Moves towards a town plan for Warrandyte are gathering strength.

The possibility of such a plan is being actively canvassed following the community survey conducted jointly by St. John's Church and the Warrandyte Environment League.

Delighted to report that the locals have rallied to a cry of "help" from two young conservionists.

You may recall that nine-year-olds Peter Hawkins and Martin Coles, of Leber Street, wrote a plea in the November Diary.

They asked for help to protect the reserve on the corner of Tindals and Warrandyte Roads from the rubbish-dumpers and sundry other bush-despoilers.

A meeting last month of Eltham and Doncaster - Templestowe council representatives and community survey committeemen recommended that the councils:

- Investigate and report on the steps necessary to implement a town plan for the area and estimate the cost.

(This feasibility study would cover commercial zones, community facilities and preservation of the environment.)

- Report on the legal aspects of joint administration of town planning control.

Copies of the community survey findings were presented to local members of Parliament and produced encouraging offer of support.

The environment league is also believed to support the concept of a town plan.

Briefly, the survey committee's policy is:

"We must recognise that the character of the area is changing, but once the landscape features are changed, they can never be effectively regenerated.

'Compromise'

"However, some amenities and facilities are desirable and the only way a proper compromise can be reached is by the development of adequate plans and controls for Warrandyte.

"If we do not have publicly-known controls, we can expect haphazard development, inappropriate building type and location, and general unsightly features which will last for generations."

The committee also makes the following points:

- Ideally, Warrandyte should be protected from outer suburban development by means of a green belt.

Will this happen if development is left to its own devices?

- Warrandyte plays an important role in the community as one of Victoria's state park areas.

If it does not have a development plan, other forces will create controls for the area which may not be appropriate.

- The survey showed a need for more shops in Warrandyte.

Let us plan now to avoid the present problems of congestion, aesthetics and parking. Perhaps a new shopping area could be developed well away from the river.

- North Warrandyte residents say their area

lacks a general store-milk bar. Let us plan for one now.

- The November Diary gives notice that the RSL and the Social Clubs are looking for new premises.

Will problems of long-term traffic patterns, aesthetics and conditions for potential future use for the proposed premises be properly considered?

- There is no present policy on the siting of public buildings, one-way streets or parking facilities.

A committee spokesman said it was appreciated that many of these planning problems were recognised by local councils and the Board of Works.

He said the committee believed that if Warrandyte residents could develop reasonable proposals and suggestions for a town plan, positive discussions could be held with the authorities.

"Our aim is to have a documented plan prepared for Warrandyte," he said.

"Both Hurstbridge and Wattle Glen are already doing just this for their respective townships."

STOP IT! NO MORE DEATHS—POLICE

Warrandyte police chief, Sgt. Cyril Moss, has appealed again for the removal of a local death trap.

He has renewed his appeal for action following a recent fatal accident in Hall Road, South Warrandyte.

"This road has been the scene of numerous accidents in wet weather," said Sgt. Moss.

"I've been complaining for 10 years."

"I've contacted council engineers and all they've done is put up signs."

"Last time, I was told that land would have to be acquired from the Education Department in order to im-

prove the road — and this would take six months.

"In wet weather, this road is indescribably bad, he said.

"The water and mud pour over the road.

"Cars don't skid on this road, they float!"

It was a particularly tragic accident last time, said Sgt. Moss.

The victim was a teenage girl.

All passengers in the two-car crash were wearing seat belts.

BIG DAY FOR THE ELDERLIES

Two proud men should be standing on the platform at the opening ceremony of the Warrandyte Elderly Citizens new clubrooms on December 11.

They are the Federal Member for Casey, Mr. Race Mathews, and former mayor of Doncaster and Templestowe Council, Cr. I. Marsden.

They were responsible for raising the money to get the venture off the ground.

Cr. Marsden lined up \$34,000 from Doncaster and Templestowe Council and \$10,000 from the Victorian Government.

