## Lower rates for pensioners

## CONTROVERSI WARRANDYTE A COMMUNITY YOUTH CLUB PUBLICATION PARK NUMBER 37 FREE APRIL 1, 1974 BY SEAN HANRAHAN

Three Doncaster and Templestowe City councillors promised a public meeting in Warrandyte last week that council would "take note" of suggestions by local residents about the planned Yarra Street car parking area.

Nothing more conclusive than this resulted from the meeting, held at the Mechanics Institute Hall on Thursday night. About 30 local people, residents and traders, attended.

After the meeting, Warrandyte Environment League president Mr Walter Walsh said: "I think the council will just go ahead and do what it wants".

Crs Ian Marsden, Alan Morton and John Scott called the meeting to discuss the controversial plan and "re-solve any contentious de-tails" about it. They made it clear that little, if any, further opportunity would be made for local residents to have a say in the plan before it is proceeded with.

Cr Marsden said: "I think this is the eighth or ninth meeting on this plan and now we want to get ahead with it."

now we want to get ahead with it." At the meeting, Doncaster deputy city engineer, Mr W. J. Carlyle, showed slides of the council plan for the parking area and discussed details. The plan calls for parking spaces for 116 cars in a levelled area on the north side of Yarra Street between the Gospel hall and Gedge's chemist shop, with a driveway 24 ft. wide and with 18 ft. wide parking slots on either side. Also planned for is an access road into the park at a point just across from the excavated area beside the hotel. But throughout the meet-ing Mr Carlyle was vague about the extent of earth fill to be used and what sort of landscaping would be done. Mr Walsh told the meet-ing that the access road, positioned as it was on the crest of the rise in Yarra Street at that point, would

"As a policeman of 22 years standing I can say that the access road at that point

the access road at that point would create a dangerous situation," he said. Mr Walsh also attacked the plan on the basis that it included only the area up to Webb Street, and was not part of what should be an overall car parking and river access plan for the area.

Other residents objected to the plan's demand that the old post office be re-moved to allow for widen-ing of the road. Mr Carlyle said this de-cision was in the hands of the M.M.B.W., and he "could not see the board allowing the post office to stay".

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


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## **PARENT INTERES** PART-TIME REACHES A REQUIRED Assistant Cook Kitchen Help Waitress

-Group forecasts The Victorian State Government may be considering a major back-down on the

issue of the controversial Yarra Brae dam, planned for construction 21 miles upstream from the Warrandyte bridge.

This is the opinion of local "dam busters", who told the Diary this week they believe the Board of Works is about to recommend the construction of a much smaller pumping weir on the Yarra, some miles upstream of the original proposed site.

The proposed dam has been a hot topic of debate in the district since it was first proposed by the gov-ernment, at the height of the 1973 summer drought.

A spokesman for the Yarra Brae Action Commit-tee said that the environ-mental study being con-ducted by the Board of Works is now almost com-plete, and they expect the study team's final report and recommendations will go up






# SCRUTINY ON A NEFNS

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




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## Junior cricket awards More than 100 parents
