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TWO BID FOR SHIRE SEAT

An extraordinary election will be held in the north riding in the Shire of Eltham on Saturday, July 13.

Two candidates are standing. They are Mr. Robert Marshall, of St. Andrews, and Mr. Stan Jupp, of Research.

Mr. Marshall is an architect, townplanner and builder. Mr. Jupp conducts a piggery.

Mr. Marshall says existing bushland must be retained, both for environmental reasons and to guarantee residents a permanent bush environment about their homes.

He thinks land clearing throughout the North riding should be subject to council control.

"Existing farms are an important part of the life style of the North riding. Opposition will be given to any rate increase or rating structure that would threaten the farming way of life", says Mr. Marshall.

Mr. Marshall said he would aim for increased maintenance of roads in both township and rural areas for flexible design standards for reconstruction of roads in areas such as Research and Warrandyte.

Mr. Jupp's aims include an effective working plan to embrace the presentation and improvement of the existing environment consistent with community needs. He urges that areas zoned as conservation be retained as such at all costs.

He considers sporting facilities within the riding to be a priority item. "The youth of this area are in dire need of improved and additional facilities", says Mr. Jupp.

THE SQUEEZE IS ON FOR ANOTHER SCHOOL

Strong local pressure is continuing for the building of a second primary school in Warrandyte.

The school's vice-principal, Mr. Barrie Borley, said the present site was grossly inadequate for the current enrolment of more than 500 children.

He said the site was being steadily eaten away by portables and that one, and possibly two portables more would be needed next year.

Federal and State politicians, local councillors and the Education Department have been told of the desperate shortage of space at the school.

Mr. Borley said that if parents were not prepared to accept more portable classrooms then they should support the school committee and the mothers' club in their protests against the delay in building a second primary school in Warrandyte.

One of the strongest sympathisers for another primary school is Mr. N. Lacy, M.L.A. for Ringwood.

He will be guest at a school committee meeting on July 10 and will be given further evidence of the pressing need.

Apart from the overcrowding, parents are con-

cerned about traffic hazards and parking problems at the school.

Doncaster and Templestowe Council has excavated land in Brackenbury Street, providing additional car parking space.

However, they have been told by the Road Safety and Traffic Authority that angle parking adjacent to the school will not be approved. The authority has indicated that danger from reversing cars makes angle parking unacceptable.

All cars will have to be parked parallel, both in the Brackenbury Street area and both sides of the road in Forbes Street.

A school committee spokesman said this week that parallel parking would seriously reduce the existing space for cars.

BID TO PRESERVE BUSHLAND SPOT

Warrandyte, Croydon and Warranwood residents are combining in efforts to preserve 20 acres of "unspoiled" bushland in South Warrandyte.

The area, in the City of Doncaster and Templestowe, abuts the boundary of the City of Croydon.

Situated in the upper reaches of Anderson's Creek, it cannot be reached by road. The area abounds in wildlife and is served by two streams.

A Warranwood resident, speaking on behalf of the group working for the project, said they wanted the land preserved for a wildlife sanctuary.

Keen interest in the venture has been shown by the Minister for Urban and Regional Development, Mr. T. Uren, and the member for Casey, Mr. R. Mathews. They recently inspected the land.

Mr. Mathews said that he and Mr. Uren were "favour-

ably impressed" by the area and felt it would make an ideal retreat in what would become a large residential area.

It is understood that at a recent meeting Doncaster and Templestowe Council

decided to ask the Federal and State governments to buy the land under the National Estates Scheme.

Some people in the district claim that the cost of the land could be up to \$800,000.

PARKLANDS IN GOVT. CONTROL

The Warrandyte Environment League has announced that three areas in Warrandyte are now under the control of the National Parks Authority.

They are the Pound Bend Reserve, Blacks Flat and the Jumping Creek Reserve.

Three rangers have been appointed full-time to police the areas.

The Timber Reserve, Warrandyte Common and Mining Reserve are yet to come under the National Parks Authority.

No cleaning up or supervision has yet been carried out on these three reserves.

The Jumping Creek Re-

serve is causing most concern.

It is in a run-down state.

The construction of a main road through will block off numerous tracks which have spoiled the

aesthetic quality of the bush-land and increased erosion.

Toilet facilities will be improved at Jumping Creek and a campaign will be carried out against mini-bikes.