He raised the question with Race Mathews of a Federal government grant.

Mr. Mathews worked on it and in April announced a grant of \$84,000 had been approved.

At the time, this was one of the biggest Federal Government grants ever allocated to an elderly citizens group in the eastern suburbs of Melbourne.

Cr. Marsden and Mr. Mathews told local elderly citizens in December 1974 they hoped they would be in their clubrooms within a year.

This hope has now been fulfilled with the opening ceremony at 3 p.m. on December 11.

For the past few years

the elderly citizens have been meeting in the White House which they share with the Warrandyte Community Youth Club.

"I knew the difficulties club members have been having with their accommodation. Several months ago I told Cr. Marsden I would do everything I could to help," Mr. Mathews said this week.

He said the \$84,000 Federal government grant allowed work to begin immediately on the project.

"I wish members a happy time in their new home," said Mr. Mathews.

The club celebrated their birthday party on November 13. Special guests were Cr. and Mrs. Marsden, Mrs. J. Scott and Mrs. V. Rush.

Club officials said they would like to thank Mrs. D. Griffith for organising the concert party and Mrs. McDonough for making the costumes.

Thanks were also expressed to the caterers, Mrs. Holland, Mrs. Norberg, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Davies.

Officials would also like to thank Miss A. Moore for her donation.

'NO' TO LOCAL FREEWAY IDEA

A freeway from Melbourne connecting with Park Road would see Park Road become a four-lane feeder highway carryink 20,000 vehicles daily.

This warning was given members of Park Orchards Ratepayers' Association last meeting.

The association has continued to oppose F19 free-

way from destroying the Park Orchards community.

The association was told the rural beauty of Park Orchards would be lost, cross streets would have traffic lights, residents' inside roads would be trapped by uninterrupted peak traffic flows down Park Road.

Overhead crossings may be necessary for schools and kindergartens.

"Is this the Park Orchards that brought you here?" members were asked.

A recent meeting agreed to ask Cr. John Scott for the rationalisation of street sign poles. One pole should carry Metcon, street name, traffic and any other sign.

It was also reported that representation to the Ombudsman was continuing to ensure that Park Orchards was not swamped in any future ward boundary redistribution in Doncaster-Templestowe city.

ELECTION '75 — THE CANDIDATES

On this page, the Diary publishes unsolicited statements from candidates for Casey in the December 13 House of Representatives election.

Three candidates — Mr. Race Mathews (the sitting Labor member), Mr. Peter Falconer (Liberal), and Mr. John McKenna (DLP) — submitted statements.

The Diary has attempted, as far as possible, to devote equal space to each.

Race Mathews (ALP):

Liberal State Council attacks on Yarra Valley planning and conservation are the hard face of Fraser Liberalism showing through the environmentalist veneer.

I predict that Premier Hamer and Planning Minister Hunt will put on a brave face over persisting with the Upper Yarra Valley - Dandenongs Planning Authority in the face of overwhelming State Council opposition, but sell out the conservation cause after the December 13 elections.

The only thing going for the Yarra at the moment is the Liberal Party fear that the State Council decision to scrap the Planning Authority could cost votes in seats like Diamond

Valley and Casey.

Mr. Hamer and Mr. Hunt will be putting on a brave front for the election period, but once the votes are safely in the ballot-box on December 13 they will back off in the same way as has been done already over the Geelong growth centre and the Mornington Peninsula.

The developer lobby is riding high after the Liberal Party.

Now, more than even, a conservation-minded Australian Labor Party Government is needed in Canberra

to off-set the lobby's destructive influence.

Those of us who were in the forefront of the fight to save the Yarra from the Liberal Party dam-builders know how thin a shield is protecting the valley from total environmental disaster.

Greedy men have had their eyes on the Valley for years, and the tag of "socialistic nonsense" attached to conservation measures in the Liberal State Council debate is an indication of their decisive influence in the Victorian Liberal Party.

