ANY LONGER Local MP acts Unless a secondary school is established and another primary school erected immediately, the future education of Warrandyte children is in jeopardy.

> This is the view, not only of the Diary and many of its readers, but also local educationists, parent bodies and politicians.

Last year, the Warran-dyte Secondary School Pro-ject Steering Committee ad-vanced a proposition to the State Government for a War-randyte annexe to the Dia-mond Creek Community Technical School.

**BE IGNORED** 

Despite a petition signed by more than 1,000 local parents, several public meet-ings, and strong support from members of parliament, the proposal was rejected.

Last year more than 250 children travelled out of Warrandyte to State secon-dary schools. Most of them were travelling more than 12 miles each day. This year the situation is

12 miles each day. This year the situation is worse. Two more schools —Doncaster East High and Diamond Creek Technical —have been added to the list of schools to which Warrandyte children are be-ing zoned.

Many children leave home as early as 7.30 and do not return to Warran-dyte until 5.30. There is NO bus catering for War-randyte students attending Diamond Creek.

Diamond Creek. Mr Norman Lacy, MP for Ringwood, has written to the Minister of Educa-tion, Mr Thompson, expres-sing concern at the rejection of the Warrandyte proposal. He is seeking a deputation with Mr Thompson.

Replying to a letter from Mr Thompson, Mr Lacy said the rejection gave no encouragement to the people who have got together and worked out the Diamond Creek annexe proposal. "It is my view that should you have the opportunity to read their report you would see this group has not only a considerable knowledge of current educational think-ing, but great motivation to put this thinking into prac-tical effect in their com-munity." Mr Lacy continues: "You say in your letter, There appears little point in estab-

Mr Lacy continues: "You say in your letter, 'There appears little point in estab-lishing an annexe to Dia-mond Creek Technical School'. In fact, the report that has been produced in-dicates that there is sub-stantial point in establishing

this annexe on any premise which takes into considera-tion current educational thinking and welfare." Mr Richard Morton, pre-sident of the Warrandyte Primary School Committee, told the Diary this week: "Surely the Education Department can't fob us off any longer. The evidence in support of our case for the establishment of a secon-dary school is overwhelm-ing; and we will continue to fight for it." reluctant to discuss this pro-ject. The existing Warrandyte Primary School is desper-ately overcrowded. The pro-vision of two more portable classrooms has further de-pleted the already inade-quate playing space. For how many more years are Warrandyte's educational priorities to be ignored? How much longer are our children to be deprived?

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
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
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## POUND BEND TUNNEL IS **SIGNIFICANT**


The National Trust has placed the Pound Bend Tunnel, Warrandyte, on their recorded list, following a recommendation from Mr Irvine Green of the Doncaster and Templestowe Historical Socity.

The Trust's "recording" of an item of considerable historical significance has replaced their former system of classifications.

The Pound Bend Tunnel is the first landscape fea-ture in the district to be so

is the first landscape fea-ture in the district to be so recorded. The National Trust cita-tion says that the Pound Bend Tunnel is "interesting as a failed mining venture of some magnitude". According to the late Harry Hudson, the tunnel project was at least par-tially successful. In "The Warrandyte Story" Harry wrote: "A venture, unique in the history of gold mining in Victoria, was carried out by David Mitchell, father of the world-renowned singer, Dame Nellie Melba. "He formed the Evelyn Tunnel Gold Mining Com-pany for the purpose of constructing a dam across the bed of the River Yarra to divert the flow through a to divert the flow through a tunnel constructed at Pound Bend.

"It was hoped to puddle the bed of the Yarra for more than three miles. "A large party of mining financiers and other gentle-men assembled at the mouth of the tunnel on July 3, 1890, to watch the Yarra take on its new course. "Originally estimated to cost £10,000 and to take twelve months to complete, the work was carried out in three and a half months at a cost of £2,100 by the ap-plication of a new American method of construction. "The tunnel, which is 634

"The tunnel, which is 634 feet long, 18 feet wide and 14 feet deep, proved quite a success after several false starts starts

starts. "Despite the overburden of mud, which had to be scraped to a depth of 50 feet without suitable machi-nery, gold to the value of £8,000 was recovered in twelve ments." £8,000 was recovered in twelve months."

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

LOCALS AGREE ON HEIR CA

A public meeting of Warrandyte residents last month voted in support of the Environment League and Traders' Association plan for parking in the village.

The other plan, prepared by Doncaster and Templestowe council staff, was criticised. Among the 60 people present, many felt it was "visually insensitive" and not in keeping with the character of the village.

The acute lack of parking in Warrandyte's main street has highlighted the need for some form of overall town planning. Crs Scott, Marsden and Morton had earlier said that they would not be attending the meeting, but local MP, Mr Norman Lacy, was in the audience.

Walsh, president of the Environment League said that Cr Marsden had informed him that council-lors would be calling an-other public meeting to dis-cuss this plan. The meeting decided to ask councillors to publicly display their latest plan, in Warrandyte, well in ad-vance of their proposed

display their latest plan, in Warrandyte, well in ad-yance of their proposed public meeting. Mr John Hipwell, a mem-ber of the Traders' Associa-tion, said the village should be allowed to develop as an integral part of Warran-dyte's community. The shopping centre must be self-contained if it is to be viable for trading.
