Another desperate bid is being made to save Warrandyte's historic Mechanics' Institute Hall.

It is sadly in need of repair, and as reported in the Diary last year, at least one offer has been made to use the building as a commercial prospect.

The hall's plight has been known to many of our community leaders for some time.

Doncaster and Templestowe Council helped out with some financial aid a few years ago when the hall needed repairs.

However, since then fur-ther repairs and alterations are needed to maintain it as a community centre.

The hall committee has decided to launch a strong campaign to save the hall from falling into further disrepair.

Treasurer of the commit-tee, Mr. A. B. Burgess has written a letter to the Mem-ber for Casey, Mr. Race Mathews seeking a Com-monwealth grant for repairs and alterations and alterations.

The committee has also decided to raffle a Torana De Luxe six-cylinder manual car to help obtain funds. Tickets are available at \$5 each from any Warrandyte ts Association member, Ann Dickson 844-3076 after 6 p.m.

Tickets will be available from June 1 until July 31. Cr. J. Scott will make the draw on August 17 at 3.00 p.m. in the hall.

Mr. Burgess pointed out to Mr. Mathews that the hall was built about 50 years ago and had been used as a picture hall and community centre.

"With the growth in strength of the Warrandyte Arts Association and the decline in other usage, the hall is now used primarily for that association's activi-tion." activities activities", said Mr. Burgess.

"As a result the hall's revenue is largely dependent on the association's continued usage. In the year 1972-73 the hall received \$962 from hire of which \$650 came from the Warnandtta. Acts. Association. randyte Arts Association", said Mr. Burgess.

Mr. Burgess said that because of the hall's deterior-ating condition and various physical inadequacies, the Arts Association were finding their facilities "anything but satisfactory".

Quotes for repairs and alterations to bring the hall up to standard would up to standard would amount to \$9,500 said Mr. Burgess.

Roofing, ceiling, stage lining, insulation, painting, stage improvements, ducted heating and overhaul of the septic system were the most urgent needs.

FOR SECOND SCHOOL

Strong pleas are again being made to the State Government to build a new primary school in West Warrandyte as a matter of urgency.

The Education Department has a site for a school in Harris Gully Road, behind the Golden Gate area.

According to Mr. R. Morton, secretary of the Warrandyte Primary School committee, his committee has been told by the department that construction of a primary school on this site has been included in the "current building program".

However the committee has not been given a specific date by which a new school will be commenced.

In a letter to Mr. N. Lacy, M.P. for Ringwood, the committee pointed out that a survey by staff at Warrandyte Primary School had indicated that about one quarter of the present student enrolment would have better access to a school on the Harris Gully Road site.

The committee said the new site was ideally located to cater for a number of new residential subdivisions which are being developed in the area. in the area.

Mr. Lacy has been told that there are deficiencies in staffroom, office and storage accommodation and particularly in the outdoor recreation areas.

The committee has indicated that the enrolment was expected to increase to approximately 530 next

Mr. Morton said, "In view Mr. Morton said, "In view of these trends, it seems unfortunate that over - development of the present school site should be allowed to continue as a temporary expedient."

Replying to the committee's letter, Mr. Lacy said he was aware that the school was approaching a critical situation. The size of the school, and in particular its site, was insufficient to cope with any further increases in student population. pulation.

Mr. Lacy said he had written to Mr. Thompson, Minister of Education, seeking a specific date by which the new school could be operating.

Supporting the Warrandyte school committee plea, Mr. Lacy told Mr. Thompson, "It is not acceptable to me that the present Warran-dyte school site become over-developed as a tempor-ary expedient."

BATTLE FOR A SECOND HOT GOES TO COU

Thirty-six years ago, ever thirsty Warrandyte was in line for a second hotel.

The Melbourne Herald, in October 1925, reported the proposed event under the heading "Warrandyte's Future. Professor Objects to Another Hotel"

The Licensing Court was considering an application by the police for the revo-cation of the licence of the Warrandyte Hotel, which had been destroyed by fire.

A witness at the hearing, Professor W. A. Osborne, said one hotel was ample for the requirements of the Warrandyte district, in which he said he was a property owner.

He said he had dreams of Warrandyte "becoming a residential suburb of Mel-

The court was told Alice Scott was the owner and Catherine J. Connelly was the licensee.

Licensing Inspector Answorth said no attempt had been made to reconstruct the hotel within a reasonable time. The licensee had a unlicensed an unlicensed permitted an unlicensed person to be, in effect, the keeper of a temporary bar, erected since the fire.

The public would not be inconvenienced if the licence were cancelled, because there was another hotel to cater for residents and visitors.

Professor Osborne told the court he spent his vaca-tions at Warrandyte. He was not a prohibitionist, but claimed that the reduc-tion contemplated would re-move certain temptations.



HOW CASEY M.P. **SEES ISSUES**

On his re-election as Federal member for Casey, the Diary asked Mr. Mathews to comment on future needs for the area and possible government trends.

Mr. Mathews said, "Being a member of parliament means making the machin-ery of government work for the people you represent.

"This means keeping your door open for individual constituents who find them-selves in difficulties with government departments government departments over pensions, taxes and other personal transactions. "It means encouraging people to give you their views on parliamentary is-sues, in order to give them representation when policies are being developed.

"It means acting as an advocate for community groups such as hospital boards, school committees and municipal councils and municipal councils when new programs of financial assistance are being implemented.

"There are a number of programs in which I expect to be taking a special inter-

"The destruction of our "The destruction of our district's natural environment has not yet passed the point of no return, and I will be looking to Mr. Justice Hope's National Estate Program for grants to help make the valley of the Yarra a great national park.

"It is years since govern-ment and catholic schools started a new school year even with enough desks and even with enough desks and teachers for their student populations, and I will be looking to the Schools Commission first to guarantee all our children an acceptable standard of staff, accommodation and equipment, and subsequently to guarantee them facilities of the standard which commands admiration at a Yarra Valley or a Tintern.

"These programs will be going forward in conjunction with a wide variety of other measures in fields such as pre-school education and child care, regional health and social welfare services and vocational re-training, which have already brought Casey five new pre-school which have already brought Casey five new pre-school centres, five new primary school libraries, a major conservation project at Blackburn Lake, and new mental health facilities in the Ringwood area.

"All in all, I expect three years of every sort of prob-lem except boredom," Mr. Mathews said.
