SCHOOL PLEA TO MINISTER

Strong requests for two new schools in Warrandyte — one primary and one secondary — will be put to the Minister of Education (Mr. Thompson) by local residents later this month.

This move follows continuing representations by Mr. Norman Lacy, M.P. for Ringwood.

Mr. Lacy has arranged for a deputation from the Warrandyte School Committee to meet the minister and discuss educational problems in the area.

Local parents have been concerned about conditions at the primary school for some time.

The acting principal, Mr. Barrie Borley, has described the school's site in Forbes Street as being "grossly inadequate" for the current enrolment of more than 500 children.

The steady encroachment of playing space by portable classrooms over the years has resulted in the children becoming more and more frustrated and could be contributing to social and behavioural problems at the school, according to some staff members.

The Education Department has a site for a second primary school in Warrandyte West, behind the Golden Gate area. The committee deputation will ask that the building of this school be commenced as soon as possible.

The deputation also hopes to be able to underline to the minister the desperate need that exists for a secondary school catering for pupils from Warrandyte and surrounding areas.

The Warrandyte Secondary School Project Steering Committee, formed last year as the result of several public meetings, prepared a detailed case for the establishment of a Warrandyte annexe to the Diamond Creek Technical School.

This proposal was ultimately rejected by the Education Department, the only concession being the provision of a school bus service to Diamond Creek.

"This only further compounded the problem", a spokesman for the steering



committee told the Diary this week.

"Our submission showed that Warrandyte children were already attending no less than seven state secondary schools out of the area, the closest being 5½ miles away. The department simply zoned us to another one, adding to the problems of travelling and further fragmenting the teenage population in our community".


The steering committee has been broadened with the support of the school committees from Park Orchards, South Warrandyte and Wonga Park primary schools.

"We are now pressing for the building of a comprehensive secondary school for the district", the spokesman said.

"A site somewhere in, say, South Warrandyte would be ideal. And we are keen that the proposed school should be established with the closest possible links with the four communities it will — hopefully — serve.

"There is a desperate need for community facilities in the district, serving the diverse interests of children, youth and adults. The proposed new school could be planned to cater for all these needs.

"These are some of the ideas we hope to be putting to the Minister of Education", the spokesman concluded.

CHILD CARE: LOCAL MEMBER TELLS

Australian Government plans for pre-school education at child care centres were outlined by the Federal Member for Casey, Mr. Race Mathews at the annual meeting of the North Ringwood Primary School Mothers' Club.

Mr. Mathews told the meeting that the Australian Government planned to have available within five years a place in a pre-school centre or a child-care centre for any child whose parents wanted to take advantage of the service.

Pre-school education would be provided free of charge and there would be a sliding scale of charges for child care services.

(As the Diary went to press, there was speculation that the child care program would be shelved as part of the Government's anti-in-flation measures).

"We have already taken action under the national pre-school program to pro-vide more places in pre-school teacher training col-

"None of the present groups is larger than four children, but the council has used Australian Govern-ment grants to acquire two houses of its own in which up to 20 children can re-

ceive care . "We are launching the Child Care Program at a time when there are places in child care centres for only one in every ten of the children who need them.

"At present, there are places in child care centres for only 34,500 of the 345,000 children under six whose mothers are members of the workforce", Mr. Mathews said.



ace wanted:

What's new with parking in Yarra Street?

Nothing!

It was a problem when one G. Hoile, then secre-tary of the North Warran-dyte River Reserves wrote to the "Herald" a long time ago.

It's still a problem. But let's hear from Mr.

Hoile. He put the parking prob-lem — and the environment question — in rather elo-quent terms in his letter, which the "Diary" reprints from the "Herald" of December 27, 1934:

"In the early days, when Warrandyte was a little bush hamlet, houses were built as close to the river as possible, to provide water for the home. Gradually, on one pretext or another, the land that should have been a beautiful river reserve was settled on, not even leaving the chain and a half which is shown on the leaving the chain and a half which is shown on the plans, the usual river re-serve. Today the river frontage to Warrandyte has been devastated by floods, even encroaching to the opposite buildings on the main road. What was a few weeks ago a scene of svlvan weeks ago a scene of sylvan beauty is now a muddy stream, on one side almost stream, on one side almost devoid of trees and shrubs, the river bank being piled high with great trees up-rooted, piles of tangled tea-tree, and refuse.

"The beautiful bridge at Warrandyte, so beloved by artists is now an ugly struc-ture when bereft of the

graceful wattle trees, and the verdant islands are nothing but mud flats piled with logs. One island, a dream when the wattle was in when the wattle was in bloom, was reduced to one-third of its size. Now is the opportunity for the town-planners to come to the aid of this beauty spot and give the Government the benefit of their experience to help the Government the benefit of their experience to help to make it worthy of Vic-toria's 100 years. All the houses and shops which are on the riverside have been flooded and should be re-moved before it is too late. Surely the Government, which permitted the river-side to be alienated, should resume this area, and help to establish the owners on more suitable land.

"On the main Warrandyte road there is much need for road there is much need for a parking area, which is not available owing to the for-mation of the country. If this river area were re-sumed it would be available, and the additional reserve would be a blessing to the would be a blessing to the large, increasing population from the suburbs, which are reaching out on all sides from the tram terminus at Kew. There are trustees for the river reserves, who are anxious to obtain more open spaces for the people, and who from time to time have obtained additional areas of land; but, even so, the future generations will not have proper provision not have proper provision made for them unless this matter is taken in hand. As it is the river has undermined the bank, and much

"Recently a beautiful, graceful tree at the bridge-head on the north side of head on the north side of the river was ruthlessly cut down by the men engaged on repair work, simply be-cause they wanted a tem-porary post. Residents are justly indignant, seeing the ruin by flood water added to by those engaged to re-pair the damage. Such lack of vision by those entrusted with our priceless treasure is deplorable. The tree took years to grow, and was per-haps as old as the village". Like we said what's




