Mr. Mathews said credit for the success of the pro-ject belonged largely to club members and Doncaster-Templestowe Mayor Ian Marsden.

"Cr. Marsden had already lined up \$34,000 from his own council and \$10,000 own council and \$10,000 from the Victorian Government before he raised the possibility of an Australian Government grant with me," Mr. Mathews said.

"I knew the difficulties club members have been having over their present accommodation in the White House, and I told Cr. Marsden I would do everything I could to help.

"Elderly citizens' clubs give a great lead to the rest of us in the way members support one another and bring a bit more happiness and colour and excitement into one another's lives.

"The White House has been a pretty rough and ready home for the Warrandyte Club.

"But that hasn't stopped them running a lively programme or offering people like their councillors and members of parliament the warmth of hospitality whenever an opportunity

"Cr. Marsden and I told last December's club Christ-mas party at Alfred's Homestead that we hoped Christmas 1975 would be celebrated in the club's own dining room."





opposed and, in 1971, the Doncaster-Templestowe Council decided to buy the White House for the joint use of the youth club and elderly citizens.

It was planned to demolish the White House. The building in its place would incorporate a theatre and art gallery.

The project fell away to the housing of both youth club and elderly citizens in the White House.

The contract for the club-rooms has been let to Dance Brothers Pty. Ltd.

The building will be of about 40 squares and will provide club members with one of the most up-to-date centres in the eastern suburbs.

Cr. Marsden said the building had been carefully designed to blend with the Warrandyte environment.

"The elderly citizens have worked extremely hard for their dream home", he said.

"I for one am delighted that their wishes will soon be fulfilled", Cr. Marsden said.

"By the end of this year, more than \$200,000 will have been spent on the Warrandyte Recreation Reserve over a two-year period.

# THE WEBB STREET

In reply to "Old Timer" (March Diary), may I suggest that he get out of his car and experience the Webb Street footpath. If he parks at Toby's Lane, he'll experience the whole gamut:

The east side of Webb

The east side of webb Street is good going in summertime, when the foot-high grass has died. I call this the BIKE ZONE. Wonderful kids, very healthy and energetic; twirling bikes jumping twirling bikes, jumping bikes, speeding bikes.

One's way is interesting by wonderment of how one would cope with a bike between the legs.

Over Mullens Road and on to CLAY ZONE.

This section is not used much, but is the most dangerous because the pave-ment narrows into a blind "S" bend, forcing passing cars either to stop or run off the road.

Over Magpie Lane, it's BEAUTY ZONE. Warrandyte at its best.

Wonderful view of opposite side of the Yarra Valley. North Warrandyte laid out, Glynns Road, the flashing beacon, water

Dawdle along here and enjoy the keen air and views.

The footpath becomes personal, you feel you are visiting the homes, but you are over the water main and the telephone cables, so you must be on the footpath.

Down you go, cross the pavement to the west side and you are in DOG ZONE.

Half the dogs of Warrandyte are here and they resent your presence. I don't think they bite.

After dodging one or two parked cars you are about to enter the PINE ZONE.

Watch your hat as you crawl round and under these protuding limbs. No views here and, fortunately, no dogs because from here on you need your about you.

Here it is, the approach to Brackenbury Street inter-

It's really something you lean back, put one foot forward carefully and hope the other heel has a firm grip and holds. Otherwise you sit on your bottom,

Now practise this carefully for you will require your skill later on a far steeper pinch, unfortunately one that has not as much gravel.

Well you made it. Now you have a little interesting bit of up and down. You wish you had one leg longer than the other for the than the other for the terrain slopes away to the side at a terrific angle.

Having attained your objective, the far footpath, stop and enjoy the scene. You've earned it.

On your way you still have to get over Brackenbury Lane, and if you have the agility of a mountain goat you will do so without trouble.

Right slap in your path is the greatest four-wheel drive you have ever seen. No-one uses it because it is always

Fortunately it has strong handles, not like the usual flimsy one of local cars.

You need to hang on to these handles as you get by

otherwise you will finish up in a ditch on the right or over the carpark fence on the left.

Well, you've done it! You have experienced the Webb Street footpath!

Now going up is a different story.

I will tell it later, but

I will tell it later, but believe me, 40 years ago I climbed Mt. Bogong by the "staircase route" from Tawonga and the Webb Street footpath is the nearest I have found to resemble it.

Old Timer, I strongly recommend a few practice runs over our footpath if ever you contemplate hiking on Mt. Bogong.
