two council-

lors from Park Orchards had represented the ward.
However, he said, he was very conscious of his responsibility to Warrandyte.
"I love every inch of it. It is sacred to me," he said.



WHAT'S DOING

"It is essential that ward councillors take immediate steps to speed up the revised plan for the lower recreation oval in Warrandyte", Mr K. McKenzie said this week.

W'dyte is 'ideal' for a town

Warrandyte is a classical example for the need to rationalise local government services, according to Mr Randell Champion, the Australia Party candidate for

Although Warrandyte is a distinctive small town with which its residents identify, it is divided by a council boundary, Mr Champion said.

"From one side of the river to the other services, regulations and other local

government matters can and do differ . . ., mud bricks can be used as a building material in the Eltham side, but not on the Doncaster-Templestowe side."

Mr. Champion, believes

Mr. Champion believes that local government should be rationalised so that the functions of local government are controlled by the appropriate group of people that are to be served.

"For example, the people from Warrandyte should be able to resolve local issues such as pre-school facilities, building materials, detailed planning including parking problems, traffic and advertising," said Mr Champion.

"Such Controls should be set out by regional councils, which would also channel finances to a town council for Warrandyte."

"Finances and specialised services, including research facilities for local government should be made available through the Federal or State system while it survives."

"Regional councils would handle matters of regional concern, such as pollution control, garbage disposal, regional libraries. Education should also be managed from a regional level and finances provided from the Federal Government."

"Warrandyte already has a community spirit which should be utilised in the integration of management of facilities for its residents. Warrandyte like many other small towns, has a special character which could be enhanced by the people of

hanced by the people of Warrandyte having control of their own local affairs," said Mr Champion.

HARRY HUDSON REMEMBERS . . .



The lonely old man

Ernie Stewart was a quiet, gentle man who annoyed no-one, but had few friends.

Usually, his only companion was his dog.

I made his acquaintance during the odd times he visited the village—usually pension day or Saturday afternoons—when he bought supplies.

He was a lonely man, not over clean, but he would talk if you gave him the

Ernie lived somewhere off Ernie lived somewhere off Webb Street, in a tent. There were many ex-first world war soldiers living in Warrandyte then, mostly bachelors on war pensions. Most of them enjoyed each other's company over a few drinks, but Ernie Stewart was excluded. He was well aware of this, but

did not appear to be bitter because of it.

Long service overcoat,

because of it.

Long service overcoat, bowyangs, battered hat, heavy boots and a staff, with a hessian bag slung on his shoulder. Ginger-and-pepper beard, sharp nose and blue eyes. His dog keeping careful watch over him.

Ernie always drunk brandy — neat — which amazed me. But he was rarely "tight". He would wend his way home with his provisions, including several bottles of brandy in the hessian shoulder sack, the dog now leading the way.

It was a long time before I discovered why he had been ex-communicate by his fellow ex-diggers around the district. Ernie had been a "provo", a military policeman, during the 1914-18 war, and for this he was never forgiven.

forgiven.
"Once a provo, always a provo," they said. Unchar-

itable perhaps, but the early diggers who went overseas to fight did not take kindly to authority and the military police were set apart, as were the military collectors of licence fees on the gold-fields during the last century.

it was a hard, lonely

So it was a hard, lonely battle for poor Ernie Stewart, who finally died in Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital from a chest complaint.

But they said he died of "shock", because he was bathed, shaved, had his hair cut, and received a delousing. Be that as it may, his camp was finally destroyed, officially. But a fair amount of gold in a jam jar was alleged to have disappeared.

So passed one of Warrandyte's characters. Some time after his death, he and his dog, sitting reading in his tent, complete with hurricane lamp, appeared on a calendar for one of the local stores.

BRIARLY MARTIN'S CORNER

If ever you wish to get some idea of even a small portion of the vastness of our wonderful island continent, take a trip from Cairns to Darwin.

By coach it is a journey of some three days. Days of travelling, night and day, through stark country, not without vegetation, but a heart-breaking lack of stock except for small flocks of cattle and sheep, only where there was evidence of water. We travelled miles upon miles along that amazing Stuart highway, stark without any sign of human habitation until we would reach a little settlement.

A shop, a hotel and a re-

A shop, a hotel and a restaurant where you had no more time than to snatch a meagre meal, then on again with the interminable miles ahead.

By now we received the

ahead.

By now we reached the semi-tropical growth that surely could have fed thousands of sheep and cattle, but for this lack of water; spinifex and salt-bush on which these animals can thrive, abounds, but — no water.

We were held up for nine hours in the middle of nowhere in that stark and lonely country owing to a breakdown of our coach, but were finally rescued by another coach which hooked us on.

This disability did not interfere with the old boy's volubility. He told us he was born in this outpost, and would die there, and to hell with going south to get one of these new-fangled arms.

And so we boarded our coach and set off for Darwin, another long stretch of open country.

Small settlements, then surprisingly at Pine Creek a quite sophisticated hotel; but now we were nearing Darwin, the outskirts widening all the time, and worthy of a column of its own. Cheers.