Figures just released show that enrolments at Park Orchards for grades three and four are 70 in each group.

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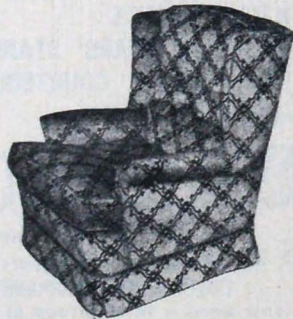
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LET'S THINK AHEAD —AND THINK BIG!

Doncaster-Templestowe Council is proposing to buy the land on the corner of Yarra and Stiggants Streets and is calling for suggestions as to how it should be used.

It is a large block, in a central position and almost flat. The ideal site for a community centre!

Ambitious? Maybe so. But we won't get another chance. It should be looked on as a long-term project, finally embracing, perhaps, meeting and activity areas, a theatre, a small gallery — and a library.

And why shouldn't the library come first? Warrandyte desperately needs a public library. The mobile units are quite inadequate. So let's start with a public library, with the rest of the complex evolving around it.

There have been efforts made to obtain a new "home" for the old post office building. The Stiggant Street site may be suggested for this purpose. But what we need is a centre for the living community.

Retained on its original site as part of the village streetscape, the post office has some relevance, but not re-erected elsewhere in the sort of false setting one readily visualises.

There is a real and valuable place for large, professionally designed and run regional folk museums, such as Swan Hill, Sovereign Hill and Coal Creek.

But the Warrandyte community has no use for the tinpot conglomerations that are springing up on the edge of every one-horse country town.

We had the basis of a beautiful, genuine folk museum in the old Victory mine in Whipstick Gully, but a State Government department saw fit to bulldoze that into oblivion.

The historical display now being assembled by the Environment League could be permanently housed in the suggested library.

How much better for it to be displayed in such a setting, continually being used by the community, than in any "folk" museum, visited once by locals, part of a static, non-involving project intended mainly for endless streams of weekend day-trippers, contributing nothing to the living community.

Well, that's my suggestion: a community centre with a library as the first step.

The whole topic deserves to be the subject of lively local discussion. I suggest the Diary is an obvious forum for such a discussion.

BIG ROLL-UP FOR SCHOOL'S CENTENARY

Former pupils from interstate and the country are expected at the centenary celebrations of the original stone building at Warrandyte Primary School.

The celebration will be held in the school grounds on Saturday, August 16.

A big program of activities has been arranged for the weekend.

A highlight promises to be the Warrandyte Environment League's Old Warrandyte exhibition on Saturday and Sunday.

The display is part of the Doncaster - Templestowe Council centenary celebrations.

Other functions during the busy weekend will be an art show, a ball in the evening, a dinner-dance, and church services.

An enthusiastic school centenary committee has been meeting regularly. The school committee has donated \$150 towards the cost of staging the centenary.

Business houses will be asked to decorate premises and permission is being sought from the council to hang banners in the main street.

The organisers hope to obtain a Cobb and Co. coach, a band and several horse drawn jinker-type

vehicles to join in the procession from the bridge at 1.30 for the official opening at 2 p.m.

Various committees have been formed to handle the evening functions, back-to-school, publicity, local organisation liaison, transport and traffic, decorations, photography and souvenirs.

Because of the expected large influx of cars, roads adjacent to the school will be barricaded off so that the procession and VIP guests can reach the school without any hitches.

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GRANT TO LIFT LOCAL ROADS

An \$82,000 Australian Government grant has been made available to upgrade road links between Warrandyte and neighboring communities.

The Federal Member for Casey, Mr. Race Mathews, said the grant was part of a \$112.1 million program of work on Victoria's urban arterial roads.

Under this program, the Australian Government would be paying Victoria \$35.9 million in 1974-75, \$38.1 million in 1975-76 and a further \$38.1 million in 1976-77.

The Warrandyte project would cover land acquisition and construction work at a cost of \$45,000 between Warrandyte and Ringwood, and \$37,000 between Warrandyte and Kangaroo Ground.

"This is a further practical example of the way constructive co-operation between Australia's three levels of government is improving the quality of all our community facilities," said Mr. Mathews.

"Under the new Aus-

tralian Government Roads Grants Act we are able to assess the social and environmental impact of road construction programs and relate these programs to overall urban development policies for the first time."

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INDONESIAN TRIP ATTRACTS LOCALS