Peter Falconer (Lib.):

I welcome the announcement by Premier Hamer that the State Government would press on with the Dandenongs Yarra Valley Planning Authority.

Following suggestions that plans for the Authority should be abandoned, I spoke personally with Mr. Hunt, State Minister for Local Government and Planning.

I and other Liberals from the area urged on him the view that arguments advanced against the Authority recently had no relevance.

Those arguments were based on the experience of some residents of the Mornington Peninsula operating under the Westernport Planning Authority.

The Minister accepted our view and the State

Government has since reaffirmed its intention to press on with its plans to preserve the beauty and peace of the Yarra Valley.

Local government financing: A fixed percentage of personal income tax should be earmarked for distribution to local government.

The Liberal Party's federalism policy advocates a major reform of the financing of local government activities.

One of the continuing problems of local government is the inability of its traditional forms of revenue to keep pace with infla-

tionary pressures.

In comparison, the Commonwealth tax revenues benefit through inflation pushing taxpayers into higher tax scales.

The new Liberal federalism policy specifies that a Liberal Government will give the States and local government permanent access to a proportion of revenue raised through personal income tax.

Commonwealth, State and local taxes will be separately identified on one tax assessment so every taxpayer will see the amount levied for each form of Government.

John McKenna (DLP):

Events of recent weeks have shown that Australia will be ungovernable without the DLP.

The circumstances which have developed on the industrial scene are a challenge to any prospective Australian government.

The small group of Communist and allied Left-wing extremists have mounted an attack on the ALP Government by attempting to destroy wage indexation as a prelude to industrial anarchy and business collapse.

Today, the ALP is bereft of leaders of the calibre of

Chifley who showed how this type of challenge could be met by a genuine Labor government.

There is no evidence to point to a Liberal government being competent to meet this challenge if past records are any indication.

The need now is for a genuine middle-of-the-road Labor Party and I am confident that only the DLP can meet the need as it has extensive industrial as well

as political experience.

On housing: Statistics reveal a catastrophic situation.

Dwelling commencements have dropped 30 per cent in the last three years and approvals have fallen 35 per cent in the same period.

The DLP wants to see the trend arrested quickly and proposes several measures to assist people to buy land, build homes and buy homes.

WE'RE NOT AGAINST MORE SHOPS

Sir,—
In reply to two letters (Diary, Nov. issue) concerning shopping facilities in Warrandyte, I would like to point out that the Warrandyte Environment League is not opposed to the building of more shops.

The recently published Warrandyte community survey shows they are considered necessary.

The land opposite the bridge was zoned commercial many years ago before parking provision was required by council.

To fulfill present requirements, an elevated shop with parking underneath was proposed.

The Warrandyte Environment League felt that being opposite the bridge it would destroy a very attractive focal point of the township, and would also add to the traffic dangers already existing there.

Other organisations in the town also expressed their opposition.

We feel the council should reconsider the com-

mercial zoning in Warrandyte now that car parking is required.

An area, which is zoned commercial already, and which we consider would be better suited for shops, is the Golden Gate area for which there is an application before council at present.

Being flatter, ugly excavation work would not have to be carried out, and there would be no real traffic hazards caused.

Please don't think of the Warrandyte Environment League as a "trigger-happy" group who want to knock every new thing that comes along.

We realise that progress has to be, but want it to be done in the most pleasing way.

The community survey showed that 68 per cent of people live in Warrandyte because they like the area.

We don't feel that Warrandyte is "lost" and feel that we have the support of most people in trying to preserve the character of the area.

We appreciate calls from the public concerning acts which are damaging to the character of our village, as well as positive ideas for improvements.

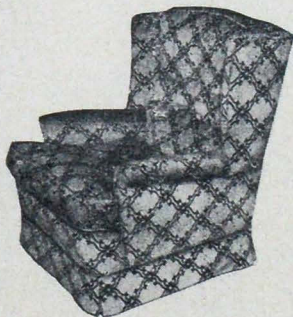
