## OLD MINE GOES UNDER Heritage bulldozed

One of the last chapters of Warrandyte's history has been closed . . .

By the bulldozers of officialdom.

Local residents were shocked to discover that the last remnants of the famous Victory Mine in Whipstick Gully had been obliterated.

All that remains of an irreplaceable part of Warrandyte's past is a scar on

rreplaceable part of Warrandyte's past is a scar on the landscape.

Said one stunned resident:
"While places like Ballarat and Swan Hill are artificially reconstructing their past, real history in Warrandyte, dating from the 1880's has been destroyed in a matter of days.

"The Victory Mine, only a stone's throw from the old post office, was the second richest mine in Warrandyte.

"Surely Warrandyte, Victoria's first goldfield, should fight all the way to preserve its heritage".

Gold was first discovered in Victoria on June 30, 1851, when Louis Michel, a Melbourne publican, washed some mud and gravel from the bed of Anderson's Creek and panned off a few gleaming specks.

The site of his discovery is marked by the gold memorial cairn off Gold Memorial Road, Warrandyte. This cairn has been subjected to numerous etc. subjected to numerous attacks by vandals over recent years.

As the alluvial gold and the shallow workings gave out, the larger companies and syndicates moved in, sinking deep shafts and en-gaging in extensive tunnelling.

One of the most successful was the Victory Mine.
The clearing at the head of Whipstick Gully originally contained the extensive workings of the Victory Mine.

All that remained of this complex — until the bull-dozers moved in — was a dozers moved in — was a large drive, tunnelling deep into Fourth Hill, and a ven-

into Fourth Hill, and a ven-tilation shaft, complete with timbering and a windlass. A local syndicate, gaining access to the old Victory Mine via the ventilation shaft, worked it with some success in refert years. success in recent years.

It was no bonanza, but as they said, "It was more lucrative than doing overtime at work, and a lot more fun,

too".

The tunnel and shaft in Whipstick Gully have been featured in newspapers and film and television productions shown all over Australia, and several scenes in the ABC's recent production "Rush" were shot in the old tunnel, now gone These historic reminders of our colourful past were situated on land "reserved for mining purposes". When this edition of the Diary went to press it was uncerting as the property of the press of the p tain as to who was respon-sible for this act of official vandalism.



## Lions' health

## YOUR DECISION ON SCHOOLS IS IMPORTA check

The Lions Club of Warrandyte will conduct a dia-betic survey in Warran-dyte on Sunday, December 1.

The local doctor Robert Allen has paid a tribute to the project.

"It's a very worthwhile project and everyone in the community should take advantage of the oppor-tunity", he said.

The diabetes surveys were begun last year by Lions District 2018 of which Warrandyte is a member.

The district presented a glucose analyser worth \$2800 to the Austin Hosnital.

It is believed the Lions survey using the glucose analyser is the first of its type in Australia.

On December 20 in War-randyte, about 20 mem-bers of the Lions Club will be helping with the survey.

Registration forms for testing will be available at Bill Riggs newsagency, Yarra St., Warrandyte Yarra St., Warrandyte from November 25 to 29.

The Warrandyte community will be given an opportunity this month to contribute to the con-tinuing discussion around the future administration of state schools in Victoria.

A public meeting in the Warrandyte Mechanics' Hall Warrandyte Mechanics' Hall on Wednesday, November 13, will discuss various alternative proposals and decide which form of "local government" may prevail for the local primary school.

Mr. Lance Vizard, school committee chairman, told the Diary this week:

"Some of the suggestions put forward envisage a school committee vastly dif-ferent in power and com-position from those at present in schools.

"It is imperative that as many parents and others interested attend this meet-ing, so that our final decision really does reflect the desires and needs of the Warrandyte community.

"To enable you to make worthwhile contribution to the discussion you are advised to collect a booklet from the school, setting out

the various proposals in detail".

The four proposals, briefly stated, are as follows:

The status quo. No

change in the present structure.

• A form of council which includes elected parents, elected teachers, coopted members of the community and, where appropriate, elected students, with an advisory function on educational matters.

• A school council which includes parents and members of the community which may or may not be advised by a school education committee consisting of principal, teachers, parents, members of the community and, where appropriate, stuand, where appropriate, stu-

dents.

• Any combination of which is agreed membership which is agreed to by the school council, principal and staff, parents and members of the com-
