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Warrandyte Environment League has approached Premier Hamer in the latest move to preserve the Koor-nong bushland. The league has asked for

a meeting with Planning Minister Hayes to plead its case for preservation of the north Warrandyte land as public open space.

The battle for the Koornong — between conserva-tionists and the developers, Laurence Investments — has been raging for more than two years.

It has involved Eltham Shire Council and the Town Planning Appeals Tribunal.

Laurence's latest proposal is for an 18-block develop-ment; WEL has asked for a maximum of 12.

Meanwhile, the contro-versy surrounding the widening of Kangaroo Ground Road, North War-

randyte, appears to have been resolved.

As a result of a demon-stration by conservationists and residents involved:

• Roadside trees will be planted to replace some of those bulldozed.

A foot-walk (to be A foot-walk (to be maintained by local resi-dents) will be put in along one side of the road.
 Eltham Shire president Alan Horsley has guaran-teed that residents will be kept better informed of council veriester in the area

council projects in the area.

Don Neil, a candidate for the North Riding seat at the Eltham council elec-tions, is far from satisfied. Mr. Neil, who was active in the protest, said the road should be proteed.


"This work was done without the knowledge of KG Road people and against their wishes," he said.

The WAA expects the September 3 concert to be a resounding success.





It all happened during that memorable match in which the Bloods defied all form, logic and reason by downing topof-the-ladder Boronia.


To his considerable discomfort, Darryl discovered that long hair and mud don't really mix.
